

### From the Principal


This is the last *Newsletter* for the term. Classes conclude at 3.15pm tomorrow (Friday is a student free day for Parent / Teacher Interviews) and classes resume on Tuesday 26 April (Monday 25 April is a public holiday). As we break for the Term Break, I encourage all of the Parade College families to connect with their local parish for the celebration of the Easter Triduum – the most sacred time of the Christian Calendar.

One of the ritual practices of the Catholic community I find enrichening on a hushed and sombre Good Friday is to pray the Stations of the Cross. My parish participates with other Christian Denominations and walks through the neighbourhood through fourteen suburban sites recording Jesus' journey stumbling towards Calvary.

I am often struck by the sixth station, where Veronica, an ordinary woman in the crowd lining the Via Dolorosa takes off her veil to wipe Jesus' bloodied and bruised face. May we imitate Veronica in her ordinariness as we witness the plights, great and small, of those around us, perhaps we can stand out from the crowd and reach out and comfort those who are suffering.



A wonderful evening of celebration was had last Friday at the Park Hyatt Grand Ballroom to celebrate the College's 150 years. Originally planned for October 2021, we finally got the event to the line to fittingly commemorate. A highlight of the evening was the induction of four new Hall of Fame members. Each was presented on stage to a standing ovation. Significantly Michael Pratt (Class of 1972) and Hall of Fame recipient assisted the MC, Daniel Harford, with the presentations.



Peter 'Wheels' Bedford (1964) was the first Hall of Fame recipient presented. Originally to be inducted in 2021, but postponed because of COVID, Peter, an outstanding sportsman in both Football and Cricket, emotionally accepted the honour. Peter is a proud Old Paradian and acknowledged the tremendous influence the school had on his life.

Terry Moran AM AO (1966) was next inducted to the Old Paradians Hall of Fame. Terry was College Captain (Head Prefect) in his final year and went on to an outstanding career in public service administration and leadership rising to become the most senior public servant in the country.

Michael Drapac (1973) was the next recipient of the Old Paradians Association's coveted Hall of Fame. Michael was able to reflect upon the positive impact the College had on him and the sacrifices his mother made to educate him and his two brothers. Michael has earned an international recognition for this sustainability focus.



Martin Macaulay, Music Director at the College (1990-2018) was able to proudly accept the Hall of Fame award on behalf of Wally De Backer, College Captain 1998. Wally, but better known for his stage name Gotye, has been able to build an extremely successful music career as a composer, singer and songwriter and is currently residing in New York.

The iconic tune 'Somebody That I Used To Know' became a global phenomenon earning Grammy Awards for Record of the Year and Best Pop duo performance. The song has had almost two billion hits on YouTube worldwide. Wally's Hall of Fame Award will be delivered to his parents to pass onto him next trip to the US.

On the night the Old Paradians and the College also launched Tony De Bolfo's book *Parade Thy Sons Volume* 2.

The wonderful skills and gifts that Tony has in the story telling of several Old Paradians spanning from 1963 to the present day were acknowledged as was the work of editor John Ramsdale (Class of 1966) who unveiled a framed portrait of the front covers of both volumes of the book.



The arrival of the mid-semester report is a significant opportunity to commend your son for his good work and application. It is also very important to discuss any areas of concern at the interviews and ensure that a plan of action is established to redress any short-comings. There are two opportunities for the important learning conferences to occur, tomorrow night (Thursday) and during the day on Friday.

Please note that Friday 8 April is a student-free day so that the interviews can take place.

Interviews will be conducted remotely via MS Teams. Parents and students are encouraged to join online via their son's MS Teams account.

When booking appointments, be mindful that your son needs to be home as his device and MS Teams account are required to join the meetings that teachers will schedule.

Families should have received a letter on Tuesday 22 March with relevant information. If one or both parents/guardians cannot be in the same location as your son for the MS Teams Interview, please forward the link that has been emailed, to the other party. Let the teacher know when you enter the MS Teams meeting that someone else will be joining the meeting.

Please ensure that you have the MS Teams app downloaded on your device. You can download the MS Teams app from the Microsoft store, App store on iPhone and Playstore on an Android phone.

On the mid-semester reports available on PAM, teachers may have indicated that an interview is required.

Parents may also initiate the interview via PAM by booking appointments to meet with their son's teachers. Teachers will be mindful to keep interviews to the times designated.

Bookings for each session close at 9.00am on the morning prior to Interview Day, ie; Thursday 7 April on Wednesday 6 April at 9:00am and Friday 8 April on Thursday 7 April at 9:00am

# NAPLAN – information for parents and carers



2022

### Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit in May each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students do.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

### Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools are transitioning from paper-based to computer-based assessments. Most schools will complete NAPLAN tests online in 2022. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

### What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. Questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

### Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students can participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experience of using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.





### What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

### What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN.

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

Some familiarisation and explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

#### NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN online test window is nine days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN online test window starts on Tuesday 10 May and finishes on Friday 20 May 2022. Tests must be scheduled as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

Online NAPLAN test scheduling requirements are detailed in the table below.

### How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

### How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au

#### Uniform for Term 2 and 3

Just a reminder that at the start of Term 2 students will wear their winter uniform. This will continue for Term 3 as well.

#### Year 10 Man Cave

Throughout this year a number of our students will participate in programs run by The Man Cave. These programs are designed to equip our young men with the skills to speak through concerns or issues, support each other and have open and honest discussions about mental health and where they can seek support.

Across Monday 21 March and Tuesday 22 March our Year 10s participated in the program at the Bundoora and Preston Campus. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and we encourage our Year 10 families to have discussions with their sons about what they learnt and what was discussed throughout the day.

One of your Year 10 students wrote a reflection after the day which speaks to many young men's experience of the program.

On the 21st and 22nd of March the year 10 boys participated in Man Cave, a program for young men to prevent mental health illness.

It was a fantastic day, full of activities and events that included everyone and changed boys' views on each other. Being able to discuss deeper topics with boys you might not know takes a lot of strength and courage!

I'm glad everyone was very mature about the past and backgrounds of their peers and it gave a whole new meaning to the saying 'don't judge a book by its cover'.

The team from Man Cave were great role models and allowed us to open up about ourselves.

Term One saw a successful return to a more 'normal' pre-COVID scenario, though some restrictions were still in place.



The Harvard Graduate School of Education offers the follow advice for parents trying to develop their son's reading skills:

Read in front of your son. We know that all children learn from what they observe. If you're visibly engaged in and excited about reading, your son is likely to catch your enthusiasm and become a better reader himself.


Talk to your son about what you are reading. It is key to show your son that you enjoy reading and think that learning is important. In turn, ask your son about what he is reading and studying in English. To assist with this, you may like to read the book your son is studying in class, so that you can more deeply engage him in conversations about it.

Visit the library together and borrow books for yourself as well as for your son. Scatter books, magazines, newspapers, and comics in everyday places — the car, bedroom, or the breakfast table.

View websites together with your son, share e-Books, even listen to audiobooks. This all counts as reading — every little bit helps!

Have conversations with your son about current events and happenings in your community.


The ERPP and VCAL boys asked lots of questions and were engaged throughout the session. Feedback from the students was extremely positive and it was an extremely valuable experience for them.

All ERPP and VCAL students have been participating in their first 2022 work experience placement from Monday 28 March to Friday 8 April.


This placement is a compulsory part of the ERPP and VCAL programs at Parade College and contributes to better informed careers, course and pathways options for young people.

# Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

Students are able to wear the Aboriginal Tie in place of their College Tie during Terms 2 and 3


