


From the Principal

There is an opportunity for two 2018 Parade Year 10 students to have a student exchange with an Edmund Rice school in British Columbia, Canada: Vancouver College.





Founded in 1922, Vancouver College is a highly regarded boys' P-12 Catholic School in the Edmund Rice tradition. This is a unique opportunity to experience life and learning on the other side of the world.

The successful Parade students will attend Vancouver College for the last five weeks of Term 3 this year (with an option to extend this time for sightseeing into the Term 3 holidays). The hospitality will then be reciprocated and these Parade students will each host a student from Vancouver College for the first five weeks of Term 1, 2019 (and for the last two weeks of the summer holidays).

The tuition and organisation costs will be borne by the two Colleges. Participating students will wear their own College uniforms to school. The student's family will need to pay for the return airfare (approximately \$1550), any visa, pocket money and incidentals (and any optional sightseeing).

Opening and Blessing of the Nash Learning Centre

On Thursday 15 February the Nash Learning Centre was officially opened by Dr Wayne Tinsey, Executive Director of Edmund Rice Education Australia. Fr Vincent Le, Parish Priest of Bundoora, blessed the building and led the service.



Distinguished guests for the opening ceremony included Paul Williams, Regional Director Southern Region EREA, Dr Ben Cleveland (Melbourne University) Associate Director of the Learning Environments Applied Research Network, Colin Brooks MP, State Member for Bundoora, Marc Blanks (Melbourne Polytechnic), Executive Director of Technical Schools, and Skylie Massingham (Melbourne Polytechnic), Project Director, Principals from neighbouring Catholic schools, College Board Chairman Darryn Borg, many of the Parade Board members, Lewis Derrico (OPA), Veronica Spiteri (POP), architects (CHT) and builders (Devco), as well as staff and students were in attendance.





In his welcome, Dr Moore spoke of the 2018 anniversary marking 150 years since the arrival of the Christian Brothers in Australia, and how the small group of founding Brothers worked tirelessly to provide education to Melbourne's most needy children. He spoke of the establishment of Parade College in East Melbourne and the move to the Bundoora location. Dr Moore spoke of the many major projects completed since the move here in 1968, and, in our Jubilee Year, the opening of the Nash Learning Centre.

Dr Wayne Tinsey spoke of Parade's incredible heart, and how the Nash Learning Centre represents Parade's dedication in providing fantastic facilities in aid of excellent education.

Guests were able to tour the building, with many remarking on its fine architecture, attention to student-centred learning, and how the Nash Learning Centre positively displayed the spirit of the school.

From the Acting Assistant Principal - Teaching & Learning

Supporting Students in Gaining Deeper Academic Understandings

Supporting our students to achieve their full potential is of the utmost importance at Parade College. We do this by having a number of policies in place. An important part of the School's Assessment Policy, is the **resit/resubmit and academic redemption** process. Analysis of the assessment data since its inception in 2014 indicates a distinct improvement in students' overall academic performance. In essence, the aim is to progress students further along the learning continuum towards mastery of the course content.

A summary of the process is outlined below;

In most cases, Year 7 to 12 students failing to achieve a satisfactory level of performance in formally assessed tasks, deemed to be a C or higher (60%+) will be required to resubmit or resit the task, within a week of receiving their work back. Parents will be notified of the unsatisfactory result and of the need for their son to resit/resubmit the assessment task.

Teachers will generally set the same task for the resit or resubmission, with incorrect and unsatisfactory parts to be completed. By doing this, students are given the opportunity to revise and resit/resubmit what they were unable to master the first time. Please note, VCE students scoring below 40% resit the entire task. Teachers will provide feedback and support to students along their individual learning journeys, hopefully leading to a deeper understanding of the coursework and better educational outcomes.

Teachers will use their discretion to focus on the underperforming students who are capable of achieving better results, and whose efforts are lacking, rather than those making every effort to succeed but not meeting the standard. Hence, students with identified learning difficulties will not be the focus, and only resit/resubmit in assessment tasks consultation with parents and teachers.

Students who do not submit a task, or who fail to resubmit the unsatisfactory task, will be required to attend an Academic Redemption session after school. Parents will be notified whenever this occurs.

Year 7 students whose first attempt falls below a C will have their improved grades listed on their reports. Year 8 to 12 students will have their original grade reported, and the comment section of the Semester Report will acknowledge the improved grade. This measure is intended to encourage students to give their very best effort the first time they are assessed. This is in line with, and is a requirement of, VCAA assessment procedures for VCE students.

