Tomorrow (Thursday) is the Feast of the Assumption, a significant Feast Day for the College as Mary, the mother of Christ is a Patron of the College. The Feast of the Assumption is one of the oldest holy days in the Church, with accounts of celebrations going back to the sixth century. Christians in the East, both Catholic and Orthodox refer to it as the Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos, or "the falling asleep of the Mother of God". Celebrated every year on 15 August, the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary commemorates the death of Mary and her bodily assumption into Heaven, before her body could begin to decay - a foretaste of our own bodily resurrection at the end of time. It is the most important of all Marian feasts as well as being a Holy Day of Obligation.

The Lab at Banyule-Nillumbik Tech School Launches

The Lab (http://thelab.org.au) is a technology club for young people aged 10 to 16 with Asperger's and High Functioning Autism who are interested in coding and playing games.

Through a child's interests in technology, The Lab aims to encourage social engagement and the development of important life skills that can increase their capacity for both personal and vocational development.

Currently young people with autism have some of the lowest rates of vocational engagement in the community and The Lab aims to address this disadvantage. The Lab offers mentoring by technology professionals in areas such as programming, 3D, digital design and gaming.

Parade College was offered the opportunity to suggest a mentor for The Lab that would be able to look at a young person's strengths and interests and work with them to increase the sense of enthusiasm and engagement that they have for gaming or coding.



Year 12 student Daniel Blaker (H07) was an obvious choice for this role. Daniel has worked with the Tech School before, contributing his wealth of coding knowledge to the creation of a Chat Bot for the Tech School website, as well as receiving seed funding at last year's Student Start Up for his homework organiser app, "Noterist".

Daniel has an extremely bright future ahead of him in the field of software development, having already competed and won in a number of coding competitions.

After this week's first Lab session, Daniel was eager to praise the club and the participants who took part for their interest in coding and gaming, and he looks forward to the next month and a half of Lab sessions.

Arnhem Land Immersion

We flew into Darwin, and after meeting up with our Red Earth leaders and Bus Driver, we drove out to start our adventure. We went on a crocodile tour at Adelaide River and stayed in a Caravan Park in Marrakai for the first night.



The next day we ventured into Western Arnhem Land for an amazing eight days. We stayed in two Indigenous communities: Mamadawerre and Mikginj Valley. At each community we were welcomed warmly and became fully immersed in the life on country. We participated in many cultural activities and undertook a community project at each place we stayed in. We heard many incredible stories and got to know and love many beautiful people and places. Some of the Parade students who shared this life-changing journey have also written a small account of some of our experiences. Each account focusses on a particular aspect of the Immersion.

Lachlan Murray, Year 9 - The Land

Arnhem Land is sacred land to the Aboriginals that live on it. The land had no shortage of wildlife, and with its hot days and cold nights, it was like summer all the time. Luckily, we went during the dry season, so there was no rain. In fact, we didn't see clouds until we arrived back in the NT. At a night time we would all sit around the campfire, admiring the stars, since there was such a clear vision of them. We saw a few meteors as well. We left Darwin in warm weather and when we arrived back in Melbourne, we were hit with reality, with the cold weather.



James Skubel, Year 11 - The People

On our recent trip to Arnhem Land, where we went into two different communities and experienced how they live and their cultures. The one thing that we found was the sense of community and the people in the communities. The communities were so welcoming to us and so warming. Not even being in the community for five minutes the kids were hanging off us and playing footy and the adults were telling us stories. This made us all feel at home and made the whole experience so much better.

The culture at the Aboriginal communities was strong. The people there believed heavily in their beliefs and culture. On the last night Mamadawerre, we were given the opportunity to join in with their ritual dancing. We tried to keep up with the kids who were half the size of us, but it was very difficult. We shared many laughs while attempting to dance, as well as making many fond memories that we will cherish forever.

Another way the Aboriginal people expressed their culture, was by sharing dreamtime stories with us around the campfire. These stories were very sacred to the Indigenous people because it explains how everything came to be.

Louie Sinkins, Year 9 - The places we visited

On our trip to Arnhem Land we visited a variety of places. The first place we visited was a crocodile boat tour where we learnt about the dangers of crocs and how not to get eaten.

The next place we visited was Ubirr rock, where we saw cave paintings left by the Aboriginals, some of the paintings were over 9000 years old.

Next was Mamadawerre where we stayed with the community for a few days, the area was hundreds of kilometres away from civilisation and they have an airstrip which is how they get food, clothes and medicine.

Mumadewerre also has a new ranger program in which rangers help the community.

The next community we went to was Mikginj Valley where there was only one family, it was very small but closer to civilisation, they also have an airstrip.

The final place we visited was Gunbalanya, we only stayed there for a few minutes and it is the largest community in Arnhem Land, they have a police department, shops, schools, airstrips, fuel and more.

For Mamadawerre's mob we fixed up their garden with fresh soil and mulch. We had to take out the old soil to replace it with fresh soil, the old soil was mixed with the new soil, we then put the mulch on top of the soil and then the cardboard was placed on top of the mulch to prevent it from drying out.

In Mikginj Valley, we made a chicken coop. We had to dig holes at three quarters of a metre depth and about twenty centimetres width to put stumps in, we then started putting mesh on the top of the coop and on the side of the coop where the afternoon sun hits, along with putting wire around the coop and to we then finished off with applying the steel door.



