

I acknowledge the work of Adele Fernando-Swart and her committee in putting together another excellent College Year Book.


Christmas Blessings

Year 9 (2021) – ExCEL Program

In Term one of next year, 2021 Year 9 students will be involved in an ExCEL orientation day which will occur on either Wednesday of Week 2 or Week 3 as part of your son's first Extended Learning Project (ELP) subject.

Families that are unfamiliar with the ExCEL program should be aware of the following points regarding ExCEL:

- Classes may be timetabled at either the Bundoora or Preston Campus. Families will be able to determine which campus from the room number on their sons SIMON timetable. Timetables will be available before the commencement of Term 1, 2021
- Students and families are expected to make their own arrangements regarding transport to and from whichever campus their timetabled ExCEL class occurs at
- All students require a valid Myki card, with sufficient funds, for the ExCEL orientation day and all other ExCEL excursions
- Correct Parade College sports uniform may be worn on Wednesdays
- Where an ExCEL excursion is scheduled, when that excursion is based in the city, students will need to make their own way to and from the designated meeting place (State Library) in the CBD. This will form part of the ExCEL Orientation program
- Changes to ExCEL subjects are not able to be made throughout the year

Technology Report

Year 9 Materials Design classes are making a difference to the local ecology by making nesting boxes for native birds.

With limited workshop time available due to our time in isolation learning, many of the Year 9s have chosen to construct a project with an environmental focus to finish off the year.



This project allows our boys to increase their knowledge of joinery techniques and precision measuring to ensure a cosy nesting site for our feathered friends. Options are also available for possum and bat nesting boxes.



In 2021 Ms Fogarty and myself will be working with the Sustainability Prefect Team to bring nesting boxes to bushfire affected areas to promote the re-establishment of native fauna where nesting sites may have been destroyed or compromised.

The Waiting Begins

The people in living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned (Matthew 4:16).


I love the idea of Diwali, festival of light, celebrated by the Sikh and Hindu members of our community. From what I know of it, it sounds a lot like Christmas, where we celebrate Jesus, coming into the world as our light, illuminating the way along the darkest of paths.

Last weekend marked the beginning of Advent, the Christian season of preparing, waiting, longing. This year, as we wait to mark and celebrate the birth of Jesus, we also wait for a vaccine that will signal a return to life as it was before COVID-19.

Although Victorians are now gradually enjoying more freedoms, each day we hold our collective breath for the number and do not take the zeros for granted. We know that our freedom is tenuous and desperately hope that it won't be curtailed again. 
The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I have come so that they may have life and have it to the full. (Matthew 10:10)

Year 10 Community Action Letter Writing Project

Our letter writing project has continued through Term 4 with the Year 10 students from Mr Houlihan, Mr Drew and Ms Harvey's RE classes, along with the Year 10 ERRP students, sharing their lives with aged care residents.

The project has been mutually beneficial to both parties. The letters continue to connect many of these residents, who have been excluded from their usual social networks during COVID -19, with our students who have enjoyed the opportunity to brighten their day.

Our students have been getting a history lesson from residents who write back about their very different school days, life during war time and the depression.

Our Year 10s have been able to get a greater understanding about the contributions older generations have made to our country and our lives.

Some students have developed meaningful connections with residents at Bundoora Retirement Village who have enjoyed the exchange of stories.

Resident Alice Rawe shared her reflections:

Earlier in the year a message came out to the residents asking if anyone would be interested in being a penpal to a student at Parade College.

I didn't respond at first as I felt I wouldn't know what to write about. However, a few weeks ago, during lockdown, several letters from Parade College Year 10 students were pinned to the noticeboard here at the Bundoora Retirement Village, again with a request for a show of interest.

As soon as I read the first letter, it struck a chord with me and I knew that I would like to write back to this student. I also began writing to a second student.

My only regret is that I didn't get involved with the scheme when we first heard about it.

Once I began the first letter I found there was much to write about. There were so many positive outcomes:

- It was a real joy to share thoughts and stories with young people
- The response from the students was heartwarming
- When writing about the world as it was during my childhood I found it brought back a flood of memories and gave me a flashback of some of the positives in my own life
- On reflection, exchanging letters with these students has been a thoroughly enjoyable experience.

Maxwell Callahan H07 struck up a friendship with his penpal:

My name is Max. I am a Year 10 student that recently got involved in the Year 10 Community Action program.

The program was a letter-writing pen-pal to elderly. I had the opportunity to send letters to Beryl, a resident at Bundoora retirement village.

I had an amazing time, sharing stories with her as we had similar interests in music, outdoor activities and experiences, despite our age difference. Beryl and I had a lot in common and I am sad to see it come to an end.

I'm sure that other Year 10 students also loved it too as it was such a wonderful experience.

We extend our thanks to the residents who replied to students, and to the staff who distributed and read the letters to their residents.

Many thanks to the Year 10's for their generosity in giving time to the letter writing - this is a simple but powerful gesture that means much to an appreciative recipient.

Year 7 Retreat Day

On Tuesday 24 November the Year 7 students from both campuses took a break from their normal timetable and were given the opportunity to celebrate and reflect on their year.

The focus of the day was 'Connection', and students explored their connection to the school, to each other, and to their environment in a range of activities with their RE class.

The highlight of the day for many was guest presenter Scott Darlow. Scott, a Yorta Yorta descendant, is a passionate Indigenous activist and a talented musician. He spoke to the students about his life experience and gave them advice about bullying and self-image. His central message was based on his key word "FLUTE" (Forgiveness, Love, Understanding, Tolerance and Empathy).