Parents are encouraged to discuss this aspect of the assessment policy with their sons. Rather than being punitive, the aim is to support our students to progress towards achieving greater academic success, and achieving their potential.


At last year's global round in Vietnam the program saw over three thousand students from sixty different countries!

Hollywood Luminaries Talk to Media Students

Year 11 Media and Theatre Studies students were afforded an incredible opportunity to visit Maribyrnong College to take part in a documentary film-making seminar with two keynote speakers: John Marsh and Kelly Curtis.

John has enjoyed a successful career as a writer, producer and director in the American film making industry, spanning some fifty years. Kelly, growing up in the very famous Lee Curtis family, has excelled as an actor on both the silver screen and the stages of Broadway. She has more recently turned her hand to producing films with John for their production company Liberty Films and now, as semi-retirees have chosen to give back to the media industry. They self-fund films such as "Marby Jets Are Go", an account of the elite Maribyrnong Sports Academy track team's successful trip to the USA Simplot Games; the USA's largest college level meet.

The Parade College students, along with Media students from Maribyrnong College, were treated to an hour-long discussion of the technical side that goes into producing such documentaries. 

From the Director of Ministry

What Kind of Fast?

When I was 10 years old I decided to give up lollies for Lent. It was a bit of a challenge, made easier by the fact that I chose not to say a definitive "no" to offers of sweets, but instead stockpiled them in a jar, ready for feasting at Easter.

These days I have given away my lolly jar but am still interested in ways that I can take up God's invitation to come closer during Lent. Pope Francis challenges us to think of how our Lenten fasting benefits others. He quotes the early Christian mystic John Chrysostom who said:

"No act of virtue can be great if it is not followed by advantage for others. So, no matter how much time you spend fasting, no matter how much you sleep on a hard floor and eat ashes and sigh continually, if you do no good to others, you do nothing great."

In our readings at mass on Friday, we heard from the prophet Isaiah, who links fasting with vigilance for justice, generosity, and authenticity. What is the point of giving up lollies if I am not also working towards building right relationships with the people around me?

- Fast from hurting words and say kind words.
- Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.
- Fast from anger and be filled with patience.
- Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.
- Fast from worries and trust in God.

- Fast from pressures and be prayerful.
- Fast from bitterness and fill your heart with joy.
- Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.
- Fast from grudges and be reconciled.
- Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.

These awards reflect the generosity and willingness of Parade students to give back to the community. Both of these awards are named after past students whose lives were taken far too soon under tragic circumstances, but who in their short life made a difference!

The Nuwan Amarakoon Community Action award recognizes and rewards the commitment of a Year 10 student to volunteer his time and talents. I am thrilled to state that the list of candidates for this award is always long, and this, again, was the case in 2017.

We had Year 10 students such as Christian Matarazzo (L07), who was a regular volunteer at Eddy's Brekky Van and who made positive connections with the locals of Heidelberg.

Patrick Petersen (H02), another student who committed to Eddie's Brekkie Van. In 2017, Year 10 students Zac Ray (L04), Tommy Graziano (L09), Gary Huang (B08) and Youssef Abou Zied (B07) were committed to sustainability in the College and began a staffroom compost and soft plastic recycling program.

However, the 2017 winner of the Nuwan Amarakoon award is Shaun Spiteri (L05), who last year stood out for his outstanding generosity of spirit, commitment to and leadership in Community Action at the college.

Most Monday afternoons last year, Shaun could be found tutoring refugee primary school children in St Alban's. He would sit and help them with their homework and was able to establish meaningful relationships with the children. Early most Tuesday mornings, Shaun was making tea, coffee, and friends at Olympic Village through the Eddy's Brekky Van. Shaun was involved in many other Community Action initiatives throughout the year. Congratulations Shaun.

In 2017, the Stefan Minutoli Blood For Life House Shield was hotly contested between the four Houses. Parade students and staff are always proud to be counted in the half a million blood donor volunteers each year through the College blood donor program.

Despite the Red Cross changing the age requirement to eighteen years of age in Term 3 last year, Parade still managed to reach our annual target of over 100 donations in fact we were only two short of the 113 donations of the previous year --which means we saved 333 lives!

In 2017, the winning House – saving 81 lives - was TREACY! Dr Moore presented the Shield to Treacy House Captain Zane D'Silva (T03). Congratulations Treacy House.

Students turning eighteen this year will be given the opportunity to donate blood or plasma.

Year 11 Service Learning

All Year 11 students are reminded of the 'Service Learning Program' that asks all Year 11s to commit to ten hours of volunteer work. Students can make up these ten hours by getting involved in the wide range of volunteer opportunities offered at the college.

