
From the Principal

Last Friday was a difficult day for a number of our community that suffered damage to homes and businesses and interruption of power and other utilities. Whilst the College had some fallen tree branches, it did not affect our operation other than some of the transport options for students in the morning were interrupted. I know in speaking with colleagues, there were a number of schools that were not able to open because of the storm damage. It certainly adds further complications to an already very challenging year.

Remembrance

With all the hype around the relaxation of COVID restrictions and the safe observance of Halloween, it could be forgotten that Monday 1 November was All Saints' Day, a solemn and holy day, dedicated to all those who have died and attained heaven. Yesterday was All Souls' Day when we remember those who have died but have not yet reached heaven. November, then, becomes the Church's month of remembrance when we are invited to and pray in a particular way for those we have known and loved but who are no longer with us. The saints intercede for all of us, but sometimes the Church encourages certain people to turn to certain saints for special intercession. We call them patron saints, and they can be named officially by a Pope or unofficially by any group that wants to seek the protection of a particular saint. A saint can be patron of a diocese, such as Melbourne (St Patrick), a country, such as Australia (Mary of the Cross MacKillop), a profession, such as dentists No. 19 3 November 2021

(St Apollonia), an animal, such as cats (St Gertrude of Nivelles), groups or classes of people, such as expectant mothers (St Elizabeth), protection from threats, such as cancer (St Peregrine Laziosi) and of our College (Mary, Mother of God and Blessed Edmund Rice). It is not our faith that patron saints keep bad things from ever happening to us. We do believe, however, that they help us face the difficult challenges of life.



Next week we celebrate Remembrance Day at the College at both campuses. In the four years of the First World War more than 330,000 Australians had served overseas, and more than 60,000 of them had died. Over the long weekend, I reread the book published recently With Hearts and Courage written by Maureen De Bolfo, the mother of the Executive Officer of the Old Paradians, Tony De Bolfo, who edited the book. At the start of the war, Parade College was forty-three years young, and the Honour Board in the Hickey Foyer pays tribute to the number of Old Paradians that served in the War and those that paid the ultimate price. Parade College was not untouched, with almost 200 former students of the 'Old Bluestone Pile' known to have bravely answered their nation's call. *With Hearts and Courage* honours the memory of the thirty-three amongst their ranks who gave their tomorrows for our today... and one who made it home. *With Hearts and Courage* has been added to the Year 9 Booklist and is studied by our boys as part of their Humanities syllabus. I commend the book to you, it is available from the Old Paradians' Association.

In this time, when we remember all those gone before us, I offer this prayer:

For the life that was in the beginning and is now thanks be to you, O God. For the life that is now and will alwavs be thanks be to you. For those who have gone before me and the men and women of every nation, for the vitality of children and earth's life-forms still to be born thanks be to vou. In this great river of life that flows behind me and before me let me know that I am carried by you. In this great river of life that flows around me and through me let me know that I carry you and can reverence you in all that has life.

Return to Onsite Learning

After a staggered return to onsite learning, the College had begun to pulse again with a renewed sense of energy and enthusiasm.

Today, all year levels were to return. Unfortunately there was a small spike in positive cases amongst some Year 8 students at the Bundoora Campus. On advice from DHHS and Melbourne Archdiocesan Catholic Schools, we have moved Year 8 students at Bundoora to remote learning until the end of the week, NB: for Year 8 students at Bundoora Campus only. The importance of study and the reality of examinations has come home to us as well, with the examination period continuing now for our Year 12 VCE students through to 17 November. Students completing the Year 12 VCAL programs, both at Preston and Bundoora have been busy completing competencies. I commend all the Year 12s on their attitude and discipline. I am in awe and gratitude for their resilience and maturity.

On Wednesday 10 November the Year 11s begin their exams, with the remaining secondary classes commencing formal assessments in the second half of November.

Under the patronage of Mary and Edmund Rice, I pray that we are fully operational again from Monday.



VCAA Examinations Unit 3 and 4

Final exams commenced last week and it was great to see the smiling faces as the boys exited the Greening Auditorium at the completion of their examination.

