Student Progress Interviews – 7 and 11 September

Please note that we have made some changes to the format for the upcoming Student Progress Interviews scheduled for next Thursday 7 and Monday 11 September. Given the release of the AFL Finals fixture and the clash of one of the finals with our proposed 'on-site' Student Progress Interviews next Thursday evening, we have made the decision to alter the format and times across both evenings.

Past experiences have informed us that attendance at particular College events has been impacted when there has been a clash with major external events.

Given the importance of the interviews and the opportunity for families to have the chance to discuss their child's progress with their teachers, we believe the change, as noted below, will allow for a greater proportion of our families to attend the interviews across the two evenings.

Both evenings will now be conducted remotely via MS Teams, and not onsite.

EREA Supports the Voice to Parliament

In November 2022, EREA endorsed the Uluru Statement from the Heart, stating:

"We stand in solidarity, alongside our First Nations peoples, in their calls for a Voice and acknowledgment enshrined in the Australian Constitution...

The establishment of a First Nations Voice to Parliament enshrined in the Constitution, and the establishment of a Makarrata Commission for the purpose of truth-telling is at the centre of this justice. We support this road to Treaty."

EREA Endorses Uluru Statement of the Heart - Edmund Rice Education Australia.

Within the EREA Acknowledgment of Country, we accept: "the invitation contained in the Uluru Statement From The Heart to listen to the First Peoples of Australia and work together for reconciliation, justice, equity, and healing."

The Voice to Parliament is an authentic outcome of this invitation which will have deep and lasting impact on the future of First Nations peoples within Australia and the reconciliation of this nation.

In living out the commitment to justice and solidarity (The Charter for Catholic Schools in the Edmund Rice Tradition), to Truth Telling (Stretch RAP Respect Action 10) and to deep listening (EREA Learning Statement), we support and encourage school communities to continue their reconciliation learning journey, including what a Voice to Parliament could look like and the possible impacts that could be felt by

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people as a result of having an enshrined voice.

We need to be reminded that all Australians have a unique opportunity to vote on a proposed amendment to the Constitution that recognises Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the First Peoples of this country.

This recognition will be seen through the establishment of a Voice which will be an independent, representative body for First Nations peoples speaking on behalf of issues effecting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Specific and accurate details regarding this democratic process should be explored and encouraged in our community through the <u>Australian Government website</u>.

We stand in solidarity with like-minded organisations including: the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC), Reconciliation Australia, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, National Catholic Education Commission (NCEC), Catholic Social Services Australia (CSSA), Caritas and the Edmund Rice Centre.

Solidarity Walk Friday 1 September

Our Solidarity Week activities conclude tomorrow with a walk and some activities to highlight our fundraising initiatives for the Nzara Hospital in South Sudan. The Comboni Sisters, who run the hospital have done an amazing job supporting the local community and the money our community has raised has supported them substantially.

This year our funds go directly to supporting their blood bank to help save lives. Families have already received communication from Ms Anne McLachlan asking for your support in assisting your sons to raise at least \$10 sponsorship each. We thank you in advance for your support of this community in need.

From the Dean of Child Safety

Child Safety Standard 1 and Cultural Safety for Aboriginal Children

The following extract is taken from the CCYP tip sheet: Child Safe Organisations

Every Aboriginal child has the right to be immersed in their culture. The right to culture, which includes the intrinsic right to kin, community, cultural practices, and identity, relates to and impacts the enjoyment of every other human right.

This right is about connections, relationships, and experiences, and it is the greatest source of resilience for Aboriginal children.

Section 19 of the Charter of Human Rights states that Aboriginal people hold distinct rights and must not be denied the right to enjoy their identity and culture, maintain their kinship ties, and maintain their distinctive spiritual, material, and economic relationship with the land and waters with which they have a connection under traditional laws and customs.

For Aboriginal people, culture is about family networks, Elders and ancestors. It's about relationships, languages, dance, ceremony, and heritage.

Culture is about spiritual connection to our lands and waters. It is the way we pass on stories and knowledge to our babies and children; it is how we greet each other and look for connection. It is about all the parts that bind us together. (Jackomos 2015).

How can an organisation create a safe environment for indigenous students?

To create a safe environment for indigenous children The tip sheet proposes the following steps and actions:

- Talk with Aboriginal people
- Find out who the Traditional Owner groups or Registered Aboriginal Party are in your area

- Recognising the impact of the past
- Respect and embrace Aboriginal culture in every aspect of your organisation

Acceleration into VCE and VET: Subject Selection for 2024

We are currently reviewing applications to accelerate into a VCE or VET subject. To determine which students are suited to accelerated study, a panel reviews their Semester 1 results as well as the Learning Behaviours from their Semester Report.

Learning Area Leaders also make recommendations to the panel about each student's suitability, to ensure that a fully informed decision is made.

Students who applied should expect to receive news about the outcome of their application early in Term 4.

From the Dean of Learning -Year 10 to 12

Unit 3 & 4 VCE Trial Exams 8-11 September

Unit 3 and Unit 4 trial exams are commencing on Friday 8 September and running through until the last day of term.

Year 12 students only need to attend the College for their exams during this time and need to be dressed in full College uniform. The timetable for the exams is available on SIMON and PAM, and study halls will be run for students during the day who wish to remain at the College.

Please note: As Friday 8 September is a student-free day, there will be no school buses running, so students will need to make their own way to and from the College.

Accelerating Year 11 students will attend their normal classes during this time; however, they will be expected to attend their trial exam at its scheduled time, including exams concluding outside regular hours.

