



While he provided food and clothing for poor students in Waterford, he saw that only education could provide a







NAPLAN Testing 2018 - Year 7 and Year 9

The National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests for Year 7 and Year 9 students, will be held on Tuesday 15 May, Wednesday 16 May, and Thursday 17 May.

The NAPLAN tests are conducted by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) on behalf of Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA).

The results of the tests provide diagnostic information for parents and teachers about your son's performance in Literacy and Numeracy. This information can be used to support teaching and learning programs and improve student achievement.

Later in the year, you will receive your son's personal report. The report will describe your son's particular skills in reading, writing, language conventions and numeracy.

The report will also show how your son performed in relation to National Benchmark standards. These benchmarks describe minimum acceptable standards for students across Australia.

Please note that the boys are required to bring a basic scientific calculator to the Numeracy test on Thursday 17 May. Please make sure your son has his calculator on that date. NAPLAN rules do not permit the use of an iPad calculator.


There will also be several days where the students will be attending excursions visiting famous temples in Kyoto, the bustling city of Osaka, or perhaps even a Ninja Village.

Year 8, 9 and 10 ACC High Performance Sport Program for 2019 – Football and Soccer

The ACC High Performance Sports Program allows students in Years' 8, 9 and 10 to train and play ACC Sport as part of their overall timetable.

To be involved in ACC Sport in Years' 8, 9 or 10, students are selected to be part of an ACC High Performance Class. Selection into these classes is based on some or all of the following criteria:

- Previous ACC involvement and performance at Years' 7, 8 or 9
- Involvement and performance in regular Physical Education Classes
- General Behaviour and ability to demonstrate mutual respect to fellow students and staff
- Performance at selection trials
- Ability to uphold the school's discipline and uniform policy
- Performance in local sporting competitions

If your son is currently playing in an ACC Football or Soccer team in Years' 7, 8 or 9, then his performance throughout the season will provide a guide for possible selection into an ACC High Performance class for 2019. Therefore students currently playing ACC Football or Soccer team are not required at the trials.

The competition is divided into geographic stages: club, zone, regional, district, state and then national. Year 10 Mock Interview Program

At the end of Term One, all Year 10 Bundoora students participated in a Mock Interview Program after having written job applications in response to a casual retail position. With over twenty volunteer interviewers from our local community and extended Paradian networks, the students were very fortunate to experience an authentic job interview and receive personal and general feedback to help increase their chances of success in the future.

Some feedback from the students regarding the experience included the following reflections:

"I learnt that job applications are the most important part of the entire process. Without a successful job application, you will not receive an interview. I also learnt to do certain things before and during the interview to help me succeed"

"I learnt about cover letters and resumes and how to structure them well"

"I learnt about how to prepare for a job interview and also how to present and be confident in my responses"

"You need to carefully proofread your application, maintain eye contact and smile during the interview and relate your skills and qualities to the job as much as possible"

The interviewers were very impressed by our students, with one emailing after the event:

"I just wanted to get in touch to once again pass on my thanks for the opportunity to come out to Parade College to help your Year 10 students prepare for interviewing for their first jobs. The quality of the student applicants was overall very high and it reflects tremendously on all the hard work they have put in and the work of your team and the College to support students in preparing for the future"

It was a wonderful day and I would like to thank all of the Year 10 Careers Teachers for their support and preparation of the students in the lead up to the event. Also, the event would not be possible were it not for the generosity and commitment of our incredible volunteer interviewers who came from organisations including Secon Freight Logistics, Australia Post, Red Rooster, LaTrobe University, Apprenticeships Matter, Allianz Global Assistance, and PsychPress.

Monash University Big Data Challenge Day

During the recent school holidays, three Year 12 Parade College students participated in the Big Data Challenge Day hosted by Monash University; Gavin Li Year 12 B02, Khang Tran Year 12 H03, and Raymond Zhang Year 12 T01. Their reflection on the experience is below:

On Thursday 5 April, we attended the Big Data Challenge Day hosted at Monash University which was aimed at allowing students the chance to explore the application of mathematics in business. There were three challenges available for us to choose from: actuarial science, business analytics, and econometrics. The three of us chose actuarial science, but were placed in separate groups which allowed us to interact with other like-minded students from different schools around Victoria who brought different approaches to the task at hand. Our goal was to analyse the given data about biscuit sales, then provide a report on the logistics of a 'free biscuit' campaign.

