

From the Principal

Last Thursday was cause for great celebration as our Athletics Team have remained undefeated for five years by claiming their fourth consecutive Division 1 ACC Championship. It was a great tribute to the athletes from Parade and their coaches. What was particularly pleasing was the Spirit in which they competed, supporting each other and striving to beat personal bests. A tremendous team achievement.

This week is an exciting week for our Year 7 students. They have their orientation camp as well as an experience of the Ambrose Treacy Trail. Thankfully the COVID restrictions allow our newest Paradians to get to meet each other, have

fun and also begin to depth the Parade Story that is 150 years old.

Also this week, the third group of Year 12 Tenete Groups embark on their overnight Ministry Retreat. All Year 12 students are expected to attend one of these retreats. It is but one of the many programs that are embedded into the curricula and life of the College and are exemplars of how we strive to be a Catholic School in the Edmund Rice Tradition. The response from boys is overwhelmingly positive, and the potential to foster in them empathy, compassion, and a thirst for justice, also builds their resilience and character as young men.

Finally, Friday was a treasured opportunity for the College to mourn the death of our longest serving Principal, Dr Denis Moore and to also celebrate his life. Almost five hundred gathered in Moore Hall – named after him - for his funeral Eucharist. Fathers Terry Bergin, Steve Rigo, Anthony Gerolami and Paul Cahill concelebrated. We were also honoured by



Deacon Jaycee Napoli (Class of 2004) and seminarian John Vespa (Class of 2002). It was an honour for Parade to host his funeral and I am grateful to those staff and students that worked so tirelessly to make it so memorable.









Many tributes were made by members of Br Denis' family, the Christian Brothers, his friends and by members of Parade. Br Mark O'Loughlin (former member of staff) offered a eulogy; past College Captains presented treasured symbols of his life and achievements; staff and students formed a band; Luke Bortignon (Class of 2017) sang Br Denis' favourite song to photos of Br Denis' life; and the 2021 Prefects formed a guard of honour as Br Denis' coffin was taken to the College cemetery for burial.

Vale Dr Denis J Moore cfc 1949 - 2021

The Old Paradians' Association has joined the Parade College community in mourning the passing of Dr Denis Moore cfc, who died peacefully this morning (Friday, February 19) at Epworth Hospital.

With Dr Moore's passing at the age of 71, Parade has lost a leviathan - its longest-serving Principal in 150 years, the last of the Brothers to command that position, and a humble visionary whose actions spoke volumes through a quarter of a century at the helm.

Old Paradians' Association President Dr Paul Shannon, a close confidente of Dr Moore, paid the following tribute.


"Thanks to Br Denis, every Paradian, past present and future is empowered with the opportunity, the support and a sense of belonging and mateship that our network and traditions create. He encouraged the connection, mateship and inclusion between Old Paradians, students, teachers, families and the community," Dr Shannon said.


"Br Denis was a strong proponent of social justice. He believed that everyone deserved to be treated equally, upholding respect and dignity."

Parade College, in its tribute to Dr Moore, noted the following:

Denis James Moore was born on October 15, 1949 in Sunshine, a western suburb of Melbourne, Victoria. He was born to Colin James Moore (born 5 May, 1923; died April 12, 2016) and Shirley Patricia Moore – nee Malady (born 26 December, 1926; died 12 April, 1989). Br Denis was the eldest of six children, his five siblings Kerry John Moore; Gary Moore; Cheryl Anne Rovere, Lynnette Mary Meehan and Margaret Joynson.

A final year student of the 'Old Bluestone Pile' in 1967, Dr Moore celebrated his Golden Jubilee as a Christian Brother in 2018 and twenty-five years as a Principal of Parade College in 2019.





As well as Parade, he held leadership positions at a number of EREA schools including: St Patrick's College, Prospect Vale, Tasmania; CBC St Kilda; St Virgil's, Hobart; St Kevin's, Toorak; and St Patrick's Ballarat.

A member of the Old Paradians' Association committee until the end, Dr Moore was instrumental in reviving the association a little over ten years ago. In that time he took great pride in seeing the OPA steadily re-emerge.



"The motivation for revitalizing the Old Paradians' was to promote good wellbeing of the whole person, physically, mentally and emotionally," Dr Shannon said.

"Br Denis believed that growth and learning was a never ending journey, one that did not end at school. He encouraged the concept of contribution and created the opportunity for people to make meaningful support to others.

