

Please note that the College does not administer analgesics (eg: aspirin or paracetamol) as a standard first aid strategy and is unable to provide paracetamol or Panadol to students.

A written request is required from parents for the administering of all prescription and non-prescription medication. Please ensure that your son has a current medical action plan and that the relevant House Leader and the First Aid Office are notified if your son is required to take prescription medication through the school day.

If your son is starting a new course of medication, the first dose should not be taken at school in case of an allergic reaction. This must be done under the supervision of the family or health care practitioner.

From the Assistant Principal - Teaching & Learning

At our recent College assembly, it was wonderful to acknowledge the success of the VCE and VCAL Class of 2022 and our 2022 Academic High Achieving students from Years 7 to 11.

Acknowledging the hard work and success of all our students is an important way to help motivate them to continue striving for excellence. As a College, we pride ourselves on fostering a positive culture of achievement and growth within the school community. I hope that this recognition will inspire all students to continue pursuing their goals and achieving success with their learning.

Families new to the College need to be aware that the Parent Access Module (PAM) and SIMON enable students and their parents and carers to obtain feedback about student progress in each subject.

The continuous reporting capability of SIMON enables parents to monitor the submission status of their son's work and their results for submitted tasks. When students do not submit work (NB: an extension may be granted), or if a student is required to resubmit work that was initially assessed as below a C grade, teachers will generate a letter accessible by parents on PAM.

Details for all assessment tasks, including due dates, can be accessed in each of your son's subjects under Learning Areas.

Letters generated by teachers are the main method of communication used to notify parents of tasks that were not submitted or require resubmission. Of course, teachers will still communicate other concerns relating to your son via email or phone. As always, we encourage families to contact their son's subject teacher to discuss how we can work together to support your son's progress.


VCE Parent Information Evening 2023

Thanks to all those who attended the VCE Parent Information Evening, which was held on Thursday 16 February. For those who were not able to attend, a link to the presentation is available on SIMON and PAM.

NAPLAN

NAPLAN will be conducted on your son's school laptop and he will be required to use headphones in order to access and complete questions.

For the tests, students need a specific browser application. Upon restarting their laptop, it should automatically appear on their desktop. The icon is included below.



To restart their laptop, students must click the Windows button in the bottom left corner of their screen, then click the power icon, then click Restart. Simply closing the laptop screen or using the inbuilt power button on the laptop will not initiate a restart.

Students should be in the habit of restarting their laptop every week, to ensure their software is up to date and their laptop runs at optimum speed.

All Year 7 and 9 students are required to bring their own headphones that are compatible with their school laptop for the NAPLAN tests. Wired headphones are preferable, but Bluetooth headphones will also work.

There will be catch up sessions for students who miss a test due to absence. Bundoora students who miss a NAPLAN test should email Mr Fogarty; Preston students who miss a NAPLAN test should email Ms Faulkner.

Students must fully charge their laptops each night at home, to ensure they can complete the tests. Students should also bring their laptop chargers to school in their laptop bags.

Parents and carers that wish to discuss their son's participation in NAPLAN for 2023, or access to headphones, should contact Mr James Fogarty (Dean of Learning – Years 7 to 9), Ms Scarlett Faulkner (Curriculum Convenor – Preston Campus) or their son's Additional Needs Coordinator.

Year 9 ExCEL



Tutor Period Social and Emotional Learning

We are excited to announce the school's upcoming Friday Tutor Program will focus on character strengths, emotional intelligence, empathy and bullying over the next five weeks

Our goal is to help our students develop a strong foundation of these important values and skills that will serve them well in all aspects of life. I have included some information regarding the skills your son will learn about.



Character strengths are qualities that make us unique and special, such as honesty, kindness, and perseverance. By focusing on our character strengths, we can build resilience and self-confidence. Our students will learn how to identify their own strengths and use them to overcome challenges.



Emotional intelligence refers to our ability to understand and manage our own emotions and those of others. We believe that developing emotional intelligence is essential for success in all areas of life, from academic performance to relationships with friends and family. During the program, our students will learn how to recognise their emotions, manage them in a healthy way, and respond in a way that benefits both themselves and others.

Empathy is the ability to understand and share the feelings of others. It is a critical component of emotional intelligence and a valuable tool for building strong relationships. Our students will learn how to show empathy to others, how to communicate their own feelings effectively, and how to work through conflicts in a positive and respectful way.



Finally, we will be addressing bullying and its negative effects. Our students will learn about the different forms of bullying, how to recognise it, and how to respond to it. We will also be teaching them about the importance of being an ally to others and standing up for what is right.



Lastly, the work we will be conducting in the first three weeks on character strengths, empathy and emotional intelligence will relate to bullying, therefore allowing students to use these skills they learnt when it comes to bullying.

Year 7 Camp in a couple of weeks will allow students to further develop friendships and connections with one another.