In the end, it was difficult to differentiate which team had the best response due to the high standard of work submitted by everyone. However, winning teams from each challenge had to be chosen, of which one of us was a part and received a Monash hoodie jumper as a prize. Through this challenge, we gained an insight into what Big Data is and how it forms an integral part of our everyday lives. We also received useful advice about tertiary education and, of course, everyone had a great time.

Year 10 Work Experience - Bundoora Students

This year's work experience program will take place during the week 19 to 23 November. Students have been encouraged to begin looking for placements, and the activities in their Careers class over the next term should help to provide further ideas for students unsure about what they might like to explore as possible future career options.

Work Experience provides an excellent opportunity for young people to get a sense of the workplace and professions that they are considering and interested in learning more about. In a time where working roles and environments are constantly changing, the opportunity to engage with real working experiences can be so powerful for young people trying to navigate their own futures.

Year 8 Renaissance Learning Program

Extended reading is part of our English courses. We require students to regularly read books other than the set class novels.

To encourage this in Year 8 we have introduced the Renaissance Learning Program – Accelerated Reader. This program provides reading strategies and book quizzes which aim to improve reading comprehension.

Students of all reading abilities will benefit if they participate in the program – reading a book for at least fifteen minutes daily and then completing the corresponding book quiz.

The English teachers will organize classroom reading, and also book borrowing sessions with the teacher-librarians in the Learning Centres. Students may read books from their home library or the local library and Parade College teacher-librarians will advise about book quizzes for these books.

There will be an online Star Reading comprehension test each term, in order to monitor progress. Feedback to students from their English teacher and the teacher-librarians is a vital part of the program, and is a great motivator as the boys see how they are progressing.

The Renaissance Learning program has a special feature for parents called Renaissance Home Connect, which can be accessed from home from any computer with an Internet connection.

From The Old Paradians

Vale Wally Magalas, Old Paradian, Vietnam Veteran

Wladymyr ('Wally') Magalas, one of 54 Old Paradians known to have served in the Vietnam War, and a father to former Parade College students Adrian (1996) and Daniel (1998), has died at the age of 70.



Born in Mannheim, Germany on May 14, 1947, Wally was the son of Alexandra and Borys Magalas, displaced citizens of post-war Ukraine.

At the age of 11 months, Wally joined his parents in migrating to Australia. On arrival, the Magalas family found temporary lodgings at the Bonegilla Migration Camp in north east Victoria before settling in Greensborough shortly afterwards.

Wally completed his early schooling at Parade Preparatory College in Flowerdale and later pursued an electrical trade by way of Greensborough Technical School.

In Vietnam, Wally served as a Private with the 1 Australian Reinforcement Unit for a fortnight from late August 1969, and then with the 5th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment from early September of that year until March 1970.

In March 1978, Wally married Eileen, a girl of similar Australian/ Ukrainian heritage. Husband and wife settled in Montmorency and raised their sons Adrian and Daniel.

Wally worked as a Technical Officer for the Public Transport System - Trams (later Yarra Trams) - his one job for more than 40 years. He was also extremely active in the Ukrainian community - chiefly in youth development and camp organisation (and later as grounds keeper) for Plast: Ukrainian Scouting Association. He also helped build Mt Hotham's Kalyna: Ukrainian Ski Club, of which he was a long-standing member and booking officer.

Wally loved to tinker with and repair anything and everything. He enjoyed being outdoors, skiing and sharing a laugh over a drink with his friends. He had a knack for fostering friendships across many social groups that lasted decades, was always willing to put up his hand to help those in need and was never known to say a bad word about anyone.

Wally's battle with non-Hodgkins lymphoma endured for more than 10 years. Throughout this time, he stayed strong, never complained, never drew attention to himself or his fight and had the resilience to keep bouncing back from each treatment and setback. Most recently, he succumbed to multiple attacks on his body in a very short space of time and was sadly unable to muster the strength to keep fighting.

Fellow Old Paradian and Vietnam veteran Paul McCrohan, the President of the Tramways/East Melbourne RSL Sub Branch, paid tribute to Wally, who in 2015 joined fellow returned servicemen ex-Parade College at the annual Veterans' Luncheon convened by the Old Paradians' Association. Wally was photographed with them for posterity in the Frank Mount Social Room and stands third from the left in the accompanying group photograph.