"It is special to be Paradian, we don't know how to describe it, it is what makes us unique, and we value this well beyond our years at Parade. We respect our history and we are courageous enough to create our own. None of this would have been possible without the servant leadership and gentle guidance of Br Denis."

Dr Moore was honored by the Old Paradians' Association with the Tenete Award for outstanding service in the interests of the College. The award was presented to Dr Moore by the current College Principal Andy Kuppe, at the association's Centenary Dinner at the RACV City Club in October 2014.

In his acceptance speech, Dr Moore said in part:

I am both delighted and humbled by your offering me this Tenete Award . . . delighted particularly in that it seems to also support the development and direction of the College.

I completed my time as a student at Parade in the last years at the East Melbourne site, after which the school moved to Bundoora.

The move out of the inner city was a visionary one and it certainly gave school the opportunity to grow in response to changing educational needs on the expansive site at Bundoora.

My time as a student at Parade did inspire me to make efforts with my studies and to subsequently spend my life in the mission of Catholic education with the Christian Brothers. I certainly had no idea at the time that I might return as Principal some 30 years later.

I have had the privilege of being able to preside over significant changes to the College, in its physical appearance, the breadth of its curriculum and the strength of its community outreach. I willingly acknowledge the help of many people especially the College leadership team over this time.







One of the challenges over the last decade has been the need to re-establish the Old Paradians' Association with a new sense of its mission and the involvement of graduates from the Bundoora era.

It took some time to gather a new executive committee, but eventually a group volunteered to take the Association forward. I acknowledge the calibre and commitment of the men who formed the new Old Paradians executive committee, who have have ensured that the Association is a viable and dynamic organisation as it celebrates its centenary this year.

I am delighted to have been able to contribute to the Parade story in some small way and thank you for this Tenete award which I will cherish both personally and professionally.





In August 2018, Dr Moore was formally acknowledged for his commitment to the College's dramatic arts, at a musical program staged by the Old Paradians' Association at The Athenaeum Theatre,

In December 2019, he was inducted into the Old Paradians' Association's Hall of Fame, as part of a glorious farewell assembly acknowledging his 25 years at the helm, On that historic day, the Bundoora Campus' College Hall was renamed in his honour and Dr Shannon presented Dr Moore with a glass memento acknowledging his induction.

A panel featuring Dr Moore's portrait photograph and brief biography now hangs from the Hall of Fame wall at Parade College Bundoora, and another at Parade's Preston campus.

That bio ends with the words: "It has been said of Br Denis that Catholic education in the Edmund Rice tradition has not had a more faithful son".

Mid-Semester reports will be released online via PAM on Wednesday 17 March, excluding Year 9 ExCEL reports for Extended Learning Project 1 which will be released online on Thursday 1 April.

Student Progress Interviews are scheduled in the coming weeks. There are three opportunities for these important learning conferences to occur, in the final week of Term 1 and the first week of Term 2.

Interviews will be conducted remotely via MS Teams. Parents and students are encouraged to attend online via their son's MS Teams account. It is far more beneficial that students attend with their parents.

All families will receive a letter in the coming weeks with more information, including how parents can join scheduled meetings via a guest login in circumstances where they are not together with their son at the time of the interview.

On the mid-semester reports available on PAM, teachers may have indicated that an interview is required. Parents may also initiate the interview via PAM by booking appointments to meet with their son's teachers. Teachers will be mindful to keep interviews to the times designated.

Bookings for Student Progress Interviews will be available via the Parent Portal at 10.00am on Wednesday 17 March coinciding with the release of the mid-semester reports

Communication of non-submission, resubmission and risk of non-satisfactory completion

The continuous reporting capability of SIMON and the associated access to this information on the Parent Access Module (PAM) enables students and parents to obtain timely feedback about students' progress in each subject.

PAM also enables parents to more effectively monitor the submission status of their son's work and their results for submitted tasks.

When students do not submit work (NB: an extension may be granted), or if a student is required to resubmit work that was initially assessed as below a C grade, teachers will generate a letter accessible by parents on PAM.

Details for all assessment tasks, including due dates, can be accessed in each of your son's subjects under 'Learning Areas'.

Letters generated by teachers are the main method of communication by teachers to notify parents of\ tasks that were not submitted or were below an acceptable standard. Of course, teachers will still communicate other concerns relating to your son via email or phone.

As always, we encourage parents to contact their son's subject teacher to discuss how we can work together to support your son's progress.

A Fine Young Man

As parents and educators, we often ask the questions what type of person do we want our young men/sons to become? What characteristics should we build in our young men/sons? Often society and especially social media gives ideas that are not always in line with our values or that contradict our beliefs.

