From the Principal

I write this newsletter in the shadow of the tragic events in two mosques at Christchurch New Zealand. As a mark of solidarity the College has its flags at half mast. The Islamic Council of Victoria's mosques have an annual open day. This year's event planned for last Sunday took on more significance after the horrific New Zealand attack. A number of Parade College staff visited the mosques in East Doncaster and Preston to voice our backing for the Muslim communities, saying they were supported and valued. I understand that normally the mosques normally each welcome a few hundred, but on Sunday welcomed many thousands. It is inspiring to see such support for a community suffering. I reaffirm that support particularly to members of the Muslim community amongst our students, families, and staff.

Our Lenten Fundraising Program continues until the end of term and it is good to see so many Tutor groups planning awareness and fund-raising activities in support of MacKillop Family Services and their program within the organisation called *Paw Pals*, which is a canine-assisted learning program. The Student Prefects are calling the Lenten campaign *Parade for Paw Pals*. MacKillop has had great success with using therapy dogs with students in foster care and residential care homes who are disengaged from mainstream education (due to trauma-related issues).

Last Wednesday night, twenty-two Parade students together with staff members Tom Laverack, John Houlihan and Kylie

Kuppe participated in the 9th Annual 'Cage' Experience. The boys had a meaningful experience and had an opportunity to meet with refugees, asylum seekers, and local people who have experienced homelessness. Another example of Parade's commitment to the Touchstone of Justice and Solidarity.

Over the weekend, we welcomed staff and students from Takada High School in Japan for the annual Homestay and Cultural Enrichment Program. They were welcomed at an assembly on Monday morning at school and have ten days of school visits and excursions before departure on Wednesday next week. Many thanks to the families who are hosting the students during their stay.

We are nearing the end of the ACC fixtures in Tennis, Cricket and Volleyball for our senior students, and we acknowledge the efforts of those who have represented us well in these sports. Students and coaches are busy preparing for Football, Basketball and Soccer next term for all year levels.

On Wednesday next week the Athletics Team will participate in the ACC Carnival. We wish the team athletes and coaches every success on the day as we strive for a *"Threepeat":* winning the ACC Athletics Old Collegians Shield for Division 1 three years in a row. It would be the first time ever we would achieve this feat – but let's not get ahead of ourselves!

Congratulations to Year 11 student and member of the Senior Sport Academy, Yaya Dukuly, who at the age of 16 made the senior team as a substitute for the Melbourne City Men's team against Sydney on Sunday night, part of a 2-0 win in Sydney. 

2019 New Learning Management Portal at Parade College

Our rollout and implementation of our new College portal "Simon" continues as we commence the year. I would like to thank parents for their patience and support as we roll out the new portal and support our staff, students and parents with learning the features of Simon through the Parent Access Module (PAM).

Over the next few weeks, we will be writing to you advising of some new features available and of some upcoming training opportunities available in using the modules in PAM.

We have over 70 % of our parents who have logged in and completed the contact and medical information update on Simon. These parents are able to Interact and monitor their sons learning progress, attendance and events along with viewing daily messages and the college calendar.

The College is currently still utilising CareMonkey this term for Years 8 to 12 excursions details and permission forms. To support parents with time to complete this valuable step. CareMonkey will be turned off on 24 March and so all students must have updated medical and contact details in PAM completed by 25 March in order to attend any excursion.

Family log-in details have been emailed to all families. The first time parents log in to PAM you will be asked to create a new password. Once logged in you will be asked to complete several initial tasks, including checking and updating your contact details, and your son's medical information.

Please note: that as of 25 March 2019 PAM will replace CareMonkey for updating this information and for giving permission for excursions etc.

On the College website, there are links to videos and documentation to help you navigate around PAM.

Evacuation Drills

Parents should be aware that the College conducts regular evacuation drills throughout the year. These drills are a normal part of the College's Emergency Management Plan. The drills serve as an educative tool and allow the staff and students to practice and discuss evacuation as a positive and normal procedure within the community. In the rare occasion that the College needs to implement its emergency plans Parents will be communicated with via SMS.

First Aid Service

Parents would be aware that the College runs a First Aid Centre in support of the community during the school day. Our First Aid trained staff are permitted to provide your son with medications as directed by a Medical Practitioner as part of a registered plan, such as Ventolin or an EpiPen. Any student who presents to First Aid with any head or neck contact must be picked up by parents as per the College's procedure.

Staff are not permitted to distribute or administer medications such as paracetamol and anti-inflammatory medications. Parents will be contacted to pick up their sons from the school if such medications are requested.

EpiPen's and Excursions

Parents of students that are at risk of anaphylaxis should be aware that, in response to Ministerial Order 706, it is College policy and a requirement of legislation, that students who attend the College must have supplied the College with a valid EpiPen and a current anaphylaxis action plan for their personal use.

Term One Interim Reports and Student Progress Interviews Years 7 to 12

Interim reports will be released online via PAM on Wednesday 27 March.