As we prepare for the remaining exams it is worth noting that teachers are available to meet students for revision in their usual timetabled periods in the Treacy Pavilion and at other times by appointment.

A reminder that neat casual clothes are to be worn for the exams with all permitted materials clearly listed in the VCAA Exam Navigator: <u>https://www.vcaa.vic.edu.au/Documents/</u><u>Navigator/VCEExamsNavigator2021.pdf</u>

Students should be at the College at least 30 minutes prior to their scheduled start time and be in the usual exam assembly area in Westcourt walk 15 minutes prior to the start

We wish all our students the very best with their final preparations and completion of their exams.

Year 11 Unit 2 VCE Examinations - 10 to 18 November

Unit 2 coursework completion and final examination preparations for the VCE Unit 2 examinations should be uppermost in the minds of Year 11 and accelerating Year 10 students at this time as formal Unit 2 VCE classes conclude next Tuesday.

Year 11 VCE students are only required to attend school to sit their examinations until 18 November. Full Summer College uniform is required. Supervised study halls will be operating for students choosing to remain at school outside their scheduled examination times.

Year 7 to 10 Program

Due to the large amount of face-to-face learning lost this year, Year 7 to 10 students will continue their coursework up to 18 November. Some Year 10 subjects and a small number of Year 8 and 9 subjects (listed in Student News) will conduct semester tests from 8 November.

2022 Commencement Days -22 November to 3 December

Friday 19 November is a student-free day for report finalisation. The 2022 commencement program will take place in the final two weeks of the school year for students.

Booklist Orders for the 2022 Academic Year

Current Year 7 to 11 students will receive their provisional subject allocations for 2022 this Friday 5 November. They will also receive their booklists for 2022 subjects and accompanying letter explaining the procedure for online ordering. Year 11 and 12 (2022) students' subjects are conditional on successful completion of this year's academic program.

Parents should take careful note of the submission dates for booklist orders. Timelines for VCE students are narrow so that delivery can occur in time for students to have their novels and texts by 22 November.

In order to minimise the risk of spread of infection, home delivery will again be the only option available for the distribution of all books.

All English novels for Years 8 to 10 (2022) are also timed for delivery in early December so students can commence their holiday reading. Delivery of all other orders will be in late January.



Year 7 to 9 PAT Maths and PAT Reading Testing

During the week of Monday 8 November to Thursday 11 November (Week 6) all students in Years 7 to 9 will participate in ACER Progressive Achievement Tests for Mathematics (PAT-M) and English (PAT-R). The tests are designed to provide information to teachers about student skills and understandings in a range of key areas. Students do not need to study for these tests.

The College believes the data obtained from ACER testing should not be used in isolation when making judgments about a student's needs or ability but should form part of a broader range of information available about each student to his teachers.

To reduce disruption, the test date and the lesson the test will occur in will be at the discretion of your son's English and Mathematics teachers to choose within the test week.

NAPLAN School Readiness Test (SRT)

A reminder that Year 7 and 9 students will be participating in the NAPLAN school readiness test on Wednesday 17 November during periods 1 and 2. The SRT is designed to test the school's capacity to conduct NAPLAN Online in 2022.

Student results or data is not collected and not reported on.

As the tests will be conducted on student laptops, it is important that each student has fully charged their device and brings along headphones.

STEM Games Finalist

Congratulations to Harry James, Year 8 L12, pictured below, for his submission to the ACER STEM Games Competition for 2021, where his game, "Scale 'em Up" made it through three rounds of judging to the finalists' stage.



The STEM Games Competition is run yearly, and students from across Australia compete by creating video games that respond to a theme. This year's theme was "Scale", which challenged students to develop games that made best use of the theme within a playable, and fun, video game. Harry used the GODOT Game Engine to develop the game, employing different programming languages to animate and control 2D and 3D objects. "

Scale 'em Up" involved carefully navigating corridors where enemies would appear, and using the ability to shrink and grow, doge past foes until reaching the end of each level. Harry worked tirelessly on the game, spending many lunch times checking his code and using remote learning as a good opportunity to refine his game.

Harry should be commended for his effort, as well as the assistance he gave others in the many weeks of development.

We're sure he'll continue to have success in coding, and we look forward to another great entry in 2022!