Across 2021 we are looking in Wellbeing to share ideas with our community about the development of boys and the many issues boys and parents face in today's world.

These articles and ideas will be varied and offer suggestions which some parents may find useful when engaging in conversations with their sons or in starting discussions with our boys as they enter their teenage years and progress to manhood.

To begin our series is an article from Michael Grose, founder of the website Parenting Ideas. In this article he shares his research and ideas about developing a fine young man.

A Fine Young Man, By Michael Grose

"He's a fine young man, your son." Imagine how you'd feel if you received this compliment. I suspect you'd feel fantastic as acknowledgement that you've raised a fine man is probably the ultimate compliment for any parent of boys.

What traits should a male possess to make this assessment ring true?

My involvement in education and parenting over four decades has brought me close with many males at every stage of development. It appears that some males grow old but never grow up or reach that type of maturity that benefits others and allows them to prosper. Fortunately, many boys do become men who are mature, stable and reliable and it's this model as a society that we need to set our sights on.

There are a number of traits that mature men have in common that are worth noting as we move our boys toward mature manhood. The following traits are the mark of a mature man, but by no means is it a complete list.

Gentleness

The twentieth century saw manhood associated with strength, toughness and hardiness. Two world wars saw the rise of the myth that a male couldn't cut the mustard unless he was strong, tough and hardy.

Hollywood and the celebrity culture it birthed helped perpetuate this image starting way back with Marlin Brando in the '50s and Clint Eastwood in the '70s.

Gentleness has been seen as a weakness for too long, which is the antithesis of the 19th Century notion that a man should always strive to be a 'gentleman'.

Gentleness comes from confidence and mental assuredness. A gentle man is in control of his emotions and feels comfortable with the full gamut of sadness, anger, love and hope. A gentleman acts kindly and is guided by a mindset of caring, empathy and contribution.

Generosity

A measure of majority is seen by how much a person can give of themselves to others. A generous man will help others, support and guide others without the wish for compensation.

Maturity also is shown when a person gives of themselves fully in a relationship, whether in friendship or an intimate relationship.

Sadly, too many men hold back their thoughts and true feelings and look inward rather than outward with both their friends and life partners. Maturity only happens when a man realises that life is not about him, but about something greater.

Discipline

A mark of a mature man is shown through his ability to put up with short-term pain or discomfort for long-term gain. Whether it's an athlete sweating it out on the track, a student giving up a night out with mates to study for an exam or a father forgoing a weekend away so he can be at his child's birthday, the ability to forgo short-term pleasure takes discipline and self-control.

Discipline, conscientiousness and self-control are required to develop the habits and patterns of behaviour that contribute to a man's long-term healthy development.

Boys often struggle to see past the immediate moment, whereas a mature man can look ahead and stick a plan, even though the journey may be long and difficult.

In closing

The world wants men to grow up, see maturity as worthwhile and take the necessary steps to achieve it.

As you point your son toward manhood, make gentleness, generosity and discipline the guideposts to aim for.

These traits won't limit his freedoms, but expand his possibilities as a he develops into a fine young man

ACC Athletic Championships 2021

The Parade Athletics team have made it 4 ACC Athletics titles in a row. The 2021 ACC Athletic Championships were held at the Lakeside Stadium on Thursday 25 February.

After missing the 2020 Carnival, the Parade team were keen to test themselves against the other ACC schools. Under ideal conditions, early consistent performances both on the 'track' and in the 'field' saw the Parade team up the top of the standings. The evenness of the competition saw this margin fluctuate slightly throughout the day, with St Josephs Geelong and Whitefriars competing strongly.

The Parade team responded to all challenges and took a narrow lead into the final relay events. The U/13 Relay was the first of seven relay events, and with the Parade team executing excellent 'changeovers', convincingly won the event. The poise shown by the four Year 7 boys set the tone for the other relay teams. The consistent performance which was so evident throughout the day continued in the remaining six relay events, which resulted in Parade winning a fourth consecutive Division One ACC Athletic Championships.

Selection In High Performance In 2021

Subject selection has been completed for 2021 High Performance classes at Year 8, 9 and 10 and letters have been sent home to those that have unfortunately missed out.

Medicine and Dentistry - University Clinical Aptitude Test

Students intending to apply for courses requiring the UCAT at any of these universities are reminded that they will need to book a test. Bookings will open on 1 March 2021 and close on 17 May 2021. The testing will take place from 1 July 2021 to 11 August 2021.