Parents of Year 9 students should note that Year 9 ExCEL reports for Extended Learning Project 1 are not included with the interim report. The ExCEL report will be released online at 10.00am on Friday 5 April.

There are two opportunities for the important learning conferences to occur, in the final week of Term One and the first week of Term Two.

Thursday 4 April at 3.45–5.45pm and 6.30–8.30pm Wednesday 24 April at 3.45–5.45pm and 6.30–8.30pm

Interviews at Bundoora campus will be in Alphington Court, while those at Preston campus will be in the Mackillop Centre. Parents and students are encouraged to attend. It is far more beneficial that students attend with their parents.

On the interim reports available on PAM, teachers may have indicated that an interview is required. Parents may also initiate the interview by booking appointments to meet with their sons' teachers.

Teachers will be mindful to keep interviews to the times designated. Please bring along your son's printed interview times, as they include the location of each teacher.

Bookings for Student Progress Interviews will be available via PAM at 10.00am on Wednesday 27 March

Communication of non-submission, resubmission and risk of non-satisfactory completion.

The introduction of continuous reporting on SIMON and the Parent Access Module (PAM) provides the opportunity for students and their parents to obtain more timely feedback about their progress in each subject. PAM enables parents to more effectively monitor the submission status of their son's work and their results for submitted tasks.

In addition, parents should be aware that in the circumstance where their son does not submit work after an extension has been granted, or if he is required to resubmit work that was initially below a C grade, then your son's teacher will communicate this to you via a letter accessible on PAM.

When a letter has been created, you should receive an automated email stating that a new letter has been generated for you to view on PAM. The letter will state the subject, assessment task and whether a resubmission is required, or if the task was not submitted at all.

Details for all assessment tasks, including due dates, can be accessed in each of your son's subjects under 'Learning Areas'.

The letter will be the method of communication by which teachers will notify parents of tasks that were not submitted or were below an acceptable standard.

Of course, you son's teacher will still communicate other concerns relating to your son via email or phone, however, the 'Letters' module accessible on PAM will provide parents and their son's teachers with a broader overview across all subjects.

As always, we encourage parents to contact their son's subject teacher to discuss how we can work together to support your son's progress.



Year 9 ExCEL - Humanities/STEM Day

On Wednesday 27 March, as a part of Parade College's ExCEL Program, all Year 9 students will be participating in either a Humanities excursion (Program A) or a STEM incursion at the Bundoora campus (Program B).

All students are required to wear their Parade College Sports Uniform and bring lunch. We look forward to your son's participation on the day.

Program A: Humanities Excursion



Who:

All students studying Humanities in Semester 1. Where: Students will participate in an excursion to the Shrine of Remembrance and Botanical Gardens. All students are required to travel via public transport (train or tram) to Federation Square by 9.15am. A Parade staff member will supervise students from 9.15am to 2.30pm.

The day has been organised by the Humanities Why: Department to engage students in the historical and geographic concepts and content found in the Year 9 Victorian Curriculum. This involves exploring a variety of biomes, examining aspects sustainability and Australia's involvement in World War I. Students will complete a work requirement during the excursion, which will be assessed and included on the Semester 1 Report.

Program B: STEM Incursion

Bundoora campus (meet at Greening auditorium) Why: The day has been organised to engage students in STEM activities which will develop skillsets such as critical thinking and problem solving, to prosper in the future world. Students will have the opportunity to participate in Robotics, coding, technology and engineering workshops. Boys will actively explore and experiment in hands on sessions run by local universities and industry and Parade's Science and Technology department.

Year 9 and 10 Semester Elective changes

At the commencement of Semester Two. students in Years 9 and 10 will begin their second semester electives resulting in a new timetable for each student in those years.

Though core subjects continue into Semester Two, because of the implementation of a new timetable, some students may find that one or more of their current Semester One teachers for the subjects of English, Science, Mathematics, Humanities or Religion may also change.

Though we try to limit the impact a new timetable has on these classes, it is not always possible for students in Years 9 and 10 to remain with the same teacher for the whole year.

Science Expedition – Indonesia 2020

Expressions of Interest

In the July holidays of 2020, students from Parade College will have the opportunity to attend a Science Expedition to Indonesia. This fantastic experience provides students with the opportunity to travel to a remote location, the island of Sulawesi, to conduct real scientific fieldwork. With the assistance of professionals from OPWALL and Parade staff, students will gain hands-on experience in responsible tourism, marine conservation, and sampling the local ecosystems in this amazing cultural immersion.

The island of Sulawesi has a high number of species that are unique to this location including 79 mammal, 252 bird, and 28 reptile/amphibian species that cannot be found anywhere else on the planet. Students will scuba dive or snorkel to survey the local reef ecology and marine life as well as surveying local bat, frog, reptile, amphibian, invertebrate, bird, and plant species.



This expedition is available to current Year 9, and 10 students.

