Our New House: Nolan House

With increasing enrolments at the Bundoora Campus, the Leadership Team has decided to move from four to five houses. The move continues to highlight our focus on student wellbeing at the College. Our intention has always been to promote safety amongst our students, to build culture and a sense of belonging for each student, as well as House spirit within each House. If we were to remain at four Houses this would be possible but more challenging with the increasing numbers of students in Year 7.

To ensure our ongoing commitment to student wellbeing, the creation of a fifth House demonstrates to the College community, that while our numbers may be growing on the Bundoora campus, the College is growing and changing also. A fifth House would more accurately reflect the development of Parade and ensure that the wellbeing/pastoral concerns/ of students continue to be our priority.

There were questions about what the new 'House' could be called and the consensus is Nolan House, after one of the original founding Brothers: Patrick Joseph Nolan, a lay Brother born in County Kerry, Ireland - a proud Kerryman! In some ways Nolan had been 'written out of the history'. Nolan was a non-teaching or "lay" Brother, largely responsible for fencing, clearing the land, furnishing and

overseeing construction of our original campus in East Melbourne. With our focus on applied learning / VCAL / VCE (Vocational Major), a new House named after Nolan seems providential.

The College has been preparing for this decision for a number of years, beginning with the inclusion of Br Nolan in the Founders' sculptures at the entrance of both campuses.

This will be a transitional process, beginning in 2023. Specific details regarding the transition will be available to the College community next term.

Principal's Leave

I look forward during this time to completing a Company Director's Course with the Australian Institute of Company Directors. I am very grateful for all these opportunities and look forward to returning refreshed and energised.

From the Assistant Principal - Student Wellbeing

Man Cave

Recently our Year 9 students participated in their second day of Man Cave programs. Feedback from our students and staff was overwhelmingly positive. After the holidays our Year 8s will participate in their first days of the program on either Monday 18 or Monday 25 July.

Year 9 students Ashton Roeg T19 and Joshua Bawden T15 reflected on the day and their experiences:

Mancave is an organisation that visit schools across Australia to educate young students on adulthood and how to overcome problematic situations to be a better person. We have had the opportunity to work with the presenters in Year 8, at the end of 2021 and now again in 2022.

At the most recent Mancave session, we discovered things about the presenters and students in our classes, sharing our feelings, talking about everyone's emotional past and how they dealt with it and became a 'better man' from the experience. We also talked about relationships between males and their friends, and what makes a positive relationship. We discussed what we would want in a relationship (communication, loyalty and caring) as well as things we wouldn't want in a relationship (toxicity and uneven effort put into the relationship).

One presenter shared a personal story on how he turned his life around towards the end of his teenage years. He explained how much happier he is with his life and encouraged us to do the same. His story showed true resilience as he overcame major obstacles for a better future. Overall, the presenters did a good job of illustrating the value of connection and friendships. They also did a good job at explaining how important men's health and wellbeing is to us young men. We enjoyed the opportunity to have this conversation as we learnt more about the students in our class.

School TV

As a College we subscribe to School TV which is a wellbeing site for parents and teachers to seek help, guidance and understanding around a range of issues. As we settle back into life past lockdown we know that many of our families are looking for assistance on how to support their sons. In the



latest Special Report the team of psychologists at School TV look at how we can build resilience in our young people.

Building Resilience Post Pandemic

Unfortunately, the mental health of young people has been significantly impacted by the pandemic. The prevalence of symptoms of anxiety and depression has risen dramatically amongst young people and remains higher than prepandemic levels. It is not an exaggeration to say that the child and adolescent mental health system is currently in crisis with general practices inundated, emergency departments flooded with demand, and medical services becoming disconnected, dispersed and diluted. As a result, many young people are at risk of not achieving the primary demands of developmental tasks such as independence, identity formation, and attaining and maintaining peer relationships. However, by maintaining their wellbeing through regular exercise, adequate sleep and healthy nutrition, young people can be in a better position to tackle them.

As many families settle back into their pre-COVID routines, there seems to be a pervasive sense of optimism about what lies ahead. If there is a panacea to the adversity caused by the pandemic, then it is the building of resilience. In this current environment, young people need support, understanding, empathy and encouragement from caring adults. Teaching them the skills to build resilience will enable young people to thrive and develop healthy coping strategies. There are seven integral and interrelated components that make up being resilient. These are explained in more depth in this Special Report and includes suggested strategies on how parents and carers can best facilitate them.

Immunisation is an important and effective tool for protecting your child, their peers, and the wider community from serious disease. All secondary school vaccines are funded by the Government until your child turns twenty years of age.

An immunisation consent card must be signed by a parent/carer if you wish to have your son immunised.

If your son is not having the immunisation, the consent card still needs to be ticked 'no' and returned to his Tutor Teacher.

Defence Force Visit

VCAL and ERPP students recently attended an Australian Defence Force information session at the Preston Campus.

Infantry Soldier John Feo and Officer Tiplady from the Military Police shared insight about life in the Australian Defence Force (ADF). They delved into the different career pathways, entry requirements and processes.

Infantry Solder John Feo spoke about his role as an army soldier and his handling of explosives and demolition. He discussed specific abilities soldiers require to perform their job well. He stated that skilled tactics, effective teamwork and cooperation with other corps was a necessity to carry out his role.

Officer Tiplady spoke about his original career as a domestic plumber and how he transitioned into the military police. He indicated to students that there were over three hundred different positions offered in the ADF, ranging from apprenticeships in nearly every trade to Officer positions. He explained the recruitment process and highlighted the numerous benefits gained by joining.




One aspect that students found appealing was the sporting opportunities offered to its ADF members. The ADF sponsored Infinitary Soldier John Feo to represent the



Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

Ties and Scarves can be purchased from College Reception \$25 Tie, \$30 Silk Scarf, and \$20 Polyester Scarf

Students are able to wear the Aboriginal Tie in place of their College Tie during Terms 2 and 3
