

From the Principal

Tomorrow is the Feast of St Monica, mother of one of the Doctors of the Church, St Augustine. The first reading is from Chapter 26 of Ecclesiasticus.

I remember with fondness and pain a few years ago, being the Minister of the Word at Sunday Mass when this reading had to be proclaimed. It was painful reading, but I remember fondly thinking (in an admittedly mildly sadistic way) how my Parish Priest, Fr Terry Kean, would need to squirm through trying to sermonise on it.

For those that don't know the reading it is titled, *A perfect* wife is the joy of her husband. Worse than the title, it includes lines such as: A silent wife is a gift from the Lord, no price can be put on a well-trained character and ends with Like the sun rising over the mountains of the Lord is the beauty of a good wife in a well-kept house.

At the time I was Deputy Principal of OLMC - an all girls' school - and some of my students were in the congregation and I could feel their anger rising. Fr Terry was beaming to my left enjoying my discomfort. However, Fr Terry's response in his sermon, as is his practice, is not to spend one iota of energy in defending the indefensible! Fr Terry treasures Tradition, but getting out of Church at the end of mass alive is a greater priority!! The irony that one of the great female saints has this for the reading of the day tomorrow is not lost on me. God has a great sense of humour.

This reading is one of the challenges for our time. COVID-19 demands reassessment of a number of practices that have served us well and we hold dear.

I have some sadness when my calendar reminds me of events that were planned and are a fixture of our values. Last Thursday was to be the 2021 Prefects' Retreat and the boys engaged with energy and maturity with some great keynote speakers remotely. Last Friday was to be our Solidarity Walk. Instead, the boys and the Ministry Team offer us the Waterford Challenge. Next Friday was to be a House Mass, instead we will gather online. Soon we will have Parent/Teacher interviews, instead we will do them on Teams.

On the eve of Spring, Parade College has received an invitation from the Churches of Victoria to be a light in the darkness, on Monday 31 August at 7.00pm. As the last light of the last day of Winter fades, stand in your front garden and spend some time in silence, perhaps light a candle to remember all those who have lost their lives to the Coronavirus or to violence. Then, as the first night of Spring begins, look to the future with prayer and hope. Let us move from the cold and the dark into warmth and light together.

How do we navigate these times? We do what our Ancestors ever did: we trust in God and draw deeply from our Tradition:

I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.

2021 JacPLUS - Jacaranda e-Textbook Bundle for Years 8 to 10 in 2021

In 2021, Parade College will continue to use Jacaranda's \$110 Digital Bundle for students in Years 7 to 10 with all the prescribed eBooks and companion products added to your child's existing JacPLUS account.

Jacaranda's payment portal will be available from 2 September, with the \$110 payment required by 22 September 2020.

Year 9 students enrolled in the Edmund Rice Pathways Program (ERPP) at Preston for Year 10, are not required to purchase the Jacaranda Bundle. Booklists with the balance of items will be available in early November and will be required for the commencement of the 2021 School Year.

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From the Dean of Learning Years 10 to 12

Unit 3/4 Students

All students who are completing a VCE Unit 3/4 subject in 2020 are required to complete the General Achievement Test (GAT), which assists the VCAA in determining results by checking that school based and external assessments have been accurately assessed, as well as contributing to the statistical moderation of school-based assessment results.

It also plays a part in determining derived examination results in the result of illness and hardship, so could well take on extra importance this year as the government determine the impact of COVID-19 on individual students.

As VCAA state, "There is also a close correlation between receiving good GAT results and academic achievement."

The GAT has been rescheduled this year to Wednesday 7 October and, although there is no formal revision needed for the test, we will be helping prepare our students with a practice test and writing tasks later this term so they are able to perform at their best on the day.

This day will see no formal Unit 3/4 classes with logistical details being passed on to the students at a later date.

Formative Assessment Tasks

As we continue this period of remote learning, the majority of VCE assessment tasks continue in the form of formative tasks.

