From the Assistant Principal - Student Wellbeing

Mobile Phones and Headphones

Please see the information provided to students at both campuses on Monday 11 February in relation to their mobile phones and headphones. We are reinforcing these procedures to:-

- *ensure that learning is not disrupted in the classroom,*
- *students are not distracted by their phones*
- *phones remain safe and secure during the day*
- *basic courtesies to classmates and staff are observed.*

We would appreciate your support in reminding your sons about these procedures, and the need to be respectful of staff as they do their jobs and follow up with students who choose not to respect the learning environment for all.

Equally, we think it is important that the boys have a break from screen time at recess and lunch, and keeping their phones and laptops in their lockers will assist with this.

- Phones need to be locked in your lockers between 8.35am and 3.15pm
- If a member of staff discovers you have your mobile phone on you in class or in the yard at recess or lunchtime, they will ask you to power off the phone and to hand the phone to them. Please do this pleasantly - the staff member is only doing their job.
- You can collect your phone at 3.15pm from Student Reception at Bundoora or Reception at Preston.
- If your phone is confiscated on a number of occasions, there will be further consequences and contact with your parents.
- If there is some *very real reason* as to why you need to check your phone during the day, or make a call, please see your House Leader/Mrs Ryan/Mrs Bult/Mr Nicholls in Tutor Group to organise this.

- If you bring your phone to class when you have a test/ SAC, you will be told to take it to your locker. You will not be given extra time for the assessment. If you don't follow this direction and your phone is discovered during the test or SAC, it will be confiscated and the relevant Dean of Learning and your House Leader informed.

Headphones

Families might like to review the necessity of students bringing expensive headphones to school. Being a teenager inevitably means that items can get lost, damaged and left behind; an inexpensive set will do the same job.

Please respect your teacher and classmates, and do not have any form of headphones in your ears when you enter classes. It can make teachers and your class mates feel as if you are not happy to see us, or be with us !

Headphones - wireless, or any other kind - should be kept in your pockets/pencil cases until you are invited by your teacher to use them to complete some class work on Edrolo, Education Perfect or Clickview etc. Teachers will ask you to remove them if they don't need you to use them - again, please be pleasant and follow that direction.

On the same afternoon/evening, families of students completing a VCE subject sequence this year are invited to attend the VCE Information Session in Rivergum Theatre. The Information session will be hosted by the Dean of Learning Years 10 to 12, Mr Paul Fahey, and will run for



approximately forty-five minutes. Sessions times are at 5.00pm, 6.15pm, and 7.30pm, so you may like to book your interview with your son's Tutor Teacher around one of those times.

You need only to attend one session, as the other two sessions are repeats. Light refreshments will be available in Hickey Foyer both before and after each information session.

This forum will provide an opportunity to be fully informed about your son's requirements and expectations as they commence their VCE studies in 2019. The evening is applicable to all parents with a son in Units 1 to 4 of any VCE subject.

Outstanding Theatre Studies Results

As part of Unit 4 Theatre Studies in 2018, students were required to present a Stagecraft Interpretation to a panel of external VCAA assessors for examination.

The task required students to present an interpretation of a monologue from a scene of a playscript. They could choose between Acting and Direction or Design for two areas (costume, set, sound, properties and make-up). Each student had a limit of twelve minutes to set up, read their framing statement, present their interpretation, answer a question (from the assessor) and pack up.

This assessment was worth 25% of their final overall score for Theatre Studies.

I am especially proud of how organised the boys were with getting their research and interpretation together. In particular, we wish to congratulate Matthew Casamento and Christian Morabito for achieving outstanding results in this area.

Matthew's performance of the character 'Marvin' from the musical *Falsettos*, and Christian's Costume and Set design for the character 'Actor' from *The Woman in Black*, both received an A+ and through invitation have entered the VCE Season of Excellence 2019.

Matthew will be performing his piece at the Arts Centre in the Top Class Theatre Studies program on 13 March, and Christian will have his design exhibited at the Melbourne Museum in the Top Designs program from 30 March to 14 July.

PTV Student Concession Cards

PTV have introduced a change this year with regard to student concession cards.

In the past students have needed to purchase a student concession card from PTV on a yearly basis.



“Victorian school students are now able to use their PTV approved school ID to access concession travel on public transport. This will enable students to buy student passes and concession fares.”

Parade have applied to use the PTV logo on our 2019 student ID cards and have received approval.

This means families are no longer required to purchase a separate PTV student concession pass for their sons if wanting to purchase half yearly or yearly tickets or student passes.

