

Senior Pathways at Parade College

All senior students are enrolled in one of two equivalent certificates:

1. Victorian Certificate of Education Vocational Major (VCE-VM)

Two-year vocational and applied learning program within the VCE.


or

2. Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE)

Two-year academic program best suited to students seeking direct entry to university.

Both are two-year programs - meaning this year's subject selection is your most important yet.





VCE



VCE: key information

- ► Based at the Bundoora Campus.
- ► Involves external exams facilitated by the VCAA (including the GAT).
- ► An ATAR is generally awarded at the end of Year 12 (unscored is an option, but not considered until late in Year 12).
- ► Most students move into university study.



VCE: course structure

- ➤ <u>Year 11</u>
 - ▶ Units 1 and 2 English or Literature
 - ► 5x Units 1 and 2 subjects
 - ► Touchstones (school-based Religious Education program)
- ➤ Year 12
 - ► Units 3 and 4 English or Literature
 - ► 4x Units 3 and 4 subjects
 - ► Tenete (school-based Religious Education program)
 - ► Study Periods



VCE: Unit 1 and 2 subjects (Year 11)

- ► Internal School-assessed Coursework (SAC) or School-assessed Tasks (SAT)
- ► Internal exams (June and November)
- ► Minimum 90% attendance
- ► Culminates in an 'S' (Satisfactory) or 'N' (Not Satisfactory) being assigned for each unit
- ► Unit 1 and 2 assessment scores do <u>not</u> contribute to the ATAR but are vital in completing the VCE



VCE: Unit 3 and 4 subjects (Year 12)

- ►Internal SACs/ SATs
- ► General Achievement Test (June)
- ► External exams (October-November)
- ►Minimum 90% attendance
- ► Culminates in a study score out of 50



VCE: what should guide your decisions?

- ► What subjects do I enjoy?
 - ► Enjoyment will increase the likelihood of success.
- ▶ What must I do?
 - ► VCAA requirements (e.g. English/Literature)
- ► What do I want to do after school?
 - ▶ Pre-requisites for university/TAFE entry.
- ► What subjects am I best at?
 - ► Current success will likely lead to future success.

VCE: first (and simplest) choice - English

► Students generally continue with their current subject (English or Literature)

► If you have any questions about this choice, see Mr Willcocks (Learning Area Leader - English) and the English staff at the Expo in Moore Hall



VCE: choosing appropriate subjects

- ► Year 11 students choose:
 - ► Units 1 and 2 English or Literature Then...
 - ► 5x Units 1 and 2 subjects
- ► Consider the mix of those five subjects
- ► A breadth of subjects is advisable (keep university options open)
- ► Changing subjects mid-year is not always possible, so ensure your five subjects are carefully and thoughtfully chosen.



VCE: acceleration

For students who <u>did</u> accelerate into a Units 1-2 subject in Year 10

- ➤ Students wishing to enrol in Units 3-4 subjects in Yr 11 must complete separate application form as well as selecting online
- Require a minimum B average in the Units
 1-2 subject plus other requirements



VCE: acceleration

For students who <u>did not</u> accelerate into a Units 1-2 subject in Year 10

- ► Units 3-4 Texts & Traditions <u>or</u> Religion & Society is available as you will complete Units 1-2 this year
- ► Requires an application form
- Requires consistent grades above a B in Unit 1 of the relevant subject (T&T or R&S) as well as English



VCE: acceleration summary

Students currently accelerating in a Units 1-2 subject	Students <u>not</u> currently accelerating in a Units 1-2 subject
You may apply to continue accelerating in your current Units 1-2 subject	Because you have complete Units 1-2 of these subjects, you may apply to accelerate into: - Units 3-4 Texts & Traditions or - Units 3-4 Religion & Society No other subject is on offer as you have not completed the relevant Units 1-2.

VCE: what not to consider

- ▶ Do not worry about a subject's scaling if you are good at a subject, and passionate about it, then choose it regardless of scaling
- ▶ Do not worry about what your friends are selecting - this is all about your future



Vocational Education and Training (VET)



VET

- ► Offered at both campuses, in both programs (VCE and VCE VM).
- ► In a VCE program, VET subjects can contribute to ATAR.
- ► There are two types of VET subjects: scored and unscored.



VET within the VCE - unscored vs scored

Unscored VET	Scored VET
Example: Carpentry <i>or</i> Plumbing	Example: Sport and Recreation <i>or</i> Laboratory Skills
No external exams	Has external exams
Contributes to your ATAR (Unscored = add 10% of the fourth-best study score)	Contributes to your ATAR (as any other VCE subject would)



VET - key considerations

- ▶ VET subjects run for an entire year (not Semester).
- ► VET classes run (partially) outside of school hours (e.g. 1.30pm to 5pm, or 7.30am to 11am)
- ► To guarantee your place they need to be selected in subject selection as they are high demand and late entry is usually not available.
- ► You are not able to join a VET subject mid-year.
- ► Choice of a VET subject in Year 11 keeps both VCE & VCE VM pathways open and is **strongly recommended** for students who are uncertain of their pathway.
- ► Speak to Mr Torpey with any questions related to VET.

Key messages

- ► VCE and VCE VM both offer excellent opportunities and pathways.
- ► Neither pathway is "better" just different, and offers different opportunities which appeal to different students
- ► Regardless of their pathway, VCE and VCE VM students are our school leaders and demonstrate this through a committed approach to learning and a mature relationship with their teachers.