These tasks are still run under the rules of VCAA and our boys are to be commended for the manner in which they have conducted themselves preparing and completing these tasks.

On the return to school, all boys will be required to fill in and sign the VCAA Authentication Sheet stating that all submitted


work during this time is their own unless properly acknowledged.

The VCAA recently provided advice regarding Unit 4 school-based assessments. We intend to continue to conduct the vast majority of assessments remotely, except those needing to be completed on site due to their practical nature and the facilities required for an authentic assessment.

The very small number of assessments that will be conducted at school will have appropriate timetabling and arrangements to ensure adherence to social distancing measures and all appropriate safety measures will be communicated to relevant students and families well in advance of any scheduled dates.

Important notice: Updated Key Enrolment Dates for Year 5 Students Starting Year 7 in 2022 The original deadline for enrolments for 2022 was Friday 21 August. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Catholic Education Melbourne have extended the enrolment application deadline for Year 5 students in 2020, enrolling in Year 7 in 2022.

If you have a son currently at the College, you are still required to submit an application form for future students. Please contact the office direct on 9468-3304 or email registrar@parade.vic.edu.au to obtain an Information pack.

The timeline of events has been updated to the following:

- 9 October 2020 Closing date for applications to Catholic schools
- 27 November 2020 Offers posted to prospective applicants
- 11 December 2020 Final date for families to accept offer made.

While this change to deadline has now been extended, the annual task of processing enrolment applications and interviewing potential students has commenced based on the original timeline. Early applications are therefore encouraged.

Future student interviews will be conducted using Zoom Video Conferencing. The first block of invitations will be circulated shorty to all Year 7 2022 and Years 8 to 12 2021 applicants, offering appointments times on 26 to 29 August and 1 September, with a second block of interview dates scheduled for November.

Br Peter Cole Scholarship

Applications close 2 October 2020

The Br Peter Cole Scholarship is awarded to prospective 2022 Year 7 students who apply to enrol at Parade College's Preston Campus. The Scholarship honours Br Peter Cole, a former teacher at Parade College and a Christian Brother for almost seventy years. Few, if any, who knew Br Peter Cole would disagree with the judgement that he was unique. His uniqueness was central to his character and embraced the way he did things, the relationships he formed and the goals he set himself. He lived a life that was wholly dedicated to others and was based on the loving principles he imbibed from his family and his Christian faith.

Born in Richmond, Br Peter and his family moved to Preston when he was four years old, then regarded as undeveloped bushland. These paddocks were to be the scene of Peter's youthful exploits, excursions down to the river, wrestles and tussles, and especially the games of cricket and football. He never wavered from his commitment as a Christian Brother and sought always to bring compassion, freedom and liberation to the lives of those with whom he lived and met. He gave of himself fully until his death. He was a much loved and loving person whose talents and gifts were shared for the common good.

This scholarship is created to honour a great man and to acknowledge his connection to the Preston area by offering a limited number of academic scholarships for students who would be part of the Altior Program (Gifted and Talented Program) in Year 7 2022 at Preston.

Altior is a challenging program that extends and enriches students in the core subject areas of English, Humanities, Science and Mathematics. It is aimed at enrolled students who have maintained high academic standards and who wish to develop skills of independent learning, teamwork, and leadership. Selection into Altior at Year 7 is via the application form that is available on the Parade College website.

The Scholarship is for a two-year period (Year 7 and Year 8) but will be reviewed at the end of the first year, subject to the stated criteria. When a student is in Year 8, he can apply for a continuing scholarship through the Lou Arthur Memorial Scholarship. The Scholarship will pay for all or half of the tuition fees.

