Reconciliation Week - 27 May to 3 June

Reconciliation is a journey for all of us at Parade College as indeed it is for all Australians – as individuals, families, the College community and importantly as a nation.

At the heart of this journey are relationships between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, especially those enrolled at Parade College.

Reconciliation Australia's theme for 2022, **Be Brave. Make Change**, urges Parade College towards braver and more impactful action. We have a number of events to affirm the College's commitment to the Reconciliation Process, including a liturgy in an extended Tutor period.

The College has ties and scarves designed by Parade College Aboriginal students, Neville Jetta and Ms Shelley Ware, and approved with consultation of Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr. Congratulations to current and former Parade College students Deklan Garcia, Desmond Tipuamantumurri, Alex Rigney, Tate Little, Kobe Knight, Jacob Spriggs, River Walker and Taj Fazekas.

The ties and the scarves feature kangaroo tracks, representing the kangaroos that lived on Parade land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean 'where the kangaroos lived'. The ties and scarves are on sale to the College community; please see page 3 of this Newsletter.

IDAHOBIT Day - 17 May

This week we celebrate International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia (IDAHOBIT) Day.

At our College we aim to be a place where all feel valued and respected as people made in the image and likeness of God. On IDAHOBIT Day we particularly affirm the sacredness of our LGBTQ community members: students, staff, family members. We ask how our community can be a more affirming, welcoming and safe place for them.

On 5 May, on behalf of *Outreach* Organisation, Fr James Martin SJ asked Pope Francis if he would be willing to respond to a few of the most common questions that he had been asked by LGBTQ Catholics and their families.

In a note to Pope Francis, written in Spanish, Fr James offered three questions and said that he could be as brief as he wished, especially since he was suffering from a flareup of pain in his knee, and respond in any form that he would like. Three days later, Fr James received a handwritten note with his answers.

"With respect to your questions," Pope Francis wrote, "a very simple response occurs to me."

Outreach: What would you say is the most important thing for LGBT people to know about God?

Pope Francis: God is Father and he does not disown any of his children. And "the style" of God is "closeness, mercy and tenderness." Along this path you will find God.

Outreach: What would you like LGBT people to know about the church?

Pope Francis: I would like for them to read the book of the Acts of the Apostles. There they will find the image of the living Church.

Outreach: What do you say to an LGBT Catholic who has experienced rejection from the Church?

Pope Francis: I would have them recognize it not as "the rejection of the Church," but instead of "people in the Church." The Church is a mother and calls together all her children. Take for example the parable of those invited to the feast: "the just, the sinners, the rich and the poor, etc." [Matthew 22:1-15; Luke 14:15-24]. A "selective" church, one of "pure blood," is not Holy Mother Church, but rather a sect.

As Parade College acknowledges IDAHOBIT Day 2022, we continue on the very human journey towards being a community upholding dignity, that is rich with diversity, is welcoming and is safe.

Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

Ties and Scarves can be purchased from College Reception \$25 Tie, \$30 Silk Scarf, and \$20 Polyester Scarf

Students are able to wear the Aboriginal Tie in place of their College Tie during Terms 2 and 3

Nano Nagle VCE Tutoring Program

This program runs every Monday to Thursday in MQ28 (VCE Study Centre) from 3.30pm to 5.30pm. Whilst numbers have been encouraging, we have seen that they tend to peak the day before an assessment. Students are likely to benefit from this program if they include an after-school session into their weekly home study routine, rather than just when an assessment arises.

Students are able to attend for part, or whole, of the session and can receive free assistance from recent high scoring Old Paradians (Class of 21) or may choose to simply complete their homework in a collaborative group of their friends. No bookings are necessary, students simply report to the VCE Study Centre at 3:30pm and sign in.

Preparing for Semester 1 Examinations

Examination preparation assemblies and workshops were held for Year 8 to 11 students last Friday. Examinations will commence at the end of this month. Students are encouraged to allocate time from now, not only for homework but also for revising for the semester examinations.

Wednesday 1 June is a normal ExCEL day for Year 9 students, at the usual ExCEL locations, and full attendance is expected.

Year 11 Exams

Friday 3 June to Tuesday 14 June Year 11 students will have exams in all subjects

In the event that a student fails to attend a Year 8 to 11 examination, if possible, it will be rescheduled only for approved school events (eg; ACC Sport) or upon presentation of a medical certificate.

All students are required to be wearing their correct full school uniform in all exams. The Sport uniform may not be worn, except by those involved in ACC Sport on the day of the exam.

Year 10 and 11 students are required to attend school for the times of their exams plus thirty minutes prior. There will be no expectation to attend Tutor Group on these days.

Study halls will be available for study to any students remaining at school during normal school hours.

Monday 13 June is the day of the Queen's Birthday Public Holiday.

Year 11 VCAL Zoo Excursion

The Year 11 VCAL students recently attended the Werribee Zoo as part of their Work Related Skills subject. They had a unique experience to develop their knowledge and understanding of the skills required to identify and apply occupational health and safety procedures in a workplace.

Students were taken behind the scenes to explore and consider how to restore a meerkat exhibit and investigate the risk factors for the environment for both staff and animals. Students enjoyed the whole learning experience applying their knowledge from class room lessons to a more practically based learning environment. This workshop also broadened students' knowledge on the different types of careers offered in a zoo environment.

Throughout the day, students also explored the Zoo, taking trail walks through the African savannah and Australian bush. They collected data on safe operating procedures and made recommendations on preventing hazards from occurring.



Another highlight of the excursion was taking a safari tour around the property to explore and learn about some of the world's most endangered species.
