Term One Mid-Semester Reports/Student Progress Interviews – Years 7 to 12

Mid-Semester reports will be released online via PAM on Wednesday 17 March, excluding Year 9 ExCEL reports for Extended Learning Project 1 which will be released online on Thursday 1 April. Student Progress Interviews are scheduled in the coming weeks. There are three opportunities for these important learning conferences to occur, in the final week of Term 1 and the first week of Term 2.

Thursday 25 March 3.43pm to 5.59pm and 6.44pm to 9.00pm

Monday 29 March 3.43pm to 5.03pm

Wednesday 21 April 3.43pm to 5.59pm and 6.44pm to 9.00pm

Interviews will be conducted remotely via MS Teams. No interviews will be conducted onsite at Preston or Bundoora campuses. Parents and students are encouraged to join online via their son's MS Teams account.

When booking appointments, open from 17 March, be mindful that your son needs to be home as his device and MS Teams account are required to join the meetings that teachers will schedule.

Families received a letter this week with relevant information. Parents wishing to join scheduled meetings via an alternative email address, in circumstances where they are not together with their son at the time of the interview should contact his subject teachers who will make these arrangements.

On the mid-semester reports available on PAM, teachers may have indicated that an interview is required. Parents may also initiate the interview via PAM by booking appointments to meet with their son's teachers. Teachers will be mindful to keep interviews to the times designated.

Bookings for Student Progress Interviews are now available via the parent portal and mid-semester reports are now available on PAM. Bookings for each session close at 4.00pm on each evening prior to the interviews.

Student-Free Day Friday 26 March

On Friday 26 March, all teaching and support staff will be involved in professional development activities facilitated by academic staff from the University of Melbourne's Graduate School of Education (MGSE).

The final day of Term 1 for students is Holy Thursday, 1 April.

NAPLAN 2021 Equating Study

Parade College has been selected by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) to participate in this year's NAPLAN 2021 Equating Study. The NAPLAN 2021 Equating Study is being held in approximately 408 schools across Australia from Monday 26 April to Friday 7 May.

The Equating Study has been conducted each year since 2009. Each year a small number of schools participate. Schools are carefully selected to ensure a diverse range of student backgrounds and abilities are represented. The purpose of the Equating Study is to enable the results for the NAPLAN tests to be reported on the same NAPLAN measurement scales from one year to the next. A national sample of students participates in this additional 'equating' testing program, which is carried out before the main assessments so the results can be linked. One Year 7 and one Year 9 class will be required to participate in the study during the testing period. The equating test is not about testing your son; your son's results are not reported. If your son's Year 7 or 9 class is selected, then he will sit only one paper-based equating test in Numeracy. The tests will be administered at the school by trained test supervisors. The teacher will remain in the classroom.

All students from the selected classes are expected to participate in the Equating Study, unless they have been exempted or withdrawn from NAPLAN tests. Further information about NAPLAN is available at www.nap.edu.au

Parent Portal - Medical Information

It is important that the College has the latest medical information for your son. Please take the time to review your son's medical information in PAM and update when required.

Parents, please keep your contact phone numbers up to date, including at least a third contact person for times when you are unavailable

Anaphylaxis

I would like to thank the parents that have updated their son's Epipen and action plan. The response was fantastic. Ministerial Order 706 requires parents/carers to update their son's expired Epipen and anaphylaxis action plan, or if a new student or newly diagnosed to supply the College with a current Epipen, antihistamine, action plan, and individual anaphylaxis action plan. Epipens and action plans need to be dropped at College Reception at both campuses.

There are still a number of Individual Anaphylaxis
Management Plans that have not been returned to the
College. These plans were emailed to you at the beginning of
the school year.

These must be completed and returned to the College prior to 1 April. If you require me to send you another copy please email me on cathie.ireland@parade.vic.edu.au

Excursions and Anaphylaxis

Anaphylactic students must have a current Epipen stored at the College, which will be taken by the teachers on the excursion.

A second Epipen from home must also be taken by your son whilst on an excursion.