Selection criteria includes:

- Performance in the Scholarship testing program;
- b) student's most recent academic results,
- c) NAPLAN results
- d) Surveys of Year 5 teacher, parent and student

Prefect Retreat 2020

Term 3 is always an exciting time of year, as we see the Year 11s nominating for student leadership positions for the following year. Though slightly different this year, the training program began at the beginning of term and has been enthusiastically attended by thirty-seven exemplary young people. I have been privileged to be part of the Prefect Retreat for the past seven years and can't capture in words what inspirational experiences they have been.

The icing on the cake is having the pleasure of seeing those young people grow into their leadership roles throughout the following year.

On Thursday 20 August, Ms Anne-Marie Morello, Mr Anthony Cicutto and I ran our first Prefect Retreat online! Though it was through a screen, the magic and vision of the young proud Paradians came across as strongly as ever. This will be the group who lead our College in the celebrations of 150 th year. These will be the ones who lead a post-COVID Parade; nimbler, more confident, more imaginative than ever, keeping the dream of Jesus and Edmund alive, thriving and expanding.



The day began with the students sharing stories of memorable leaders from the past. They talked about the ones who they felt knew them personally, who would say hello to them as they passed, who remembered their names. They discussed the ones who made them laugh. The qualities of warmth, friendliness, good humour and inclusion really shone through.

How powerful have the Welcomes to Country been at the football this weekend? The one in Darwin on Friday night, with so many of the local Aboriginal people present and the footballer teams literally coming as visitors, gave me goose bumps! How different our history might have been if the original settlers had taken their shoes off and sat with the Indigenous inhabitants of this land on arrival. On the retreat, Aboriginal man Alex Splitt shared some insights into Welcomes and Acknowledgments of Country. He gave a great analogy: Sometimes you are such good friends with someone that you let yourself into their house and help yourself to their fridge! But most of the time we knock and wait to be invited in. We state our intention and are offered food and care whilst we are there.

Alex is an amazing player of the Yidaki (traditional didgeridoo) and talked about the persistence he needed to get to master the circular breathing necessary to get him to where he is now. Comparing this to leadership, he said that no-on expects excellence at first; it is the *intention* and the *persistence* that are important.

Mr Tom Laverack lead the group in an exploration of this year's theme of *Gospel Spirituality*, reminding us that 'what we love drives the type of leader we will be and what we will fight for'. He discussed Jesus' radical love for his disciples, for all humanity and for all of creation as the bedrock of his leadership and used the example of Jesus washing the disciples' feet at the Last Supper as an example of the kind of leadership Jesus calls us to, out of love.

We also had the great pleasure of Br Damien Price, otherwise known as "Pricey", zooming in from Brisbane. Pricey is a master-storyteller and all-round inspirer! Here are some of his key points:

- Focus on being the best version of ME I can possibly be. If I can be my best ME, that will benefit the greater WE.
- Focus on not WHAT I have become/am becoming, but WHO.
- Be the pebble it is small but sends ripples far; it is small but can create huge annoyance when in your shoe.
- An Edmund Rice person asks questions that some don't want to hear, for example 'who is suffering most in this pandemic and why?'.
- A great leader plants a seed that one day will become a great tree and give shade to people they don't even know.
- A leader NIKES it they just do it!
- An Edmund Rice leader is a person of the heart; a servant to the inner journey.

In the afternoon David Menzies brought the National Gallery of Victoria to us. He discussed art as a "*disrupter* or *disturber* of the way people think", an admirable quality in a leader also, and gave many historical examples of this.

An important part of the session was when David showed the students "The Pioneer". If the student leadership groups at Parade over the years each had a panel to paint, what might theirs look like? What do they want their legacy to be?



The Big Issue is a social enterprise that provides work for people who have experienced homelessness. The magazine is sold on streets all around Australia. There is also a Women's Subscription section and a Community Street Soccer program. Students learned a lot about the causes of homelessness and how the statistics don't match the stereotypes. At The Big Issue they ask 'how can we bring people in from the edges of our society?' As leaders in the Edmund Rice tradition Parade College student leaders will ask themselves the same thing, not just about the wider community, but about who is on the edges of our school.

