# College Master Plan – Exciting Developments in Performing Arts and Science

We are so lucky with the facilities at Parade College that we enjoy today. Last week the state-of-the-art lights were turned on for the first time over the Treacy Oval at Preston. Change facilities adjacent have begun construction. We have made great use of the new Waterford Sport Precinct including the Waterford Pitch and the Waterford AFL Oval.

We now plan to implement next term a new performing arts building with greater provision for music education and connections to our drama and theatre facilities.

Our second project is the development of a senior science precinct with the addition of a state-of-the-art VCE / VET Science lab. It will elevate our STEM offerings to new heights.

#### **Reconciliation Week**

Reconciliation is a journey for all of us at Parade College as indeed it is for all Australians – as individuals, families, the College community and importantly as a nation. At the heart of this journey are relationships between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, especially those enrolled at Parade College.

Reconciliation Australia's theme for 2021, *More than a word, Reconciliation takes action*, urges Parade College towards braver and more impactful action. We have a number of events to affirm the College's commitment to the Reconciliation Process, including a liturgy in an extended Tutor period. Next Wednesday, as part of our 150<sup>th</sup> celebrations, we have planned a Reconciliation Ceremony, lunch and senior sporting matches. Auntie Di Kerr will Welcome us to Country with a Smoking Ceremony. Jade Gresham, St Kilda Football Player and Old Paradian from the class of 2015, will launch our Indigenous guernseys for our 1<sup>st</sup> XI Football and 1<sup>st</sup> XVIII teams.

The Parade AFL and Football Aboriginal Guernseys tell the Aboriginal history of the Bundoora Campus grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin. Congratulations to Parade College students Deklan Garcia, Desmond Tipuamantumurri, Alex Rigney, Tate Little, Kobe Knight, Jacob Spriggs, River Walker and Taj Fazekas.

Additionally, the students produced the design that is used on our new Parade College Aboriginal ties and scarves. The ties and the scarves feature kangaroo tracks, representing the kangaroos that lived on Parade land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean *'where the kangaroos lived'*. The ties and scarves will be on sale to the College community. Details are on the opposite page..

over a 1,000-kilometre route from Canterbury, England to Rome. At the end of their journey they were granted an audience with Pope Francis. One of the celebrities, comedian Stephen K. Amos confronted the Pope about LGBTQ acceptance during the audience and told Pope Francis,

"As a gay man, I don't feel accepted." The Pope responded, "Giving more importance to the adjective rather than the noun, this is not good. We are all human beings and have dignity. It does not matter who you are or how you live your life, you do not lose your dignity. There are people that prefer to select or discard people because of the adjective – these people don't have a human heart."

As Parade College acknowledges IDAHOBIT Day 2021, we continue on the very human journey towards being a community upholding dignity, that is rich with diversity, welcoming and safe.


#### **Key Events**

# Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

# Launching our Aboriginal College Tie

In 2019, our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students along with Ms Shelley Ware, Parade's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education Officer, and Melbourne Footballer and Mentor, Neville Jetta, embarked on a project to learn more about the Aboriginal history of the land on which our College stands.

With the help of Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin, the students learnt the stories of the land and then interpreted those stories into designs for a College tie and scarf, and Soccer and AFL football jumpers to be worn by the Parade Teams at the Senior Soccer and AFL ACC games on May 26.

Our designers included Old Paradians Deklan Garcia, Desmond Tipuamantumurri and Taj Fazekas, - and current students – Alex Rigney Year 11 L10, Tate Little Year 11 B10, Kobe Knight Year 11 T10, Jacob Spriggs Year 9 T19 and River Walker Year 9 T16.

The scarf and tie designs tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds. The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country.

From next Monday 24 May, students and families can purchase the Parade Aboriginal tie. Students may wear it as their preferred school tie with their Winter Uniform in Terms 2 and 3.

Ties can be purchased from Reception at both campuses for \$25 with \$5 from the sale of each tie going to the Opening The Doors Foundation which supports the educational needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.

The tie design has also been made into a scarf and they sell for \$20 for a polyester scarf and \$30 for a silk version and can be purchased from Reception at both campuses.

Next Wednesday 26 is National Sorry Day – a day to reflect and remember the Stolen Generations and marks the beginning of National Reconciliation Week, commencing on 27 May to 3 June.

We are so pleased to have sent invitations this week to the Class of 2020 parents, guardians and graduates for their celebration event on Friday 23 July at the Bundoora Campus.



#### **NAPLAN Year 9 Certificates of Achievement**

The VCAA have advised schools that NAPLAN Certificates of Achievement are being introduced for Year 9 students in 2021.

The certificates recognise Victoria's Year 9 students who achieve a result in Reading and/or Numeracy that places them in the very top band of NAPLAN, as well as those students who significantly improve on their Year 7 results.

The certificates will be awarded for two categories of achievement::

- Category One: the achievement of excellence through getting a result in the top band for reading or numeracy, or both.
- **Category Two:** the achievement of outstanding learning growth through improvement by two or more bands between the NAPLAN Year 7 and Year 9 tests for reading or numeracy, or both.

The new certificates celebrate those who achieve the highest level and those who excel by making exceptional progress, irrespective of where they start.



The Certificates of Achievement will be jointly signed by the Minister for Education and VCAA CEO and their introduction aims to motivate students to bring their best efforts to the NAPLAN assessments.

#### Morrisby Online Career Assessment

All Year 9 students completed the Morrisby Online Career Assessment on Wednesday 12 May.