At an assembly last week guest speakers from St Albans Tutoring Program, the Greensborough Community Meal and Eddy Rice Camps spoke to Year 11s about the programs they offer and their benefits to the community and how they can get involved. Our Year 12 Prefects presented the many other Community Action initiatives that students can get involved in such as the Eddy's Brekkie Van.

The ten Service Learning hours can also be made up through involvement in programs outside the school.



Boundaries are an important part of creating clarity between you and your child as you both navigate a time of great change. By setting and agreeing on boundaries together, you create a 'contract' of expected behaviour that can help avoid conflict.

While boundaries help parents to feel more in control of their teenager's behaviour they also help them by:

- Letting them know that you care about them, and you are concerned about what they're doing even when you're not together.
- Making them feel safe and supported.
- Helping them make informed and sound decisions.
- Providing them a framework within which they have autonomy.

What are the most important boundaries for your family?

Prior to discussing boundaries with your child, first sit down with your partner and/or all of the important authority figures for your child and agree on what the most important boundaries are. It's important that there is consensus amongst you so that you are giving clear and firm boundaries, not mixed messages.

Some potential items for discussion:

- What are the most important boundaries?
- What boundaries are negotiable, and which are not?
- · What kind of consequences are we comfortable with?
- At what age do the boundaries change?

All of these questions can apply to a variety of teenage behaviour – some examples are things like going out with friends, going to parties, drinking, and social media use.

When to have a discussion around boundaries

There are two different ways you can approach boundary setting with your child. You can choose to spontaneously sit down with them to discuss boundaries around a variety of issues; or you can choose to set boundaries as your child requests more freedom.

It's important to choose a good time of day to have the discussion. Make sure you have plenty of time that you're both in a relatively good mood and there's not been any recent conflict. Ideally have the discussion with the whole family present.

How to set boundaries

When setting boundaries with your child it's important to get their feedback and input into the process. Young people are less likely to adhere to boundaries that have been dictated to them without any negotiation. You can choose to set boundaries about just one issue at a time, or perhaps you can cover a few issues at once.

Some things to consider when boundary setting:

- Try to set a tone of friendly cooperation throughout the conversation
- Make sure to listen and respond to your child's concerns
- Be very clear and precise when setting boundaries to ensure that there's no miscommunication.
- avoid being dictatorial
- Try to negotiate points that you disagree on, but stand firm and state your case if there's something that is just non-negotiable in your view
- Remind your child why you're making the boundaries reiterate your care and concern for them
- Discuss what the consequences will be if the boundaries are ignored or flouted.

If the conversation is leading to conflict, suggest taking a break and follow-up when things have cooled down a bit. Also, try not to overload the conversation with too many boundaries at once, suggest a follow-up talk to cover other things that come up.

A good way to finish up a boundary setting conversation is to ask them what boundaries they'd like you as a parent to stick to. This conversation can be very illuminating and can help to bring mutual understanding and respect between you.

Evolving boundaries

The process of setting boundaries is one that will need to be repeated fairly often during the teenage years. As young people grow the boundaries that we place around their behaviour need to change to reflect their maturity.

It's important to explain to younger siblings the reasons why there are different boundaries for them and their older brothers or sisters.

Boundaries may also need to be shifted if your child exhibits untrustworthy behaviour. Shifting the boundaries to be more restrictive can be a consequence of ignoring or flouting boundaries.

Consequences

Testing boundaries is normal teenage behaviour. No matter how good your relationship is with your child, they may still flout the boundaries.

Impulsive behaviour, the influence of their peers, and poor decision-making often lead to boundary-testing behaviour. If this happens it's important to:

- Reiterate your previous discussion where boundaries were set
- Ask them to identify how their behaviour didn't meet the agreed rules.
- Cooperatively decide on a consequence that fits the behaviour.
- Follow through with the agreed consequence.
- Provide positive reinforcement when your child does behave within the agreed boundaries.



"Do Your Best" 2017 Dux addresses College Assembly

2017 Dux Callum Holmes, who posted the perfect ATAR of 99.95, was one of a number of high achievers recently acknowledged at Parade's Term 1 Assembly in College Hall.

Together with his colleagues, Callum (who proudly sported his Old Paradians necktie) was presented with an Association lapel badge as a memento of the occasion, and duly addressed more than 1900 students of both the Bundoora and Preston campuses.

Callum's mother Kathy, who with her husband David has committed her energies to the Parents of Parade committee, acknowledged her son's dedication to his studies and commended the teachers' support of her boy throughout his time at the College.