At the end of the day students responded to one of the following prompts.

- What is an important question the student leadership team of 2021 needs to ask of themselves at the beginning of the year?
- What is staying with me after today?
- Finish this sentence: "I want to be a leader who....."

I hope hearing their answers lifts your spirits and gives you hope.

A question that I would ask the 2021 leadership team is how can we make the year enjoyable?

What can we do that the 2020 student leadership team wasn't able to do due to COVID? I want to be a leader who makes people feel like they fit in, especially as I struggled fitting in for a while in the Parade community during my earlier Parade years

A question I would ask the 2021 leadership team is "how hard are you willing to work for this?"

My actions can affect someone in any way, even if it is something small.

I want to be a leader who can easily connect with my peers but especially those who need help and encourage them to speak out.

At the beginning of 2021 we should all ask 'Are we working hard to become the best selves we can be?'

I want to be a leader who is personable, someone who anyone can come up to and say g'day regardless of year level, likes, dislikes, etc. I also want to be a leader who makes a positive and lasting change so that we aren't forgotten just because 2021 is over.

Be a pebble. When I enter a new situation, I can create ripples that will create a domino effect and hopefully help people in a positive way.

A question I would ask is "What is it we want to achieve as the leadership team in 2021 and how will this benefit the community?"

To be good leaders we need to plant seeds and grow and develop as individuals.

The leader I want be is a leader who strives for the best for those around me. I want to be a leader who changes things for the better. I want to be a leader who is looked up to and respected by my peers. I want to be leader who leaves a lasting effect upon Parade College.

Today I learnt that to be a good leader you need to have compassion, with compassion being not an action but an understanding of someone's experiences and listening to them with an open mind.



I want to be a leader who makes a difference and a change within the community and ensures that everyone gets an equal opportunity to pursue what they love, no matter what setbacks may face them.

An important question the leadership team of 2021 needs to ask themselves is how can we "plant a seed" that leads to great impact in Parade and the wider community?

"How can we work together to make 2021 the best year we possibly can?"

Firstly, as a group we need to identify a change we want to create; and once identified - how can we plant the seeds that will one day grow into a tree that provides shade for people who we may never know?

How can we make ourselves better? How can we make those around us better? How can we improve morale and improve others around us?

How will the leadership team cope post COVID, potentially going in and out of lock down?

I want to be a leader who is a strong, compassionate one who helps guide younger year levels and helps promote positivity and inclusiveness. I want to try my best to plant a seed to enable a legacy to grow and stem after next year for future leaders of Parade to follow, in not only my footsteps but all our footsteps, in coming years. I want us to be the prefect group that will be remembered.

I want to be a leader who is determined and confident and resilient and I want to be a leader to check up on people and see how they are going.




We hope this brings a little bit of musical joy to our Parade community during these challenging times.

Old Paradian Pays Tribute To Jack Ryan

The Old Paradians' Association has been notified of the passing of a former student of the College Jack Ryan (1944). The following tribute to Jack has been paid by his friend and fellow Old Paradian Patrick Whitehouse (1961).



Jack Ryan was born in 1930, one of four children to Patrick and Anne Ryan. He was raised in Northcote - an area with which he was associated for most of his life.

Jack was schooled at CBC East Melbourne, but left in wartime in 1944 - as did a number of young men in those years.

He took up an apprenticeship in panel beating and eventually opened his own panel shop in Westgarth which he managed until his retirement when he turned his mind to other interests.

In 1970, Jack married Dorothy McKenna - a local Northcote lass - and they were together until she passed away in 2019.

For many years after Jack's departure from the panel beating profession, he and Dorothy turned their interests to the hotel industry. Together they owned and managed several outlets over a number of years.

Following his loss of Dorothy, Jack experienced a period of illhealth which gradually intensified until his passing on July 29. He was 90 years of age. Jack was a good and loyal friend remembered by family and friends particularly his sister-in- law Kate and her husband Peter.