Without a current Epipen at school <u>and</u> a second Epipen from home for the excursion, your son will be unable to attend the excursion and will remain at school.

Asthma

Students diagnosed with asthma require a current action plan uploaded to their PAM account or handed to the First Aid Officer E49 or Preston Reception.

Please check your PAM account to see if you have uploaded your son's asthma action plan. If your son does not have a current asthma action plan from your doctor please arrange this as soon as possible.

In case of an emergency we will follow the first aid guidelines of 4x4x4.

Medication

First Aid staff cannot dispense over the counter medications (for example, paracetamol and antihistamines) unless parents request a medication permission form from First Aid, sign it and supply medication in its original packaging.

As the bicentenary of Catholic education in Australia is celebrated with the theme 'faith in the future', educators explain the social initiatives to develop citizens who can meaningfully contribute, as **CLAIRE BURKE** writes

CATHOLIC education is valued for its intent to prepare young men and women to confidently take their part in a world that is forever changing and to provide them with the necessary skills and empathy to help and serve others less fortunate than themselves, Parade College Bundoora deputy principal Mark Aiello

says.
"In addition to being challenged academically, our students gain an understanding of what it truly means to be a compassionate and giving person. They learn how to live out their faith through action," Mr Aiello

"Parade has a long and proud history of fostering the values of human dignity and justice through action," Parade College convenor of community action programs Anne-Marie Morello says.

One community program students can get involved with is Eddy's Brekkie Van.

"This very special program provides a hot breakfast for local residents, many of whom are school children, who may otherwise go without," Ms Morello says.

The Parade community and the Heidelberg community have formed a special bond through Brekkie Van and it offers our students a unique experience and opportunity to minister to those less fortunate."

Other social justice opportunities at Parade include the Edmund Rice Community and Refugee Services tutoring program where a group of students and staff volunteer to help students with a refugee background with their homework, as well as overseas immersions where students and staff work in poverty stricken communities.

Students at Nazareth College in Noble Park also have the opportunity to show their compassion through the St Vincent de Paul program by raising awareness as well as



funds to assist the poor and those marginalised in the community.

"The Vinnies team helps bring our school community together and makes a difference in people's lives," student program leaders Agatha Scandizzo and Angela Cremona explain.

"We are always amazed by the generosity of our school community, yet it is seeing the impact of our work that is most rewarding."

Mr Aiello believes giving students opportunities to contribute in meaningful ways to their world is a vital part of their overall development

From the Director of Ministry

As the term has unfolded, opportunities for student involvement in a range of activities had grown apace.

An ERA for Change student group has been initiated and will undertake their online orientation/introduction on Thursday 18 March.

Ms Anne-Marie Morello, in conjunction with other staff, has been active in promoting student events from the Community Action Centre with drinks and snacks being sold during breaks, and the Bluestone Café back in action several days a week.

Eddie's Brekky Van is back on the road, as is the St Alban's Tutoring Service and the Shared Table Dinners are also on the agenda once again. A number of Year 12 Retreats have taken place with two remaining for this term - 17 to 18 March, and 30 March to 1 April.

The Youth in Philanthropy program has commenced with a group of six Year 10 students, with the team identifying their focus issue following the workshop in which they participated on Tuesday 9 March. The team has submitted their philosophical objective, and in the next while will move to step two of the process.

The Lake Mungo Immersion Trip will run from the 9 to 14 August. Students in Years 9 to 11 have had an online presentation, and the online Parent Information Evening was held last night. Expressions of interest are now being called for, to ascertain whether there is sufficient interest in the program to run it.

Friday Mass in the Parade Chapel commenced on 5 February. Each Tutor Group has been assigned to a Friday Mass. The Bodkin House Mass will take place this Friday, with thanks extended to Mr Elbarbar and Mr Cicutto for their efforts in organising the Liturgy. Fr Antony Girolami, Parish Priest of St Francis of Assisi, Mill Park, will preside at the Mass for us. This day is also the Feast of St Joseph, which will be acknowledged during the liturgy.