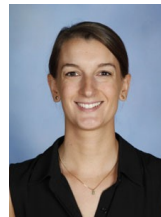

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)

I congratulate the students for their positive start to the year and wish them every success for 2019.

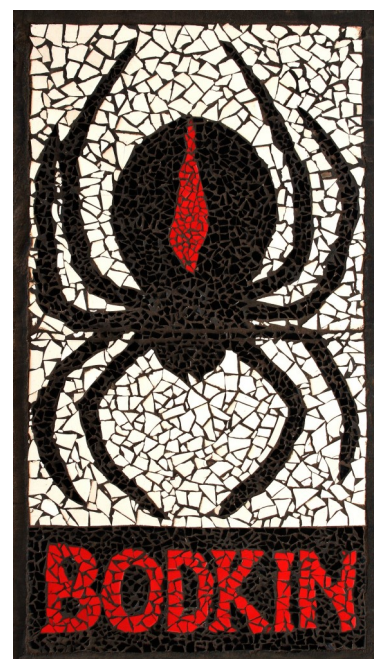

We wish everyone in Hughes House the very best with their goals and ambitions for 2019.

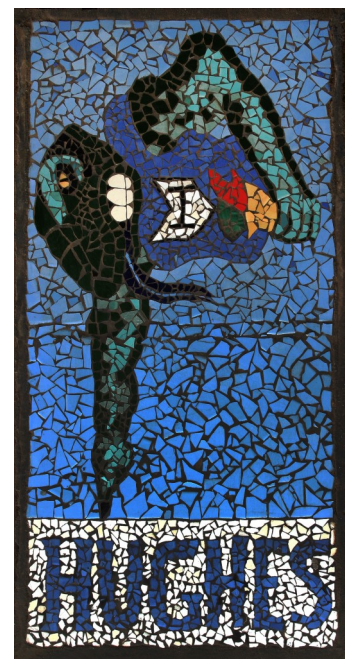

2019 Student Residential Address and Other Information collection notice

This notice is from the Australian Government Department of Education and Training (the department), to advise you that the department has requested that your child's school provide a statement of addresses, in accordance with the Australian Education Regulation 2013 (Cth) (Regulation).

A *statement of addresses* contains the following information about each student at the school:

- Student residential address (**not student names**)
- Student level of education (i.e. whether the student is a primary or secondary student)
- Student boarding school status (i.e. whether the student is boarding or a day student)
- Names and residential addresses of students' parent(s) and/or guardian(s)

Schools generate a record number for each student for the purposes of this collection, which is also provided to the department.

Purpose of the collection

This collection is routinely used to inform Commonwealth school education policy, and to help ensure that Commonwealth funding arrangements for non-government schools are based on need, and are fair and transparent.

On 20 September 2018 the Government announced that it will implement a new, improved capacity to contribute methodology used in the calculation of the Commonwealth's needs-based funding arrangements for non-government schools. This follows a review of the existing socio-economic status (SES) score methodology by the National School Resourcing Board. The information collected in the *statement of addresses* will be used to refine the new capacity to contribute methodology and may also be used in school funding calculations from 2020.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law, including the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth). Any use and disclosure of your personal information relating to the *statement of addresses* will occur in accordance with the Regulation.

Your personal information may be used by the department, or disclosed to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), for the purposes of SES score policy development, reviewing SES score methodology, calculating SES scores, Commonwealth school education policy development (including school funding), or where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

For example, your personal information may be provided to the ABS for statistical and research purposes, which includes data integration projects such as the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Further information on the MADIP can be found here:

The department may, from time to time, carry out audits of school submissions. In the event of an audit, contracted auditors may seek to compare a school's *statement of addresses* with student enrolment information held by the school. These contractors will not use the information for any other purpose.

The department may also be required to disclose your personal information to its service providers, including the Australian Government Department of Jobs and Small Business, for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology (ICT) support services to the department.

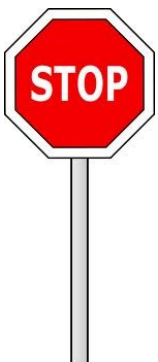

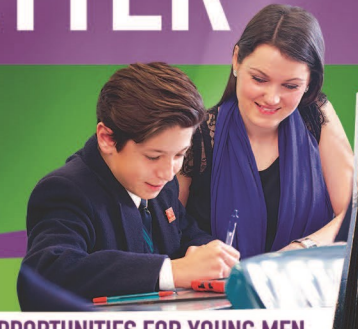
