

From the Principal

As we approach the end of November, we are closer to Advent, the season in which Christians wait and prepare for the celebration that commemorates the birth of Jesus Christ and ask the Spirit for the gift of gentle *defiance*.

Christmas arrives to find that our health can be precarious, our studies or jobs under stress, our finances dipping badly, and in times of drought the threat of bushfires. How can we celebrate Christmas in situations like these? Isn't the only realistic response anxiety and gloom?

When the outer world is darkness, barrenness, and rejection, Advent is a lesson in bringing forth and responding to the inner world of light, greenness, and kindness. Our Tradition teaches us that since this inner world is rooted in a transcendent love, it is more powerful than all the attacks that emerge out of both our finitude and sinfulness. "I have said this that you might have peace in me. In the world you have tribulations, but cheer up, I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). Christmas cheer, when it is modelled on this passage from John, engenders in us a gentle defiance to the tribulations of the world. Gentle defiance is not on the standard list of Christian virtues, but it is the Advent gift that we all need to unwrap at one November/December or another.

Br Denis is also in this time of waiting: recuperating from illness. He would dearly love this healing time to end, so he can return to Parade College and complete his 25th year as

Principal of Parade College. But he trusts that he is in God's healing hands and knows that it will take time. He continues to appreciate the Parade community's thoughts and prayers. The College will gather on Wednesday 4th December for a farewell assembly to acknowledge and express gratitude for a life of prophetic servant leadership.

Our Year 10, 11 and 12 students have completed their exams. This week the Years 8 and 9 students are completing their examinations and details have been issued about their camp/ activities program for next week.

Friday 22 November is a student-free day for all students, except for Year 10 (Work Experience) and 11 students (Year 12 Headstart Camp).


Having placed first in the Regional competition, Zachary was invited to compete at State level on 19 October against another twelve students from across Victoria.

From the Director of High Performance Sport

Selection In High Performance In 2020

Subject selection has been completed for 2020 High Performance classes at Year 8, 9 and 10 and letters have been sent home to those that have unfortunately missed out.

As ACC High Performance is a timetable subject, selection into these classes has to coincide with the Subject Selection process in August. To accommodate the potential development of students not selected into a 2020 High Performance class and provide the opportunity to try out for a 2020 ACC team, additional trials for all ACC Sports are as follows –

- Football and Soccer will occur midway in Term 1 2020.
- Basketball, Table Tennis and Hockey will occur midway in Term 2 2020
- Volleyball, Tennis and Cricket trials will occur midway through Term 3 2020

Any student identified at these trials as possible members of an ACC team will be given the opportunity to play some games. In addition, students wishing to improve their skills and enhance their chances for future ACC selection should involve themselves in the Sports Development Program. Focusing on all ACC sports, this two-week program (per sport) will generally occur on a Tuesday and Thursday after school until 4.30pm and run throughout the year.

Melbourne City Junior Soccer Tournament

The ACC Year 7 and 8A Soccer squads had three early morning training sessions on Bunjil Park to select a squad of sixteen to participate in the Melbourne City cup run at LaTrobe on Wednesday 6 November 2019.

There were five Year 7s in the squad, a reflection of their Premiership winning ACC season.

Parade's first game on the day was against Overnewton College No 2 team. Parade dominated the possession and



ran out 2-0 winners thanks to goals from Captain Anthony Greco (Yr8, T13) and midfielder Damian De Bortoli (Yr8, T18).

Due to our fixture requirements our second game was ten minutes later against a much tougher team from Trinity College. A sloppy start from Parade gifted a couple of early goals to Trinity and nearing half time the boys were losing 3-0 and looking down and out. A goal just before the break from Francesco Gargaro (Yr8, B16) gave the team a glimmer of hope, kicking with the wind, in the second half.

After the break the boys were looking very determined and put Trinity under constant pressure. Eventually the goals came with Anthony Greco scoring twice more, as well as goals from Gianluca Gatto (Yr8, T11) and Brandon Micallef (Yr8, H13).

Suddenly Parade were 5-3 up. It took some brilliant saves from Goal Keeper Liam Kikidopoulos (Yr8, T14) and Parade had won a remarkable game 5-3.

The boys were confident about the semi final against Rowville Secondary College, however the game was three hours away due to fixturing. The semi was a disappointment as the boys didn't have any real spark. They battled on but lost 3-0 to a superior team.

It was an excellent experience for the boys and an eye opener to see the great range of Soccer talent from schools we don't usually play against. Thanks to all the boys who tried out for the team and to those boys that played on the day.

Cricket Academy

The Parade College Cricket Academy has concluded after running for five weeks for selected Year 7 boys. They were coached by Mr Dulip Liyange who represented Sri Lanka in 9 Test Matches, 16 One Day Internationals and 123 First Class Matches.



