
After a very successful Term 2, this week the Term 3 program of ACC Sport commences with teams in Basketball, Hockey and Table Tennis.

Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

Ties and Scarves can be purchased from College Reception \$25 Tie, \$30 Silk Scarf, and \$20 Polyester Scarf

Students are able to wear the Aboriginal Tie in place of their College Tie during Terms 2 and 3

Classroom Agreements

Setting up our Classrooms for Success

I hope parents all had a lovely break with your sons over the term break and that they are all eager to return for the second half of the year.

At the beginning of this year we spoke with our teachers about working collaboratively with their students to determine what a good classroom looks like at Parade College – this will often be different, depending on the subject and the activities planned.

We know our boys need and thrive on routine and need consistency to feel secure as learners. Thus, it is important that they feel they can take considered risks with their learning within the classroom and at the same time be aware of the boundaries.

Having each of our subject teachers lead the discussion around setting up a Classroom Agreement makes it easier for all students to understand what expectations we have of them and what expectations they have of us as their teachers.

The Intention

As the learning leaders in the classroom, we need to establish classrooms where positive interactions occur, and effective teaching and learning takes place. We do this by:-

- Getting to know our students, their strengths and challenges as individual learners
- Planning and creating structured, predictable and positive lessons which are well-planned and well-resourced, including activities and instruction which address the learning needs of our students and promotes engagement
- Introducing and embedding routines for entry to each class and each lesson
- Making explicit the learning intentions and success criteria at the start of each lesson
- Providing direct instruction, followed by a task where students are working with the material that has been taught to them

- · Clarifying the work done
- Providing direct instruction on the next stage of the lesson, followed by a task to consolidate that material taught
- Reflecting on what has been learned in the lesson what went well, what questions remain?
- Establishing an exit routine which includes recording homework, tidying the classroom and exiting the room after the bell
- Varying the tasks and activities within each lesson
- Establishing with our students a clear and transparent set of expectations or agreements about how our classes are going to work to allow learning for all to take place and how the class members will hold each other accountable to that agreement
- Supporting students in identifying the impact of their behaviours on themselves and others

Classroom Agreements establish positive learning behaviours and set boundaries in our classrooms to ensure each student can learn.

They are short, clear, simple, negotiated by all and no more than six to eight statements in total.

Students are asked the following questions – "When this class is working well, what will it look like, sound like and feel like?"

Other questions that support a shared Classroom
Agreement could include: "What do you need from me, as
your teacher, from each other and what do I require from
you to make our classroom a positive learning
environment?"

The following six statements encompass good learning behaviours, based on respect, responsibility, safety and cooperative learning and form the basis for our Classroom Agreements at Parade College.

Our teachers have unpacked these, or similar statements, with the boys in their classes, at the start of the year and also in the last week of Term 2 where some elective and semester based subjects/classes have commenced.

- Be on time and prepared to work
- Follow instructions willingly and promptly

- · Listen when someone is speaking
- · Consider everyone's safety
- · Respect others and their property
- Take responsibility and make things right

The Benefits of a Classroom Agreement

- The students gain confidence in the fact that they have contributed to the Classroom Agreement and have a sense of ownership of it
- They are clear on what a good classroom looks like in each of their subjects
- The students know what is expected of them
- This agreement is used to redirect students back to tasks in class and will be referred to in discussion if things go wrong

Just a reminder to families that Term 3 is full winter uniform. To assist parents in having conversations with their sons please see below the formal winter uniform expectations:

Year 9 Man Cave Presentations

This year our Year 9 students will be involved in The Man Cave program on Monday 19 July and Monday 26 July.

This is an exciting program which would have been delivered to students in 2020 but could not be done due to lockdown and COVID restrictions.

The College believes in the importance of equipping our young men with the skills to flourish so we are very pleased we are able to offer this program to our Year 9s in 2021.

"The Man Cave" is a preventative mental health and emotional intelligence organisation for boys and young men. Through one of the full day workshops - which Year 9s will attend at their home campus on either Monday 19 July, or Monday 26 July, four research-based challenges for young men today - mental health, hyper-masculine identity, gender inequality and inter-generational connection - will be addressed through activities, videos, discussions and input from presenters from The Man Cave.

The workshop will aim to :-

- empower the boys to cultivate deeper emotional and social intelligences, understanding the value of having a caring, supportive and inclusive community around them
- develop a sense of purpose, challenging the boys to work out what is real and authentic about being a young man and help them become more confident in who they are and their ability to make positive choices
- become agents of positive change in the communities in which they live.

These are all values and aspirations that we, as Parade College, hold for your son.

We know it is becoming increasingly difficult for young men to work out their place in the world and how to create positive support structures round them, and we are delighted to be able to offer this opportunity to our Year 9s.

They can explore the above ideas in a different way from their normal classes, but one which we believe complements the work we do in the classroom and in Tutor time. Students will only participate in <u>one</u> day on either 19 July or 26 July. This will be done by English class. Please see timetable below for details of when students will be participating and the rooms they will be in.

