Why accelerate in RE?



Opportunity in R&S and T&T to complete Units 3-4 at Year 11.

- Having this count as one of your Year 11 electives.
- The study score counts towards your ATAR.
- You still need to do Touchstones and Tenete in Year 11 and 12.

Why would I do this?

- Might be a chance to study Units 3-4 R&S/T&T if you won't have room at Year 12.
- Study RE at a highly academic level.
- Get a taste of Units 3-4 before you get to Year 12.
- Could count as a 6th subject towards your ATAR.

Who can do this?

- Students who have a B+ average in their Unit 1 & 2 RE subject this year, and those who performed well in Year 10 English (strong literacy skills required for acceleration).
- Students who have demonstrated a maturity and commitment to their studies in RE and across the board this year (effort, completion of homework, academic success, good behaviour in class)



- Requires and develops **skills** in literacy, analysis, synthesising material.
- Studying aspects of religion and traditions that have **historical importance**.
- Creates a greater understanding of religious traditions and culture of your own and others the background, its texts and rituals, the history and development of the tradition, the role of authority, the challenges to it from within and outside.
- Gain an understanding of some of the points of tension and debate in our media regarding religion.
- It is a combination of English, History, Politics, Philosophy and Theology all rolled into one! Awesome!

Unit 3: The Search for Meaning



- AOS1: Responding to the Search for Meaning
 - What BELIEFS does one religious tradition have to answer these big questions.
- AOS2: Expressing Meaning
 - How are beliefs EXPRESSED via the other 8 aspects of religion.
- AOS3: Significant life experience, religious beliefs and faith
 - How can a significant life experience impact our beliefs and,
 - How can our beliefs influence the way we interpret a significant life experience.

^{*}The religion Parade students usually studies is **Catholicism**, however, you may choose another to focus onespecially if you are of a different religious background / have a strong interest/knowledge in another already*

AOS1: Challenge and response

- Throughout history, religious beliefs have been CHALLENGED in many different way.
- This AOS looks at HOW the religion responds to challenges (three different challenges)

AOS2: Interaction of religion and society

- Religions are CHALLENGED in many different ways today.
- This AOS looks at HOW the religion responds to this challenge, and the IMPACT of their response on the wider society.

Unit 3: Religion, Challenge & Change



- AOS1: The background of the tradition
 - What shaped the development of the tradition?
- AOS2: Audience, purpose and literary aspects of the set texts
 - Who was it for? What style and structure? Why?
- AOS3: Interpreting texts Exegesis (Part 1)
 - Write an exegesis a critical analysis of a set passage from the Bible.



Unit 3: Religion, Challenge & Change



- AOS1: Interpreting texts Exegesis (Part 2)
 - Another exegesis on a different set passage from the Bible.
- AOS2: Religious themes and their teaching purpose
 - Discuss a significant religious idea/belief/social theme in the set text and explore how it is used to teach and audience.
- AOS 3: Themes in the later tradition and the later use of scripture –
 - Examines how the themes have shaped and developed in the texts.