Victorian All Schools Athletics Championships

The following students have competed at the Victorian All Schools Athletics Championships over the past month. There have been some fantastic individual performances:

Andrew Howe (Year 12, T03) had an extremely successful competition, winning two gold medals and a silver medal. He competed in the Under 18 100m, running 11.19s in the heat and 11.17s in the final which won him the Gold Medal. In the Under 18 200m Andrew ran 22.61s in the heat and 22.51s in the final which won him the Gold Medal. In the Under 18 400m he ran 53.03s in the heat and 51.04s in the final to win the Silver Medal.

Thomas Reynolds (Year 9, B21) competed in the Under 15 400m, running 59.25s in the heat and 56.50s in the final. Thomas won the Bronze medal for this event. He also competed in the Under 16 200m where he ran 23.97s and finished 9th. A great championship.

Bailey Cumming (Year 8, B16) competed in the Under 15 Discus, throwing 22.11m and finishing 8th.

Samuel Abolencia (Year 8, H15) competed in the Under 15 Discus, throwing 27.64m and finishing 7th. He also competed in the Under 15 200m where he ran 26.45s and finished 17th.

Lachlan Reynolds (Year 7, B20) competed in the Under 16 400m, running 55.63s and finishing 9th.

NEW! Instrumental Class Band Program for Year 7's and 8's

In 2020 Parade College is excited to offer a new Instrumental Music Class designed for Junior Musicians to receive small group instrumental music lessons and participate in an ensemble for the cost of instrument hire and textbook charge.

This offer is open to ALL current year 7 students.

Students will attend a weekly group instrumental music lesson with a specialist instrumental teacher (run during school hours on a rotating timetable) to develop their musical skill on their instrument.

They attend a weekly ensemble rehearsal where students will play and learn valuable ensemble playing skills with the other musicians in the program.

Students work through a set band class text (included in the price of the instrument hire and be provided with a hire instrument to use in class and home studies.)

The cost of the program is \$400 for the year (this covers instrument hire and band method book - \$12.50 per lesson for 32 lessons, 16 per semester)

Students commit to the program for the year with a nonrefundable enrolment and sign an Instrument Hire Agreement form for the care of the instrument loaned.






From The Old Paradians

Inaugural Parade Preparatory Principal Bill Clohesy Dies

William ('Bill') Clohesy, formerly Brother WL Clohesy the founding Principal of the now-defunct Parade Preparatory College in Alphington, has died in Adelaide at the age of 94.



When the gates of the Flowerdale campus were formally opened on 3 February 1953, Bill took charge of one hundred and ten students, with the assistance of Brother Dyball and two lay teachers Mr. Ivor Davis and Mrs. V. Mills.

Brother Naughtin, in his tome *The Parade Story*, noted that when Archbishop Mannix solemnly blessed and opened the College on 15 March of that year, "for the time being the Brothers lived in East Melbourne, since a section of the residence had to be used for school purposes until a new school block could be built".

At Parade, Bill served as Principal whilst fulfilling his role as teacher to students of Years 5, 7 and 8. In 1956, he was appointed Superior of the Community for what would be a six-year term – after which he accepted the Principalship of St Virgil's Preparatory College in Austin's Ferry, Hobart.

On leaving the Brotherhood in Hobart, Bill met and married a widow with seven children. Not long after, he accepted the position of Deputy Director of Catholic Education in Adelaide. A notice, placed in Adelaide's *The Advertiser*, advised that Bill, loving husband of Carmelita (deceased) died on 29 October at the Carmelite Retirement Home.

Old Paradians mourn the passing of John Wegner AO

It is with deep regret the Old Paradians' Association advises that the acclaimed opera singer John Wegner AO - a final year student of Parade College in 1967 and an inductee into the Association's Hall of Fame - died in Sydney on 18 November after a long battle with Parkinson's Disease.

John was two months short of his 70th birthday. Born in West Germany, John was just a five year-old boy

when he followed his mother across the globe in search of a new life in Australia. When his mother died soon afterwards, John was raised by his older brother in Melbourne.

Steadily adapting to his new environment, John successfully auditioned for the St Patrick's Cathedral choir one of his earliest Melbourne



musical experiences. Two years later in 1962 he was enrolled at Parade College where, for the next five years, he combined his academic and sporting pursuits. As a footballer and athlete of renown, John excelled in school sport and later represented the Old Paradians Athletics and Football Clubs. On his regular visits to the Association's Luncheons at the RACV City Club, John often remarked that he learned to sing in belting out the College song in the winner's circle after each on-field triumph.