OP Named New State Sport Centres Trust Chair

Chris Jackson, a final year Parade College student of 1978, and the founder of the Old Paradians Football Club's longtime major sponsor Accurate Financial Consultants, has been named incoming chair of the State Sport Centres Trust.

Victorian Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events Martin Pakula this week confirmed the appointment of Chris, a finance expert, to oversee the Trust, which is responsible for governing the Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre (MSAC), the State Netball Hockey Centre and Lakeside Stadium.



"I'm honoured to have been given the opportunity to lead one of our state's most respected sporting organisations," Chris said.

"It's a challenging time for the Trust and all Victorians and I look forward to making a positive contribution to ensure a bright future for our centres and our patrons." Chris has wide experience across the finance sector, including serving as chair of Private Banking Service, a franchise of Bendigo and Adelaide Bank. As founder of Accurate, he built the established tax consulting firm into an Australian and international concern.

He replaces Brett Moore as Trust chair for a three-year term, commencing September 1. Joining him as a member of the Trust is former Victorian senator Michael Ronaldson. "Chris Jackson and Michael Ronaldson bring vast amounts of financial and legal expertise to the State Sport Centres Trust," Minister Pakula said.

"He Was True To The Call" – Tributes Paid To Fr Wheeler

The late Fr Michael Wheeler, a final year student of Parade College in 1954 and the founding parish priest of St Justin's Church in Wheeler's Hill, has been remembered with affection by those with whom he shared close ties for many decades.


News of Fr Wheeler's recent passing at the age of 82 was conveyed by an old College contemporary, Fr Brian Glasheen, who shared his recollections of a friendship first forged almost 70 years ago.

"We both met up in 1952 when we were classmates in Proficiency at the 'Old Bluestone Pile' in East Melbourne. We were together in subsequent years - 1953 in Intermediate and 1954 in Leaving," Fr Glasheen said this week.

"Mick was a handy footballer. He was part of Parade's 1st XVIII team of 1954, which also included Sergio Silvagni and John Benetti, and he may also have represented the College in cricket. He also represented Alphington YCW for many years.

"I think Mick left after Leaving and became a Customs Officer, while I carried on and did Matriculation in 1955."

But the Old Paradians' pathways would again cross almost ten years later.



"We met up again on 29 February 1964 on the first day of the new year at Corpus Christi Werribee . . . and together we were ordained on 22 May 1971 at St Patrick's Cathedral, East Melbourne."

Picking up on this story was Bishop Terry Curtin, who delivered the homily at Fr Wheeler's recent Requiem Mass at St Justin's.

"Mick and I met for the first time at Corpus Christi College in 1964 . . . to start our studies and preparation for the priesthood," Bishop Curtin said in a live webcast of the mass.

"There were so many of us that we had to share rooms for the first two years and he and I were placed together - me, 18, naive and straight from school, and him, 26, coming from full-time work as state secretary of the YCW.

"The move to the seminary and its then monastic routines was not easy. I saw some of that in the length of time Mick spent kneeling beside his bed at the end of the day. At times I found myself thinking, 'Come on, Mick, get into bed!'.

Bishop Curtin also reinforced Fr Glasheen's observations of Fr Wheeler's football prowess.

"He was a good footballer, a rover darting in and out of the pack in games that certainly weren't for sissies! In later years, he paid the price for this with hip and knee replacements, several times over," Bishop Curtin said.

"Archbishop Mark Coleridge recalls his favourite memory of 'Wheels' as a footy coach for a Theo-Phil match when the theologians played against the philosophers. There was one half-time when we (Theology) were well down and Mick was giving us a blast. Brian Glasheen then appeared with a tray of cups of tea . . . you should have seen the look on Mick's face and heard the blast he gave 'Glash' . . . who then beat a very hasty retreat! (*Sorry, Glash, but that had to be told!*)."

