For families who are new to Parade, it's important to know that the Parent Access Module (PAM) and SIMON are tools that allow students and their parents or carers to receive feedback on student progress in each subject. PAM's ongoing reporting feature allows parents to track their child's work submission status and the results of submitted tasks.

If a student does not submit work or needs to resubmit work that initially received a grade below a C, teachers will communicate the matter via a letter. This letter, accessible to parents on PAM, serves to notify them of these circumstances.

Information about assessment tasks, including due dates, can be found under Learning Areas for each of your child's subjects on PAM. Letters created by teachers serve as the primary communication method to inform parents about tasks that were not submitted or need to be resubmitted.

Teachers will continue, however, to communicate other concerns about your child on through email or phone. We always welcome families to reach out to their child's subject teacher to discuss how we can collaborate to support his progress.

Student-Free Day: Teacher Professional Development

Please be aware that Tuesday 12 March is a student free day with teaching and support staff involved in professional learning activities at the Bundoora Campus.

We will once again welcome Kirstin Bourne, an educational consultant and literacy expert with a background in teaching in Australia and the UK. Kirstin has worked with the Melbourne Archdiocese of Catholic Schools to assist secondary schools in the teaching of good literacy practices. Kirstin was the keynote speaker at our Teaching and Professional Learning Day in 2023 where she explored the concept of cognitive load and how it affects student learning.

She worked with the Teaching and Learning Executive throughout 2023 to help design knowledge organisers and plan for the explicit teaching of disciplinary literacy.

We are very lucky to have Kirstin return to Parade for 2024 to focus on student engagement and structuring lessons in a way that accounts for the literacy demands of our curriculum.

From the Dean of Learning Years 7 to 9

NAPLAN will be conducted on your son's school laptop and he will be required to use headphones in order to access and complete questions.

For the tests, students need a specific browser application. Upon restarting their laptop, it should automatically appear on their desktop. The icon is included below.



To restart their laptop, students must click the Windows button in the bottom left corner of their screen, then click the power icon, then click "Restart". Simply closing the laptop screen or using the built-in power button on the laptop will not initiate a restart.

Students should be in the habit of restarting their laptops every week, to ensure their software is up to date and their laptop runs at optimum speed.

We seek your support in asking your son to restart his laptop tonight.

All Year 7 and 9 students are required to bring their own headphones that are compatible with their school laptop for the NAPLAN tests. Wired headphones are preferable, but Bluetooth headphones will also work.

The NAPLAN Practice Test will occur during Periods 1 and 2 on Thursday 22 February. The purpose of this practice test is to ensure that student laptops have the correct software installed, that students' headphones play audio, and that students know how to use the varied test functions such as drag-and-drop, calculator, protractor, and ruler.

Students and parents can access further practice via the public demonstration website NAP - Public demonstration site The NAPLAN tests will occur at the following times:

Year 7

- Writing: Wednesday 13 March, Periods 1 and 2
- Reading: Thursday 14 March, Periods 1 and2
- Conventions of Language: Friday 15 March, Periods 1 and 2
- Numeracy: Monday 18 March, Periods 1 and 2

Year 9

- Writing: Thursday 14 March, Periods 1 and2
- Reading: Friday 15 March, Periods 1 and 2
- Conventions of Language: Monday 18 March, Periods 1 and 2
- Numeracy: Tuesday 19 March, Periods 1 and 2

There will be catch-up sessions for students who miss a test due to absence. Students who miss a NAPLAN test should email Ms Nadia Bonvicino.

Students must fully charge their laptops each night at home, to ensure they can complete the tests. They should also bring their laptop chargers to school, in their laptop bags.

NAPLAN Information for parents and carers 2024

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national proficiency standards.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Online NAPLAN tests are designed to provide precise results and are engaging for students. The tests are tailored (or adaptive) which means that each test presents questions that may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses. This helps students remain engaged with the assessment.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for all Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students. ACARA supports inclusive testing, so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, and our series of videos where parents/ carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.



What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests; however, it is not necessary for parents/carers to do this. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

See the types of questions and tools available in the online NAPLAN assessments at NAP - Public demonstration site.

How is my child's performance reported?

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against proficiency standards. There is a standard for each assessment area at each year level. Proficiency standards provide clear information on student achievement. They are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected for the child at the time of NAPLAN testing, based mainly on what has been taught in previous years of schooling. Student achievement is shown against 4 levels of proficiency: Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may not have the capacity to complete the tests in a shorter time frame.

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 13 March 2024 and finishes on Monday 25 March 2024. Schools will schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

PARADE COLLEGE Bus Code Of Conduct

The College has a responsibility to address legal requirements imposed by bus companies, which are related to safe travel for our students. By applying for a College Bus service, you have indicated you are aware of the College's Code of Conduct and that you agree to follow its rules.

- 1. Food and drinks must not be consumed on any of the buses at ANY time.
- 2. Any vandalism is unacceptable. Students are required to report any pre-existing damage to the bus driver and the nearest Parade College Staff Member.
- 3. College "Hands off" and "Bullying" Policies apply at loading bays and whilst on the bus.
- 4. Throwing of any object within or out of the bus is banned, in all circumstances.
- 5. For travel on the College Charter buses, students must present a valid College Bus Pass.
- 6. Whilst travelling on any College Charter bus, all students must always remain seated and wear seatbelts if fitted to bus .
- 7. For travel on the College PTV buses, students must present a valid College Bus Pass **and** have a valid **MYKI** card in credit.
- 8. Boarding buses must be done in an orderly way students are required to queue and enter the bus one at a time.
- 9. Exiting a bus must be done in an orderly way; that is, one student at a time, observing normal safety requirements when crossing roads and to not move in front of or behind the bus, into the traffic.
- 10. Students are required to follow all directions given by bus drivers at any stage of the journey.
- 11. Students must follow health & safety directives including the wearing of masks when required.
- 12. If a bus driver considers that students are not following the directions, or are behaving in a manner, which is endangering the safety of others, the driver may return to the College, or stop the bus in a safe location and wait for further instructions from either the bus company or the College. Students are to fully cooperate with the driver in these circumstances.
- 13. The cost of repair for any damage to bus interiors will be referred to the students responsible.
- 14. Students who fail to cooperate with drivers or who do not meet the conditions of travel on the PTV or charter buses, should expect to receive consequences for their misbehaviour. In line with our restorative approach to behaviour management consequences could include; a restorative conference, exclusion from the bus, a travel ban, school detention and/or suspension from the College.