Year 7 Science

The Water Cycle

In science we did an experiment about the water cycle. The water cycle is the process whereby water from sea, rivers, dams and lakes is evaporated by the heat from the sun. Once in the atmosphere, it condenses into clouds and when they get very heavy, the water falls back down to the earth's surface in the form of rain, snow, hail and sleet (also known as precipitation) and is collected. This cycle continuously repeats itself.



In this experiment we drew the water cycle on a plastic bag using a permanent marker, placed a few drops of blue food colouring and water inside then sealed it and placed the plastic bag on a window that gets direct sunlight.

We can then observe how the water cycle takes place in this plastic bag. This was an interesting way for us to not only learn about, but also visualise the water cycle.

The offer is conditional on completing VCE exams and meeting the subject prerequisites for their preferred course.


Year 10 Work Experience

Reading for pleasure has been defined by the National Literacy Trust as "reading that we do of our own free will, anticipating the satisfaction that we will get from the act of reading. It also refers to reading that having begun at someone else's request we continue because we are interested in it."

Upon reviewing the research literature, Clark and Rumbold (2006) identify several main areas of the benefits of reading for pleasure:


- · Reading attainment and writing ability;
- Text comprehension and grammar;
- Breadth of vocabulary;
- Positive reading attitudes;
- · Greater self-confidence as a reader;
- Pleasure in reading in later life;
- General knowledge;
- A better understanding of other cultures;
- Community participation; and
- A greater insight into human nature and decision-making.

If reading for pleasure is going to have these benefits for your son, there are two important factors to consider: reading frequency and reading time.

Reading Frequency – how many days in the week?

Research out of the United States supports the importance of reading for pleasure. In 2013, the National Center for Education Statistics compared students' National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) reading scores with their reading habits.

For all age groups, they found a clear correlation between the *frequency* with which students read for pleasure, and their average NAEP scores. The more frequently students read, the higher their scores were. The correlation between reading frequency and reading scores was true for all age groups and the score gaps increased



across the years. Among 9-year-olds, there was only an 18-point difference between children who reported reading "never or hardly ever" and those who read "almost every day." By age 13, the gap widened to 27 points. At age 17, it further increased to 30 points. Students should read every day.

Reading time - how many minutes in the day?

What's the difference between kids who read more than 30 minutes per day and those who read less than 15 minutes per day?

Twelve Million

Between kindergarten and twelfth grade, students with an average daily reading time of 30+ minutes are projected to encounter 13.7 million words. At graduation, their peers who averaged less than 15 minutes of reading per day are likely to be exposed to only 1.5 million words. The difference is more than 12 million words.

We encourage all students to read for at least 20 minutes per day. From there, students can build their reading stamina, and they will soon be able read for 30 minutes per day. *Reading for pleasure* is possible with the many resources available through the College's Learning Centres:

- At the NLC and CCLC, students can borrow hard copy fiction and non-fiction books.
- E-Books are available on MyOn, SORA, and Wheelers.
- Audiobooks are available on BorrowBox and Wheelers.
- E-Magazines are available on RB Digital.

To access the digital resources, students should locate the Learning Centres subheading under School Links on SIMON. We encourage you to discuss reading with your son, and assist him in establishing a regular and consistent reading routine at home

Instrumental Music Lessons and Ensemble Rehearsals

Instrumental Music Lessons and ensemble rehearsals resume this week - students and parents should have received their timetable.

Please note and set the reminders you need to ensure you are attending your scheduled lessons and note the following procedures for absences or other events.

In the event of student absence, it is the responsibility of the student to notify his Instrumental Teacher in advance if he is unable to attend a lesson. Where adequate notification is provided, a make-up lesson will be arranged, with a maximum of two make-up lessons per Term.

Please note the following protocols for different types of absence:

Illness: A telephone call must be made to the College Student Reception by 8:40am on the respective day. Please state that your son has an instrumental music lesson, his instrument of study and his teacher's name. If this call is received by 8:40am, a make-up lesson will be offered.

School-based absence: If a student is unable to attend a lesson due to an excursion, exam or other school approved event, written communication must be forwarded to the instrumental music teacher for a make-up lesson to be scheduled.

Extended absences: In the case of extended absences such as family holidays, please contact the Director of Music at your earliest opportunity.

Unexplained absences: If a student is absent from an instrumental music lesson and no notification is given, the lesson will be forfeited and the fee for this lesson is still payable. In this case, the instrumental music teacher will also email both the student and parents directly to alert them of this fact.

Please note that in the case of group lessons, it is not possible for make-up lessons to be scheduled.

Students are encouraged to communicate any issues well in advance so that teachers are in a position to be able to rescheduled lesson times where possible, and be pro-active in checking their timetable, emails, and MS-Teams for updates.

Students have also been encouraged to use their laptops so set calendar reminders of scheduled lesson times.