"I knew Callum had it in him. He's a bright lad, but he put a lot of effort into it, and the family's very proud of him," Kathy said.

"He was born with a gift, he's a smart boy, but he took that and worked it to the bone because he's persistent and very self-driven.

"He had a fantastic time at Parade. He made the most of every opportunity, the teachers supported him all the way along and they're really invested in all of the kids."

Callum's flawless ATAR comprised two perfect scores of 50 in Chemistry and Physics and 49 in English, with fellow classmates Aiden Hrup, Michael Barrese and Simon Rebellato posting respective scores of 99.7, 99.2 and 99.1.

Kathy said that Callum had realised his objective of gaining a University of Melbourne Chancellor's Scholarship and will now further his studies in science.



Callum's given middle names are 'Carlyle' (the name of his late paternal grandfather) and 'Girvan' - a throwback to Kathy's Scottish ancestors the McMillans, who originally hailed from Girvan in the burgh of Ayrshire.

"There was a tradition in my family to use the name 'Girvan' either as a first name or middle name because that was where seven members of the McMillan family came from in 1854 in search of a better life," said Kathy.

"And that's what we've always hoped for Cal and our other boys – a better education than we had to help set them up."

The following is Callum's address to Term 1 Assembly:

Dr Moore, distinguished guests, teachers and staff, and both current and former students of Parade College before me today; Good afternoon.

I left this school, what, three months ago? – and already I miss this place. Parade feels so close to my heart, so coming here today as an Old Paradian is surreal, a trip down memory lane. You won't believe me when you hear it gentlemen, but don't take these glory days for granted; time flies.

It is a privilege and honour to be here as the College Dux of 2017, particularly in Parade's 50th year anniversary at Bundoora, and 150th Year Anniversary since the Christian Brothers first arrived in Australia. But despite my accolades, I am indebted to many amazing people that have helped me

along the way, without which I would not be here today receiving this recognition.

And so firstly, I give thanks to my parents. Often I have been a ghost at the house's end and seldom interacted with another human soul. But regardless, you have always been at my side, providing me every chance to develop, the opportunity of an education, and the joy of life in itself. You deserve to know and be continually reminded that I respect and appreciate the sacrifices you have made for my sake, and for my brothers as well. As much as it would be protested, I could scratch out my name and write yours on these accolades, because my character and drive would not exist without you.



To the teachers who have taught me over the years - you have fuelled my passion to learn at every stage. You have endured my pestering, my questioning, and perhaps most difficult of all my handwriting; I think it is a great mystery what superhuman powers you must have developed to understand it.

And lastly, to my fellow classmates and fellow ex-Year 12s here today, it was fantastic to have worked and lived alongside you; you brought such a diversity of personality and talent to the classroom that I know I'll miss these golden years. I sincerely congratulate you on your achievements, because you deserve every ounce of recognition that you get.

Now as is traditional of any Dux, I would like to share pearls of wisdom from my own experience. Firstly, this might be a bit of a shock, but the high achievers and I are <u>not</u> workaholics. In fact it's mostly the opposite. Everybody must

keep a sense of balance in our lives. We are not robots (although some people still think I am). Of course we had our weekends with parties, or those days we decided that video games were top priority. But when we had a test, we studied until we were absolutely assured we would do our best. It doesn't matter how driven you are about anything; balance is critical.

Secondly. When you climb a ladder, where do you look most of the time? You rarely look up or down — in fact you mostly look where your hands are. Similarly, when you have a goal and ambition, do not let it overwhelm you like the ladder's height, or the distance below. Break it down into simple, achievable goals, something we could do every day that would get us just a bit closer to the top. I initially saw the Year 12 year as overwhelming, but I focused on objectives, to get some mark on the next test or finish an essay in an hour, and planned my year ahead as a series of steps. Every time you climb one step, tackle the next one. And the next. And before you know it you are miles high, and you are amazed at how far you have come.

My last point is the most important thing to take way.

Do your best.

Now I get it - if we try our best we are risking failure, and falling off a ladder hurts a lot. But if you want to go up, you will inevitably fall at some point. As a certain College Captain once said, you have to ride the rollercoaster.

As a matter of fact, mistakes were actually my greatest tools. For every mistake I made in any subject, I would write it down and then review and memorise it until it was second nature. For me, failure was the fuel of success. And so I learnt that in doing my best, even in failure, I could become the best I could be.

I leave you with a quote from Henry Ford I have come to love. "Whether you think you can, or you think you cannot, you are right". If you take your errors and disasters and let them motivate you, rather than bring you down; if you believe that you have the capacity despite opposition, then even the greatest error is but one step on a ladder.