All students have received a presentation on this at school and with limited expressions so far, we are looking for interest from parents on behalf of their son before finalising a parent information evening.

From Vietnam to Australia, a story of welcome Today, Miss Nguyen told us about her escape as a refugee from Vietnam to Australia, welcoming the Parade Cage night.

Her story was very moving and it was an eye-opener for many of us to be grateful for the things we are privileged to have today, like shelter, education, luxury, and family.

Miss Nguyen fled on a boat with her family to Australia and experienced trauma and disasters, that made it almost impossible for her to be with us today. She experienced wild weather, rough waves and her biggest worry was that her boat was going to be swallowed by the waves.

Thank God, Miss Nguyen survived and arrived in Australia over a year later.

Miss Nguyen and her story also taught us many things about refugees. In 1948, everyone had the right to seek asylum if they needed it and this was called the 'Universal Declaration of Human Rights'.

Refugees, like Miss Nguyen, wish that their escape could be as easy as filling in migration forms and catching a plane to another country, but that's not how it was for them.

For someone to be fleeing their own home country because of discrimination against their race, nationality, sex, religion or political opinion, means that they're desperate. They are desperate to live the better life that they deserve and that is why escaping and seeking asylum is their only option.

This is also why the Parade Cage night is such a great cause. Many refugees feel like nobody cares for them and that they don't have a voice. These notable Parade students are allowing those children, women and men to know that they do have a voice: that people are aware of their unfortunate position and are trying to do something about it.




From the Director of Ministry

The Right to a Safe and Secure Home

The events of last Friday in New Zealand have stunned us all. We hear the horrific stories and see the images of shocked and grieving people and are in disbelief that a young Australian man could inflict that much suffering on so many others. For what reason? Vengeance? To assert superiority? To feel powerful? Because he feels threatened and fearful?

The thing that I find most difficult about this is that most of the people killed had fled persecution in their home countries and had been offered a new life in the peaceful country of New Zealand. They deserved better. So much better.



AND YOU SHOULD HAVE BEEN SAFE HERE

Events like The Cage give me hope when hope seems hard to find. Last Wednesday, more than twenty Parade students slept outside in the quadrangle at school in a fenced in area. Whilst in there, we had visits from people who had *lived experience* of being homeless.

Three of those people were asylum seekers to Australia, similar to those killed in the mosques. Their stories challenged us to see exactly how privileged we are to have citizenship in a (relatively) safe country and a secure place to call home. They are stories that

City ready to give kids a go

Melbourne City boss Warren Joyce Account of two schoolboys to the travelling party for the club's A-League clush against Sydney PC tomorrow as he looks to cover the absence of three players on interna-tional duty with the Olyroos.

Riley Nathaniel Atkinson, Riley McGree and Lachlan Wales, who have all played a major role for City this campaign, are in Kuala Lumpu for a training camp ahead of qualifiers for the Asian championships. So Joyce could gamble by includ-

ing 15-year-old winger Yaya Dukuly and 17-year-old wide player Glanlacs fansucci in the squad for the game against the powerhouse club. The conch will also stiffen his

bench by bringing back marquee man Ritchie de Last, fan favourite Bart Schenkenveld and regular centre back Harrison Delbridge.

The first two missed the 3-3 draw with Porth Glory through suspen-sion, while Delhridge had a hemstring injury.



City has been one of the A-League clubs hardest hit by the Olyroo camp, but Joyce is not critical of Graham Arnold. He says that every club knows the

rules when they sign good young players and that they just have to accept how things are. "It depletes the squad a hit, but it

gives the young kids to come up from the academy a chance. "Its refreshing to see kids with no

fear, they have respect, but [In other ways) no respect, they knock one or two of the first teamers on their backsides. There will be younger players involved in and around the bench who have not been involved

"Ynya's only 15, he's a really young boy but he's got blistering pace, good technical ability, there's a goal in him, and he's a threat one-onone," Joyce said.

City's goal has been to try to sign the best young talent in the country as part of a production pipeline with those deemed good enough to be sold to parent club Manchester City or other clubs in bigger leagues around the world.

As such, says Joyce, losing play-ers to international call-ups is the way the system works. "There's no point grizzling about

it, we want to get the best young Aussie lads here. You either don't bafore [for the Sydney game]. try to bring the bost young players "Gianhaca and Yaya have done through and don't sign them ... or

accept what the rule is," he said. "We have got three players they are three important players, but you know the rules at the start of the sesson. When it comes around it's too inte (to complain). You just have to get on with it, it offers other

Renaissance Learning Year 8 Program

Parade College has an initiative called Renaissance Learning which aims to help improve our Year 8 students' reading ability.

The students are tested each term using an online program that provides teachers and parents with information about students' reading and comprehension ability.

The boys have online quizzes available to them that test their comprehension of novels they have read, including their class texts.

The whole program relies on your son reading for at least fifteen minutes every day.