Ordained in 1971, Bishop Curtin recalled that Fr Wheeler, Fr Glasheen and himself were "children of the Second Vatican Council".

"In the words of the Council, 'The joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the people of our time, especially of those who are poor or afflicted, are the joys and hopes, the grief and anguish of the followers of Christ as well. Nothing that is genuinely human fails to find an echo in their hearts'. Eleven of us remain still active in that ministry," Bishop Curtin said.

"After ordination the appointments as assistant priest were not always easy, but there were constants that remained throughout coming from his experience and continued involvement with the YCW. The picture of Cardinal Cardijn hung on his wall and there were the continuing bonds of friendship with those who had been with him in the YCW.

"The regular reunions, the New Year's Eve party down Dromana way were all important. The mark of his ministry was that he had a heart for people. People mattered and they had a dignity and worth that was to be protected and encouraged. And so they found their way to him and they were not forgotten. You as family were important to him and I know chocolates and generous gifts made their way south with him on any visit to 'Tassie'."

Then there was Wheelers Hill and Fr Wheeler's appointment as the founding parish priest of St Justin's Parish.

"Someone asked me the other day, 'Was Wheelers Hill named after he went there?'. No, but there surely was some humour in appointing a priest named Wheeler to Wheelers Hill," Bishop Curtin said. "At the start there was a small school, a block of land for a church and presbytery and Michael lived up the road in a small unit. He brought to the task a pastor's zeal and enjoyed the challenge. He was practical and hands on. He also brought to Wheelers Hill his own special gifts; look around and you see them.

"The banner behind the altar has the parish emblem, which surprise, surprise, was also the YCW emblem! Nazareth College, the regional college for the area, was to be established and his support was constant. The presbytery has a large dining room, not for a personal palace, but because it was important to be able to offer hospitality joyfully and generously. 'Pasta with the Pastor' was a way to build the parish as a community."

Bishop Curtin also noted Fr Wheeler's capacity to encourage the young.

"There will be some watching who remember great trips north along the east coast of Australia. He would still tell stories of those times and was always pleased when paths crossed in later years," Bishop Curtin said.

"On one of our holidays up north above Cairns we had a big search among the tourist souvenirs at Kuranda to find a sign saying 'Downunder'; and we did. This was to go on the door of the big room under the presbytery which was for the young people of the parish and youth activities.

The presbytery was also a place to welcome seminarians, especially those from overseas who lacked a place to stay during the holidays; though he did discover on one occasion that phone calls home to Myanmar were expensive! Young priests have told me of his ready acceptance and encouragement.

As one of our young Vietnamese parish priests said to me, 'He was inclusive'."

Mick enjoyed being a priest of the archdiocese, in sharing the company of other priests "and regularly turning up to whatever was on" according to Bishop Curtin.

"There was also a quick wit and sense of humour that he liked to use to keep you on your toes; he loved listening to The Goons," Bishop Curtin said. When retirement came to Fr Wheeler, Justin Villa, according to Bishop Curtin, was first seen as a stepping stone until he could find a parish where he could best assist.

"The frustration came with his state of health stopping him from being active and doing things," he said. "It was important to him when he was able to again celebrate Mass at Justin Villa and be the main celebrant, remarking to me, 'I think I'm the only one left standing!'.

"To come back to our gospel. Michael Wheeler accepted the call, remained true to it, and lived that ministry of mercy in over forty-nine years of faithful service. All this, of course, brings hope and numbers him and us among those who long for the Lord's coming, our Saviour who rose from the dead.

"In faith we look forward, not backward. Thomas Merton, the Cistercian monk, put it this way, 'I think today it's more important for us to so let God live in us that others may feel God and come to believe in God because they feel how God lives in us'.

That's what I saw in Mick. In God's love and mercy may that life now flourish to the full in Michael Wheeler, good and faithful priest of the archdiocese of Melbourne."