The Easter Paraliturgy will take place on Holy Thursday, 1 April, during House Assemblies, which will be held concurrently first thing in the morning at Bundoora.

The Preston Campus will participate in a whole campus event with the Years 7 to 9 students, with the seniors being on Work Experience. Thanks are extended to Mrs Wilken for her organisation of the liturgy at Preston.

Catholic Education Week is being held this week from 14 to 21 March. Due to COVID there are restrictions on events that are being held. There is no St Patrick's Day Mass and several other events that would normally be held live have been pre-recorded.

The Patrick Oration

St Patrick's Day this year will also feature Archbishop Peter's Patrick Oration. This is a much-anticipated event on our calendar. In his first oration two years ago, Archbishop Peter put forward a guiding framework that helped set directions for the People of God and the Church in Melbourne.

The oration will be livestreamed on <u>YouTube</u> and televised on community channel C31 from 7.30pm on Wednesday 17 March. It will also be available to watch later, on YouTube.

Very recently, the Victorian Government and First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria announced the establishment of the Yoo-rrook Justice Commission to investigate historical and ongoing injustices committed against Aboriginal Victorians.

As we know, the process of truth-telling is challenging, but it is essential to begin a process of meaningful reconciliation and understanding.

In a recent speech to the Indigenous Peoples' Forum, Pope Francis said that, 'when diversities are articulated and mutually enriched, communion between peoples flourishes and is enlivened'.

We can help ensure that the Victorian reconciliation process comes alive in our schools by continuing to create cultural safety and security for our Indigenous students and their families, ensuring Indigenous perspectives are respectfully and justly embedded into the curriculum and school practice.

Ministry Retreats Term 1



Lord Jesus open our minds to the needs of our fellow men. Help us not to be selfish.

Edmund Rice to Brother John Patrick Corbett, Carrick-on-Suir. 1835

At Parade we are called to carry on the legacy of Edmund Rice through providing a holistic education for all students who walk through our doors. The principles of Presence, Compassion and Liberation guide us in our actions and our choices.

Our Ministry Retreats allow our Year 12 students to hear from and learn about those people in Melbourne who are living on the margins, and to practice the presence and compassion that is so integral to the Edmund Rice experience.



The pandemic has led to an increase in family violence, mental health issues and homelessness in Melbourne.

As we recover from lockdown, the community sector is still facing the consequences of the isolation, unemployment and financial issues that resulted.

During the retreat, students speak with representatives from the Exodus Community Heidelberg, the Salvation Army, and Melbourne City Mission who share the struggle that those people on the margins are facing, and show the students the work that is being done to support those in our community who are less privileged than ourselves.

Here are some excerpts of student reflections on the retreats so far:

"Now when I see people that are disadvantaged or marginalized, I notice that there is a story that tells more about them rather than just what I see on the outside. There is always a reason to why someone is who they are."

"I was given an insight on the hardships that the marginalized people face and how they turn a negative into positives. In addition, many are born into that kind of life and is difficult to escape."

"The retreat has helped make me see people who are disadvantaged in a more positive light. The general stereotype surrounding people who are disadvantaged is that they are bad people, however, this made me see that not everyone who is affected by poverty is bad."

"The retreat has changed the way I see people who are marginalised as I got an insight into how these people live and what these people go through on a day to day basis as well as how they work together as a community to get through the tough times."

It is very much a privilege for me to see the students step out of their comfort zones, challenge themselves and grow in the space of two short days.

For the majority of 2020 we were unable to participate in this valuable program and so it was with enthusiasm that we set off to St Alban's.

Parade students worked with primary school students with a refugee or migrant background, helping them with their literacy and numeracy. It is hoped that over the next three weeks a bond is formed between the students.

Any senior student wanting to volunteer is asked to come to the Community Action Centre.

Year 10 Service Learning Program

A letter was emailed home to the parents and guardians of all Year 10 Bundoora students regarding the change to the Year 10 Community Action Program. The new Service Learning Program is a part of the College's extensive Community Action Program and encapsulates the Edmund Rice ethos that Parade College is founded upon.