Matthew Brogna, Year 12 - Making Didgeridoos

I'm going to be discussing the didgeridoo activity that the boys did at Mamadawerre. On day three we went out with, Conrad, who was the traditional owner, looking for a specific tree that didgeridoos are made out of.

When we had found one, we were instructed to tap on it, and listen closely to judge whether the termites had eaten enough out of the centre of the tree, for it to be hollow enough to make a didgeridoo. You knew it was the one when you could hear an echo inside the tree when you tapped on it.

This was followed by a big process of debarking and shaving it down to a certain thickness and making sure it had no cracks or holes in the wood otherwise it wouldn't work properly. Then came the filing of the mouth piece and the testing of the sound, Conrad's experience helped by knowing what length to cut the didgeridoo to get the best sound.

Everyone enjoyed helping each other and learning from Conrad's knowledge.

Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS)

Students who have experienced circumstances (either in the short or long term) which have had an impact on their academic achievements should complete a SEAS application as part of their VTAC application.

There are four categories under which students can apply: NB: Students can apply under as many categories as relevant to their circumstances however, they cannot use the same circumstance in different categories. A SEAS application is assessed by VTAC and, depending on the outcome, a bonus is applied which alters the student's selection rank.

SEAS Category	Description	Evidence Required	
1 Personal information and location	Recognises personal details such as gender, equity, location which may be eligible for a bonus.	None – students must tick a box within the SEAS section of their VTAC application to be considered for this category.

Greg joined Parade as a Year 7 student in 1972, having followed Andrew to the College. Midway through 1976, not long after featuring in a Year 11 class photograph with the likes of John Dinan (the 1977 College Captain and now OPA Committeeman), Greg left to take up a building apprenticeship.

He moved to San Francisco in 1986 where he met and married Cathy McGarvey and set up business as a master builder. He was known for the high quality of his work and his personal integrity with his workers in treating them like family. His spare time was spent riding his bike across the Golden Gate Bridge, watching the Giants play baseball and laughing.

Two years ago, Greg visited Melbourne and caught up with some of his old Parade schoolmates including Paul Smith and Father Joe Caddy. Another reason for this visit was to watch his son Daniel represent the United States in the International AFL World Cup Rules competition. Daniel, who will be returning next year to again represent the United States, currently chases the leather for the Oakland Pirates in the Golden Gate AFL league.

Greg loved his city by the Bay. On Sunday 4 August, in the Chapel of Our Lady in the Presidio, San Francisco, a Memorial Service was held in his honour.

Lone Pine Story Set In Stone

A bronze plaque has now been affixed to the bluestone surroundings of a Lone Pine sapling, which was planted on the grounds of Parade College's Bundoora Campus last November to mark the 100th anniversary of the Armistice.

Funding for the creation of the plaque came via a grant approved by the Federal Minister for Veterans' Affairs Darren Chester through the Armistice Centenary Grants Program.



The plaque, measuring 300mm x 200mm and featuring the College and Association crests, was recently installed by the Campus' maintenance team member Tuglio Valentino. It carries the following inscription;

THIS LONE PINE
WAS PLANTED ON REMEMBRANCE DAY 2018
ON THE CENTENARY OF THE ARMISTICE
BY PARADE COLLEGE STUDENTS
TO COMMEMORATE ALL SOLDIERS, INCLUDING
OLD PARADIANS, WHO PAID THE ULTIMATE
PRICE IN WAR

THIS TREE WAS PROPOGATED FROM SEED COLLECTED FROM THE LONE PINE IN CANBERRA, WHICH WAS GROWN FROM SEED SENT HOME FROM GALLIPOLI AFTER THE BATTLE OF LONE PINE, AUGUST 1915

LEST WE FORGET

Back in 2015, on the occasion of the Centenary of the Gallipoli Landing, the Association acquired the Lone Pine as a seedling in a forestry tube from the Australian War Memorial via Yarralumla Nursery. As council requirements dictated that the seedling was of insufficient height and root volume to be planted at the time, the Lone Pine remained in the Association's care for the ensuing three years.

By late 2018, the Lone Pine, which can reach a height of 35 metres, met the planting requirements, and so a ceremony was arranged. Parade College Acting Principal Andy Kuppe was in attendance for last year's ceremony, as was the College's Vietnam veterans – former students Paul Stock, Paul Vaughan and his wife Sandra, Ian Dunn and his wife Joan, and John Sonneveld and his wife Liz, together with former teacher John Joss (who participated with student in the planting of the tree). Also present were veterans Peter Blackman, Alan Comben and John Stretch, whose daughter Marita, a former teacher at the College, facilitated the gathering.

The Old Paradians' Association were represented by the then President Lewis Derrico, CEO Tony De Bolfo and committeeman Andy Walsh, and Parade's Year 7 students also took part.

The Lone Pine was a solitary tree on the Gallipoli Peninsula in Turkey, which marked the site of the Battle of Lone Pine in 1915. The tree was obliterated during the battle; however, pine cones that had remained attached to the cut branches over the trenches were retrieved by various Australian soldiers and brought home.

The resultant seedlings sent home by one soldier, were propagated from the pine cone. Today, one of those seedlings grows in College ground.