Tuckwell Scholarship Program - Australian National University (ANU) Canberra

The Tuckwell Scholarship Program at ANU is the most transformational undergraduate scholarship program in Australia

Tuckwell Scholar students will receive:

\$22,200 per annum (2020 rate, increasing with inflation) for each year of their degree, for up to five years. This is

to cover on-campus residential costs, books and general living expenses/

- Priority access guaranteed to ANU-approved student accommodation.
- An annual allowance of up to \$2,000 to assist with their move to Canberra and to support two annual return journeys (airfares) between their home and the University for each year of their degree. This allowance will be dependent on the proximity of their family home to ANU.

It is with much regret that the Production Team announces that this year's planned musical production, A Night at the Drive-In: Music Rewind, has been officially cancelled.

This difficult decision has been made in consultation with the Executive team at both Parade and Mercy College and although an unfortunate outcome, has been made in the best interests of both student and staff wellbeing.

Unfortunately, given the immense time constraints this production was already under, the recent interruptions caused by a delayed audition timeframe due to 2020 COVID restrictions and the snap five-day Victoria wide lockdown last week, resulted in the loss of crucial rehearsal time needed to create a quality performance by the filming deadline and simultaneously ensure that the students were supported in this process.

Current government advice provided by the Department of Education and Training regarding the wearing of masks whilst singing inside along with the limited mixing between students from different schools also presented many logistical issues when coordinating rehearsals with students from both Colleges.

Moreover, the delays in finalising casting and song selections also resulted in issues beyond our control and time limitation in sourcing performance rights for this type of production. This has been further exacerbated by the narrow legal avenue available to record and broadcast copyrighted songs for an audience.

The Production Team has continued to actively explore other options for cross-College collaboration, we are pleased to be able to confirm that this year's musical cast will perform together on-stage later in the year.



Banyule Students Benefit From Blaker's Tech Knowhow

Daniel Blaker (2019) is currently immersed in a Computer Science course at Melbourne University – and already the Old Paradian is imparting his knowledge and expertise as a Mentor to students at Banyule-Nillumbik Tech School.



Dante Gabriele, Parade's Learning Centre Leader – Head of Library, notified OPA Central of the way Daniel was impacting on young people's lives, in forwarding a relevant video released by the Tech School.

In a preface to the video highlighting Daniel's involvement, Banyule Nillumbik Tech School Director Skylie Massingham acknowledged the 20 year-old's initial involvement, first forged in his former life as "a student from one of our partner schools, Parade College".

"We first met Daniel when his school participated in a robot building master class lead by industry partners Microsoft at the Tech School. He then got involved with our Student Start Up program and successfully launched his business idea Noterist," Skylie said. The bot building involved creating a digital assistant for the Tech School's website using a programming platform provided by Microsoft.



"We reached out to Daniel when we first set up The Lab Greensborough to take part in this afterschool program as a mentor. We knew his interest for learning and technology would make him a great mentor to younger students. Daniel is now an active part of the Banyule Nillumbik Tech School and we feel lucky to count him in our team".

Simon Bequeaths His Late Father's Keepsakes To The College

In October 2019, as a parting gesture to his much-loved Parade, the late 1951 College Captain Noel Purcell made his way to the Bundoora Campus to donate his old school blazer to the Heritage Centre.





This week, a little over a fortnight after Noel's passing at the age of 87, son Simon, himself an Old Paradian of the Class of 1978, paid the Centre a visit to graciously donate more of Noel's Parade possessions.

Simon, the founding Director and Principal of Purcell Partners law firm, handed three trophies to the College Archivist Matthew Roberts – one earned by Noel some seventy years ago as College Captain and two for his triumphs in College tennis in 1950 and '51; together with a pennant earned as the 100-yard and 220-yard A Grade Open Athletics Championships winner in the '50 season.

Simon also donated a magnificent black and white photograph of his father chesting the tape in his Lynch singlet, quite possibly in that 100-yard event.

"The trophies were sitting in the pool room for a period of time and my father liked to reminisce about them whenever he visited," Simon said.




"On one occasion I can remember him repositioning them after he found them stuck behind something else.

"It just struck me when he passed away that all these things belonged in the Heritage Centre. Like the blazer, they belonged somewhere long-term."

Simon talked of Noel as "a great bloke and fantastic father".

"Dad never put any pressure on me," Simon said. "We had a fantastic relationship, particularly as we got older, and when I started my own business at 35 he even came and worked for me for a while.