The only exception to this will be if they have a Unit 2 assessment scheduled at the same time; in that case, they will need to arrange with Mr Fahey to attend the assessment and sit the trial exam at an alternate time.

Year 12 VTAC and Choices for After-School Pathways

Year 12 students have been made aware of Open Days being run by Tertiary Institutions and are encouraged to attend as many as they can to make an informed decision regarding their pathway beyond school.

On 16 August all Year 12 students attended an assembly that instructed them on the process of applying for VTAC courses next year, as well as applying for SEAS applications if they have experienced disadvantage through their VCE years.

Students are responsible for their applications; however, Parade staff can assist where requested.

World Youth Day Reflection

During the first week of August, five Parade College students attended World Youth Day in Portugal. One of those students Year 11 Ranmika T02 recounts his experience below.

One of the largest Catholic events, World Youth Day, was celebrated this year in Lisbon, Portugal. It takes place every three years.

World Youth Day is an international event that brings together young people to celebrate their faith. Many young Catholics gather together to participate in religious activities, attend Mass, and strengthen their spiritual connections.

The Pope Francis welcome ceremony was one of the highlights for me. Being present with 1.5 million fellow Catholics to welcome Pope Francis was an incredible experience.

Meeting many people from different nations and exchanging gifts with them was another enjoyment. Seeing so many young people celebrate their beliefs and seeing how different countries celebrate their faith was a fantastic experience. It was an amazing opportunity to walk through the Sanctuary of Fatima.

GoGreen Online Conference

Recently, the De Mazenod Family Education Network held its GoGreen Student Voice Sustainability Summit, in which Parade College was a participant. St Eugene College Queensland, Mazenod College Western Australia and Mazenod College Victoria were joined by secondary and primary schools either directly connected to Oblate Parishes or generally interested in sharing information about the projects in their schools, promoting sustainability.

Corporates, Social Enterprises, universities, and schools provided information for the event.

Year 9 students Joshua Gheno N19, Luke Gheno N13, Thomas Gheno N12, and Year 8 student Aston Wilkinson H17 watched the keynote addresses on a number of days, which gave them some ideas for managing sustainability projects at the College. Ms Kirsty Bishop - Fox from Sustainability Pathways, who spoke on Sustainable Habits for Health and Wellbeing, and Alice Carwardine from Catholic Earthcare, who provided information on the link between social justice and positive sustainable action.

The students also saw some projects in action. Killester College Springvale's STEM project Energy Breakthrough requires students to design a vehicle using recycled materials and then race it in the annual competition in Maryborough. St Joseph's Primary School in Sorrento continues to win awards for their initiatives, including the development of Indigenous gardens, an active Dolphin Research Team, and ecology studies.

2024 Prefect Retreat

Thursday's activities consisted of guest speakers, and a trip into the city for a Big Issue workshop and Justice Walk, while Friday explored Spirituality in Leadership, specifically what it means to lead in a Catholic school in the EREA Tradition, a day prepared for and facilitated by Ms Morello and Mr Cicutto.

This is a lovely event where students can showcase their individual and small ensemble learning in a more casual environment with the guidance of their instrumental teacher, and it is always a highlight of the music calendar.

A reminder to all students enrolled in Instrumental Music Lessons:

A reminder that all enrolled students are allocated to an Ensemble as a condition of their enrolment. Ensemble rehearsals will take place every week, either at lunchtime (12.50pm to 1.25pm) or after school (3.30pm to 4.30pm).

Key aspects of the ensemble program include:

- Approaching music making as a collaborative experience
- Acknowledging instrumental music as a commitment to excellence
- Developing interpersonal skills through teamwork and leadership
- Providing a well-rounded musical experience for students
- Presenting music as a representational platform for the College

Now that our major performance is completed for the term, staff are turning their attention to learning and developing new skills and repertoire and planning for 2024.

The next few weeks will provide us with valuable information about which students can progress to new ensembles in 2024 and what combinations of instruments we may need to develop in our program along with the opportunity to try out some new pieces without the pressure of a performance.

For our ensembles to grow and perform at their best, a few key rehearsal etiquette and expectations are in place for all ensembles.

Punctuality

- Arrive to rehearsal quickly, bring your lunch, etc.
- Help to set up, so chair, stand music.

Be Prepared

- Bring a pencil, your instrument, mouthpiece, or reed
- Keep music organised

Work Time

- Be on task and engaged with the learning in the classroom
- Participate in the class ensemble to the best of your ability

Practice Makes Perfect

- You are welcome to borrow your instrument over the weekend for home practice.
- Instruments must be returned to the music department and signed back in on Monday morning Clean Up

Clean U

- Participate in whole class pack-ups
- Clean your own area and assist others when needed
- Put your music stand back in the stand trolley
- Put all the music back in the folders and give it to your section leader to put up the front.
- Dispose of rubbish thoughtfully

Remember, we are a team, and we are only strong when we work as a team to achieve our goals.

It is important that everyone attend all rehearsals so we can get better as a team.

If you can't make a rehearsal, it is polite and expected that you email and explain your absence. Staff will also send a letter of non-attendance to parents and students to let you know of your child's absence.

We encourage students to reply to acknowledge receipt of the email explaining their absence and let the teacher know they will make every effort to attend the next rehearsal.



Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

Ties and Scarves can be purchased from College Reception \$25 Tie, \$30 Silk Scarf, and \$20 Polyester Scarf

Students are able to wear the Aboriginal Tie in place of their College Tie during Terms 2 and 3

Table Tennis will play Salesian for the Division 1 Grand Final, while our Division 2 C and D Basketball teams are also Grand Finalists.


Years 7 and 8