From the Assistant Principal - Student Wellbeing

It was wonderful to welcome all our students back throughout last week. We know the last few months have been challenging and it was encouraging to see students so excited to be back onsite (even if it meant the morning get up was a little earlier).

Face Masks

Face masks are still mandatory in classrooms and on public transport, so please ensure for the safety of your son and others that he always has a mask with him when leaving the house, and that you have conversations around the importance of this expectation.

School TV

In the last newsletter I shared the new platform of support for parents which the College has provided - School TV. This week I share the overview of a video parents can watch from Dr Emma Woodward, Child and Adolescent Psychologist in managing overwhelm in our young people.

Special Report: Managing Overwhelm

Willingly or not, we have all been exposed to a piece of bad news that has lingered in our thoughts for days afterwards. This seems to be more common in the current environment than ever before. Due to the pandemic, the world we now live in is a very different place, so it is easy to see why we might feel impacted.

It can often seem like there are many stressful events occurring simultaneously, and the hyperconnected nature of our environment means we are constantly being reminded of the challenges we face via numerous media and social media channels. Our connectivity to the digital world exposes us to a barrage of messages that can often leave us feeling overwhelmed.

It is therefore important for children and parents alike, to consciously and intentionally learn good wellbeing strategies. Unfortunately, our brains have not evolved fast enough to adapt to the digital landscape we find ourselves in and this often leaves us feeling overwhelmed and can result in increased levels of stress and anxiety. If left untreated or unmanaged, constant stress and anxiety can lead to a number of behavioural issues or health consequences.

The blueprint for parenting, based on our own experiences, is no longer fit for purpose in raising kids as citizens of tomorrow. The combination of constant access to information and having little control over the situations presented, can be stressful and overwhelming.

Although we can't provide our kids with certainty, we can provide them with the skills and strategies to cope to enable them to flourish and thrive, socially, emotionally and academically. It may not necessarily be the information itself that is harmful, but more their inability to process and make sense of it.

2021 Annual Year 7 and Year 8 Spelling Challenges

Throughout Term 3, Year 7 and 8 English classes focused on spelling. Towards the end of the term, students from both Year levels had the opportunity to hone their skills in a week of spelling activities set on Education Perfect. During this week, thousands of words were repeatedly spelled, as the students learnt how to spell words even adults struggle with such as acquisition, annihilates and embarrassed.

The Grand Final event challenged the competitors' speed and accuracy in identifying and correcting spelling mistakes in sentences. In what was a difficult task, the following students were the top three place-getters from each year level.

Year 7 Winners

Year 8 Winners

1st place: Aran Visakan (T18) 2nd place: Arjun Srinivasan (B18) 3rd place: Sehaj Pal Singh (H20) Being the best spellers in the junior years, the students have a word of advice on why spelling is important and how we can improve our spelling.

"Good spelling helps to avoid confusion. It can be difficult to understand what someone means if they haven't paid attention to writing correctly. Incorrect spelling can even lead to serious mistakes being made - just think how grave the consequences could be if a doctor or nurse misspelled a patient's notes." – Majesty Adeyemi, Yr 7 B20

"Spelling is important because it is one of the most essential components in successful writing. Given that spelling, reading, writing and comprehension skills are closely linked, having a robust vocabulary and being confident in one's spelling ability will lead to confidence in all other aspects of literacy." – Aran Visakan, Yr 8 T18

"Spelling is important because you can increase your vocabulary and it helps you become better readers and writers as well as increases your understanding of the language used in a text. The best way to improve at spelling is to practise it and try your best to memorize tricky words so that it is easier for you to remember them during a test or competition." — **Nilaansh Kumar, Yr 7 L17**

"The best way to improve at spelling is to read regularly, as you learn from seeing the actual words. Turning on subtitles when watching movies is also effective. Think of creative ways to remember those tricky words. For example, to remember that the word parallel has double I's - I think of it as two parallel lines. For handkerchief, remember you need your hand to use a handkerchief." – David Scanlon, Yr 7 H17

"I enjoyed this spelling challenge as it was very competitive and intense. Spelling is important as it is one of the main components in writing. New 2022 Charter Bus Route B & B2

Who will this affect:

- All students on the 2022 Route B Charter Bus
- All new students who applied for Charter Route B for 2022
- All students from Watsonia, Rosanna, View Bank, Lower Plenty, Diamond Creek and Eltham

Currently there is high demand for Charter Route B, which exceeds the bus capacity. Route B will be different next year.