Scott advised the Year 7s to use that acronym in their daily life to develop their 'best self'.

The day culminated in an 'Amazing Race' around the college that saw them reconnecting with the grounds of Parade.

Student Reflections - Myles Adlard B12

On Tuesday 24 November all the year 7 participated in a reflection day. This was an opportunity for students to be involved in team and friendship building activities. These included a team race to find information about the College, and just having time to sit and talk to others. These activities were done from period 3 to 6 in our normal class group.



During the third period of the day we participated in a Zoom call with Scott Darlow, a modern aboriginal musician who is raising awareness about aboriginal culture through his music. He introduced us to his favourite word, FLUTE, an acronym that stands for Forgiveness, Love, Understanding, Tolerance and Empathy. He told us to use this every day to help ourselves and the others around us.

We also participated in some activities that reflected on the unpredictable year it has been. The main word was **RESILIANCE** and how being resilient is so important. We reflected on the year and things that were challenging for us. Some people may have struggled during online learning, and for some people it may have been easier, but on reflection day we reflected on these things and helped each other. Overall it was a fun filled day with interesting activities.

He also shared a bit about his childhood including how alcoholism and gambling took over his dad's life. At the end of the period we listened to some of his music and made some Aboriginal inspired art to wrap up the period.

In period five we learned about Youth Mission Team Australia and watched some of videos - it really educated us and encouraged us to believe in ourselves and be resilient.




In the last period we did the amazing race where we raced around the campus in teams and completing tasks as a team and helping each other.

BNTS Ambassadors


Since 2017, Parade students have represented the College as Student Ambassadors at the Banyule-Nillumbik Tech School. Despite moving online in 2020, three students, Jack Mitchell (T11), Max McArdle (H20), and Jordan Carter (H03) participated in this year's Tech School virtual events.

The Banyule-Nillumbik Tech School, situated in Greensborough, is a Victorian government initiative to empower young people in STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics).

The Tech School, in partnership with twenty schools in the Banyule-Nillumbik area, develop and run specialist programs and activities that help prepare local students for the challenges of the future and the changing nature of work.

In the past, Tech School Student Ambassadors would be involved in designing and organising a Maker Faire for primary school students, however, with the challenge of moving this process online, the Tech School instead has focused on developing students' digital skills.

From home in Terms 2 and 3, and from school in Term 4, students took part in Masterclass sessions in the use of TinkerCAD (a 3D modelling program), Adobe Illustrator (a vector graphics editor), and micro:bit (a pocket-sized codeable computer).



There are lots of fabulous eBooks and eAudio books available. For eMagazines, the RB Digital platform is entered with the student email as login, and the usual student laptop password.



From The Old Paradians

"He Was A Great Product Of Parade"

Des Reardon, a final year student of Parade's Class of 1957 and a regular at the Old Paradians' Association's Monthly Luncheons at Melbourne's RACV City Club, has passed away after a short illness.

Des, who would have celebrated his 80th birthday in mid-January, died on Monday 16 November in Heidelberg's Olivia Newton-John Cancer Wellness & Research Centre.

So ended a life well-lived.

Des's wife of 54 years Margaret this week paid tribute to her soulmate – "a fine man" whom she first met at the taxation office in Lonsdale Street where they were both employed.

"Des was an only child who grew up in Middle Park and attended the Carmelite boys school. For years he organized reunions of those in his classes there," Margaret said.

"He was very loyal, very determined and had very definite ideas on things . . . he also had a great love for the South Melbourne Football Club because of where he grew up and he's been a continuous Member of the Swans since 1948."

On completing Year 10, Des crossed town to the 'Old Bluestone Pile' to complete two years matriculation. At 17 he took on a course in accountancy at night school in North Melbourne just as he joined the taxation office – and there he remained until the age of 55 when a heart attack forced an early retirement.

Des overcame that physical setback and pursued an active life to the full as a willing participant in squash, tennis and bowls - and for years he bowled at the Heidelberg Club where he also capably served as President and Treasurer.

"We were both very fortunate that we were able to do the things we wanted to do," Margaret said.



"We both looked after our parents and when the opportunity arose we travelled. Des loved to travel and so did I. He'd decide where we'd go and I'd joined him."

Through the course of their 55 years as Rosanna residents, Des and Margaret raised their two children Cathy and Greg, with Des an active parishioner at the nearby St Martin of Tours Church.

The years came and went, but, Des's school friendships endured. At the RACV City Club, he broke bread with old mates like Vin Arthur, Peter Jackson, Pat McNamara and Paul Power at the Association luncheons.

"Des loved those luncheons, he loved to reconnect with those of his vintage and he loved Parade," Margaret said.

"He kept his school photos and his old badges. He kept them all because the school meant a lot to him."

Des was diagnosed with cancer in late July after being hospitalised with a broken collarbone. "He bent down to remove a weed from the garden and his collarbone just snapped," Margaret said.

"Tests revealed a secondary cancer there, then they found it in Des's oesophagus and lungs. It all happened very quickly, but the nurses and staff at Olivia Newton-John were terrific and they've since rung to offer their support." Des is survived by his beloved wife Margaret, children Cathy and Greg and four grandchildren Nick, Emily, Liam and Patrick.

"When you're young you don't know who you're going to meet, but in meeting Des I was very lucky," Margaret said. "He was a wonderful husband and friend, and a good and kind man. He was a great product of Parade."