"Wally was very stoic all through his treatment," Paul said.
"He was a much-liked and respected member of the Kokoda Gym at the Repat, of RSL Greensborough and of Tramways/East Melbourne."

Wally is survived by his wife Eileen, sons Adrian and Daniel and two grandsons Oryn and Tommá.

His funeral was held on Friday 13 April.



Vale Kenneth Hince OAM

Kenneth Hince OAM, one of Australia's pre-eminent dealers in rare and old books, and for many years a music critic for major Australian newspapers, has died peacefully surrounded by family members in Euroa Hospital at the age of 91.

Born in July 1926, Kenneth completed his early schooling at Parade College East Melbourne – the 'Old Bluestone Pile' – in Intermediate B Class in 1939. A fellow class member was Ian Fraser, who two years later would be named the inaugural College Prefect (Captain).



In the September '39 edition of *The Paradian*, Kenneth penned what may well have been his first critique, of his experience in hospital pre and post-surgery.

That 80 year-old critique appears below this tribute.

Kenneth later studied Medicine and Arts at the University of Melbourne, served in the Royal Australian Air Force through the dark years of the Second World War, and later taught languages at Xavier College, before opening his bookshop in Melbourne in 1960.

He then commenced his long and successful career as critic the following year, serving as music critic for *The Bulletin* (1961-64), the inaugural critic for *The Australian* (1967-77), and critic for *The Age* (1977-94).

In 1993, Kenneth relocated to Euroa in Victoria's north-east, where he established a separate business, Euroa Fine Books. His special literature interests included the settlement and local history of Victoria, the exploration of Australia, art and illustrated books, literature and private press, and general antiquarian.

Kenneth was the principal founder and first President of ANZAAB, the Australian and New Zealand Association of Antiquarian Booksellers, and was an honorary life member of that association. Consequently he was an affiliate of ILAB, the International Association of Antiquarian Booksellers and his authoritative reputation was built on 60 years in the trade.

In 2008, Kenneth was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia for service to the arts – which he told the ABC at the time was due in part to his role in establishing the national antiquarian book sellers association 40 years previous.

"What it has done effectively is to rationalise the practice of old book selling in Australia, and to bring it into line with international practice," he said at the time.

Kenneth died on February 19 and was privately cremated following a funeral service in Euroa. He is survived by his children Ken, Bernadette, Barbara, Stephen, Monica, Madeleine and Julienne, and three grandchildren. His wife Patricia predeceased him.

In a tribute to his older brother which appeared in *The Age*, Michael Hince wrote: "He (Kenneth) led a richly fulfilled life of accomplishment which revolved around his close family of seven children to whom I extend my sympathy at their loss"

"Articulate, urbane and at times a little diffident (a trait he shared with his father) his love of music, the written word and books enriched his life and those of many he came in contact with and influenced," Michael wrote.

"His achievements in these areas speak for themselves and are well documented."

LIFE IN HOSPITAL, BY KEN HINCE (The Paradian, September 1939)

Before I was whisked off by ambulance one bright and sunny Tuesday morning, I had no idea what life in a big public hospital was like. But I was soon to learn.

When I arrived I was taken into a sombre brick building, laid on a high table, and for about half-an-hour was made the subject of an interesting debate between several doctors and students. Finally I was taken to a surgical ward, which was to be my home for the next week.



On arriving there I was examined by a few more doctors, and to my surprise I learned that I was an 'acute', and was to be operated on at about 2.30 the same day. Right on time I was wheeled out of the ward on a trolley, dressed up like a circus clown, and into the theatre, and looking into a huge lamp above the table, was just in time to see a nurse preparing to take me by surprise with a pad and a spray, reflected in it. I seemed to just fade to nowhere.

I will draw a curtain over the next two days until I was well enough to take much notice of my surroundings.

The ward was a long, narrow room with 133 squares in an oblong roof. I had plenty of time in which to count them. The first thing I would see on walking, generally, was a nurse pushing round an auto tray containing breakfast for the ward.

The only breaks of the general monotony of hospital life were the two mails at 9.30 and 2.30. I received 17 letters in that seven days that I remained there, and that, according to some other patients, was a record.

Today the only reminder that I have of life in hospital is a small scar, and I am thankful for this, for on the whole, hospital life is very depressing.

The final quarter is about becoming the wise elder. This is a path to freedom and peace.