The program takes the place of the Year 10 Community Action Placement Program that ran for many years at the College.

Every Year 10 student is expected to complete a minimum of ten hours volunteer work over the year. At least five of these hours must be completed in College related events or programs and five hours can be external volunteering.

Students can take advantage of programs such as St Alban's Tutoring, Community Action lunchtime activities, Brekky Van, The Greensborough Community Meal, Father/Son Sports Nights, etc. to fulfil the ten-hour commitment. The upcoming College Open Day is a good opportunity for students to earn up to four hours should they choose to volunteer.

The daily Student Bulletin advertises such opportunities regularly, alternatively your son may have the opportunity to volunteer his time and skills to an outside organisation.

From The Old Paradians

Parade Thy Sons Launched at Bundoora Campus

The recently-opened Ambrose Treacy Pavilion provided the idyllic backdrop for the official launch of an extensive compendium of Old Paradian biographies – *Parade Thy Sons* volume 1.



The 336-page book, which chronicles the incredible life stories of 100 Old Paradians schooled at the College between its foundation year of 1871 and 1963, was launched at the Bundoora campus in a year in which Parade celebrates its sesquicentenary. Speakers at the launch were the College Principal Andy Kuppe, author Tony De Bolfo, editor John Ramsdale, retired psychologist Dr Paul Power and current College teacher James Shingler.

The launch attracted a great cross-section of College history – from the Arthur, Gorman and Mount families whose names loom large in the Parade story - through to Colin Glazebrook, Paul McCrohan OAM, David Millie MBE and Dr Power whose life stories feature in the new book.

Descendants of many other subjects of *Parade Thy Sons*, some of them long gone, were also in attendance – amongst them current College teacher Paul Watson, whose great great grandfather Andrew Larkin was the first Dux of CBC East Melbourne's 1871 foundation year – and James Shingler, whose grandfather Robert was a former President of the Old Paradians' Association.

Others in attendance were Ruth Pendavingh (daughter of Melbourne's beloved "Mr Movies" the late Old Paradian Ivan



Hutchinson); and Patricia Shannon and Joan Reid, the respective wives of the late Old Paradians Bernie Shannon and Bill Reid. Also present was the former Old Paradians' Association President Lewis Derrico and the current Association committeeman Andy Walsh.

Parade Thy Sons emerged from the concept stage in July 2020 when the Principal Andy Kuppe signed off on the book following discussions with the College's English Learning Area Leader James Fogarty. The book is to be included in the Year 7 curriculum for the next three years to inspire the students with tales of Paradians like them who came before.

Tony De Bolfo, who is also the Old Paradians' Association CEO, conceded that book could not have been completed within the tight deadline had it not been for the COVID-19 lockdowns, which forced the cancellation of all other Association activities through 2020.

"While I was initially intimidated by the scale of this task and its reasonably tight deadline, I had at my disposal a reasonable quota of biographies I'd circulated through the Old Paradians these past ten years," Tony said.

"I was also put at ease by the level of support from the Parade community – including Old Paradians who were encouraged to submit their own stories for publication or the relatives of deceased Old Paradians who did so on their behalf – and the knowledge and expertise of a wonderful editor John Ramsdale who taught me at Parade."

Tony hoped that the 100 biographies - covering most of the 'Old Bluestone Pile's' 96 years – would serve to pique the interest of readers long enough for the release of *Parade Thy Sons* volume 2, which spans the 53-year history of the Bundoora Campus to 2021 and should be available this Christmas.

"What hopefully becomes apparent to the reader of this book is the sheer scale of career diversity – from doctors to lawyers, customs officers to clergy, artists to musicians and sportsmen to soldiers (Lest We Forget)," Tony said.

"On a personal level, *Parade Thy Sons* has reinforced my long-held view that the greatest stories are true.

Through the process of research and writing I've found welcome inspiration in the stories of these great men, at a time when stories like theirs are increasingly harder to find.

"It's my fervent hope that the book resonates with all who make up the College community, inspires today's Paradians to follows their dreams, and celebrates the greatness of Parade in this its 150th year."