The new route B2 is confirmed to include Eltham Station and cater for students from Eltham to Diamond Creek, including students who previously caught the route B bus at Diamond Creek Swimming Pool.

The route may be extended to include Watsonia Station and bus stops in Rosanna, Viewbank and Lower Plenty, if the College receives enough applications.

Students who caught the B bus this year or who have applied for route B next year, must compare both the 2022 version of route B and the new route B2.

The price for the both route B and B2 is currently \$317 per term.

What to do:

2022 route B is light orange (beginning at BP Eltham). New route B2 is dark orange


If your bus stop is not affected by the change and you are happy with your selection of route B for 2022 you do not need to do anything.

From the Director of High Performance Sport

2022 ACC High Performance Sport Classes – Years' 8 to 10

The subject selection process for choosing High Performance is closed. Listed below are some questions and responses that may assist in the understanding how ACC High Performance is conducted at the College.

How does a student get into an ACC High Performance Class?

When selecting subjects for 2022, students who wish to play either football or soccer must select ACC High Performance – Semester 1 as part of their subject selection.

Students wishing to play either Basketball, Table Tennis, Hockey, Cricket Tennis or Volleyball must select ACC High Performance Semester 2 as part of their subject selection.

If a student wishes to play a sport in Semester 1 and 2 then they must selection ACC High Performance – Semesters' 1 and 2.

Please note – whilst a student may select to do ACC High Performance Sport, this does not guarantee them a position in the class. The number of students wishing to be involved in the subject is far greater than the number of positions available and as a consequence, students are selected into the subject based on a combination of some or all of the following criteria;

- Previous ACC involvement and performance
- Involvement and performance in regular Physical Education classes
- · General behaviour and ability to demonstrate mutual respect to fellow students and staff
- Performance at selection trials (indication of intention to tryout – Forms survey filled out)
- Ability to uphold the school's discipline and uniform policy
- Performance in local sporting competitions Selection is completed annually
- For 2022 selections further information via the Forms survey

Being involved in an ACC High Performance class at one specific year level does not guarantee selection in the following year. Selection is based on the criteria listed above.

This process allows developing students who may have missed selection in one year, an opportunity to be involved in the following year.

Students who are not involved in an ACC sport in a current year, but would like to be considered for an ACC team for the following year, must attend ACC Trials as listed above.

Does involvement in an ACC High Performance class guarantee selection into a team?

No. If a student is selected into an ACC High Performance class, then they are part of a specific sporting squad. Selection for all ACC teams will then come from these specific squads.

Students who aren't selected in the final team will be involved in a Physical Education practical class during ACC matches.

What does my son do if he is not in an ACC High Performance Class?

ACC High Performance is a timetabled subject, selection into these classes must coincide with the Subject Selection process in August.

To accommodate the potential development of students not selected into a 2022 High Performance class and provide the opportunity to try out for a 2022 ACC team, additional trials for all ACC Sports will occur as follows –

Football and Soccer

will occur midway in Term 1 202

Basketball, Table Tennis and Hockey will occur midway in Term 2 2022

Tennis, Volleyball and Cricket

will occur midway in Term 3 2022

Any student identified at these trials as possible members of an ACC team will be given the opportunity to play some games. Students not involved in an ACC High Performance Class at Years' 8 or 9 will be involved in regular Physical Education classes.

Student in Year 10 who are not involved in an ACC High Performance class would select another elective.

High Performance Classes are also offered at the Preston campus; however, trials are not required.

From The Old Paradians

How One OP Pushed Through The Pandemic

Dale Martin, a graduate of Parade College in 2005, is a passionate environmentalist who's led a number of successful campaigns throughout Victoria. Five years ago, he was pictured at the footsteps of State Parliament carrying a petition with 11,600 signatures to ban single use plastic bags at the checkout.



Dale, who holds a Bachelor of Economics and Finance from RMIT, and Masters in Energy Systems from Melbourne University, served as one of Victoria's youngest Councillors. In addition to being an elected as Councillor of Moreland City Council between 2016-2020, he has worked across private and public organisations advising on environmental policy and programs.

The pandemic hasn't thwarted Dale's commitment to the cause either. In November last year, he penned the 'Local Government Climate Emergency Toolkit' - a resource for local government councillors and community members who want to take meaningful climate action in their community – and in the past six months he's completed approximately forty presentations nationwide on the environmental subject. The following is Dale's story, in which he reflects on his time at the College and offers sage advice to today's students:

Let me paint a picture for you of myself in Year 7 entering high school.

I was tall, lanky and quiet. My teachers would tell you I was average at sports but good at maths. On reflection, I was lucky to have teachers who could see my potential, even if I could not.

When I was caught daydreaming or talking in class, rather than disciplining me, my teachers had the fortitude to see my potential. In Year 9 I was encouraged to study a year ahead through the accelerated maths program. By studying Year 10 maths I started to develop my confidence in myself and my abilities. I still rely on the math skills I learnt at school when completing environmental analysis at work.

In Year 12 I was encouraged to apply to be a Prefect. I remember being so shocked that my teachers thought I could do it. Public speaking was a key requirement for the role of College Events Prefect, and like all quiet kids, public speaking was my worst nightmare.

I have memories of forgetting lines, turning bright red and my voice breaking when I had to speak in front of the class or at school assembly. But sure enough, my teachers had seen something in me I had not, and I fell in love with running fundraisers, organising the formal and MCing events. This is funny to reflect on now, because I had to speak publicly almost every week for four years as a Councillor.

These key events helped me develop my identity, including a sense of leadership and responsibility.

I am the first in my family to go to University, and because of this I put a lot of pressure on myself to succeed. University can be daunting when no-one else in your family has ever been, but it forced me to do a lot of things that I wouldn't have otherwise done, such as studying overseas.

In the final year of my Masters in Energy Systems, I went on exchange to Lund University in Sweden. Sweden is ahead of the game when it comes to environmental sustainability. In 1991 it was one of the first countries to introduce a tax on carbon.

It was here I realised the economy and the environment didn't have to compete. It is also where I got serious about protecting the environment for future generations.

I returned to Australia in 2015 and brought the lessons I had learnt from Sweden with me. I started the campaign 'Plastic Bag Free Victoria' to phase out lightweight single use plastic bags at the checkout.

Campaigning is hard work, but with a small team, we were able to secure 11,600 physical signatures on a petition to "Ban the Bag". This resulted in a state-wide inquiry into plastic pollution and the subsequent Victorian ban on lightweight plastic bags at the checkout in 2019.

One of my favourite quotes is from Alice Walker who once said, "Activism is my rent for living on the planet." I am proud that my activism has saved millions of tonnes of littered plastic from entering our oceans and ecosystems each year.

My journey in environmental activism didn't stop at the plastic bag. During my term as Councillor, I continued to advocate for a range of environmental initiatives. As a result, Moreland City Council declared a Climate Emergency and through its policies and programs is taking active steps to address this. Some of the policies and programs I have been involved in include: the introduction of an electric vehicle policy, source separated recycling, environmental design in planning, sustainable food systems, pedestrian and cycling improvements, creating new parks and planting tens of thousands of trees.

After my term as Councillor, I know how important it is to have good young leaders in politics. As one of Victoria's

youngest politicians, I brought a unique perspective and I know the decisions I made during my term will still being making an impact in fifty years' time.

My advice for Parade students wanting to advocate for a cause important to them would be to:

- Learn to communicate: successful advocacy relies on good communications skills. Practice them whenever you can, no matter how much of a nightmare it may seem.
- Say "Yes": when your teachers present you with an opportunity, it's because they believe you can do it. Believe them and say "yes" you never know where it will lead.
- Stand up for your beliefs: we are very lucky to live in a country with a strong democracy. Write and call your local politicians on issues you care about.
- Choose a career in politics: while we often hear about the bad things in politics, there is also so much good happening. It's a rewarding job where you can help the entire community.