This assessment provides valuable information which will inform subject selections and future careers and pathways planning for students.

# **General Achievement Test**

This year, the General Achievement Test (GAT) will take place on Wednesday 9 June commencing at 10.00am and concluding at 1.15pm. This test is for all students completing a Unit 3 and 4 study in 2021 and will take place in the Greening Auditorium.

No Unit 3 and 4 classes will run on this day and full school uniform is to be worn. More details regarding the logistics of the day will be distributed to the students closer to the date.

No formal revision is necessary for this assessment but given that it does contribute to final ATAR score calculations, the GAT is an important test and students should strive to do their very best.

All Year 12 VCE students undertook a practice task after receiving a lecture on the questioning and writing styles during the week.

Our accelerating Year 11 students will be sitting a practice GAT with VCAA supervisors on Tuesday 25 May during class time, details of which were provided to students at their assembly on Friday 7 May.

This trial GAT will help prepare the students but will not count towards their GAT grades. They will receive their results for the task for their own interest later in the year.



#### **Epipens and Excursions**

Parents of students that are at risk of anaphylaxis should be aware that, in response to Ministerial Order 706, it is College policy and a requirement of legislation that students who attend the College must have supplied the College with a valid Epipen and a current anaphylaxis action plan for their personal use.

In order for a student to attend an excursion or event off the premises they must carry their individual College Epipen and

their spare Epipen from home with them in order to attend that event. This is to ensure that sufficient medications are available should the student require them. If parents have specific enquiries about Epipens please contact Ms Ireland in First Aid at our Bundoora Campus.

#### Year 10 Immunisation Cards Distribution

The Year 10 Immunisation cards for Meningococcal will be distributed to the Year 10 students Bundoora from Monday 17 May.

The cards need to be signed and returned to your son's tutor teacher by Friday 28 May - even if you are not having your son immunised through the College parents are still required to return the card with the NO box ticked and the card signed.

The Year 10 immunisation for Meningococcal occurs on Thursday 29 July.

# From the Assistant Principal - Student Wellbeing

#### Health at Parade College

As we come into flu and cold season we wanted to take the opportunity to remind families about the processes for students and the current health guidelines from the Victorian government.

We ask parents that if your son is sick in any way you keep him home until he is healthy and well. After 2020 where there were very few flus, colds and gastric outbreaks we have found this year that our young men are very susceptible, and these are becoming highly contagious. If your son is unwell, please allow him the time to recover before he returns to school.

It is outlined by the Department of Education that, if a student has persistent symptoms due to an underlying condition such as hayfever or asthma, parents are encouraged to seek the advice of their healthcare professional who can advise on the next steps if their son develops symptoms that are different to or worse than their usual symptoms. Students whose symptoms are clearly typical for their underlying condition can continue to attend school.

Parents/carers should consider getting a medical certificate from the child's treating GP to confirm that it is safe for them to attend school with persistent symptoms that may overlap with some of the symptoms of COVID-19 such as cough or runny nose.

As outlined by DHHS, if your son has any symptoms of COVID-19 that are not related to an existing condition please get him tested and isolate until he has a negative result.

To ensure students can stay up to date with any work, lessons are posted online on SIMON and all students can access them if they are feeling well enough. We also encourage boys to e-mail teachers to make them aware of their absence. For parents please let the College know through PAM of your sons absence and if it looks like it might be more than three days please also contact your sons tutor teacher who will be able to assist and make classroom teachers aware.

#### **Connecting with Boys - Michael Grose**

Earlier this year I shared an article from Michael Grose on raising fine young men. In his most current article Michael talks about connecting with boys.

As our boys become teenagers and ultimately young men connection and communication can be more difficult to initiate. Where only a short time ago conversations would flow parents often find themselves receiving one syllable responses to questions and shrugging shoulders.

The below article from Michael explores different ways in connecting with our sons.

#### **Connecting with Boys**

Teaching raising and communicating with boys has long been a fascination of mine. As a primary teacher it was boys who provided me with the most joy and the most headaches.

As a father of a boy and two girls it was my son who provided the most sleepless nights, although all gave me my fair share.

As a parenting educator I always field more queries about raising boys than girls. Questions about boys have usually focused on learning, lack of confidence and poor or aggressive behaviour while queries about girls have often had a relationship or mental health focus.

Fortunately, there have been some great boy champions in this part of the world who have shown the way for parents, teachers and other professionals.

Steve Biddulph, Dr Tim Hawkes and Maggie Dent are personal favourites. While each comes from a different background and offers a diverse perspective, they each share the same belief that adults must form deep connections with boys if they are to influence them, especially in adolescence.

#### The need for approval

Retired psychologist and esteemed parenting educator and author Steve Biddulph emphasises the importance of adults liking boys and feeling comfortable in their company. Teachers in particular will experience success, he maintains, if the boys believe that they genuinely like and approve of them.

Conversely, boys shut down and won't try for teachers who don't understand or like them. Approval is at the heart of successfully teaching and raising boys.

#### The place of banter

Esteemed educator Dr Tim Hawkes, author of Ten conversations you must have with your son, maintains that banter and small talk are essential elements in conversations with boys. He busts the myth that 'boys don't talk' wide open and says that fun, trivia and jest are the foundations for more serious, significant conversations that a parent will have with their sons.


Dr Hawkes encourages parents to have serious conversations with boys about the things that really matter such as values, health and sex, rather than hope that their sons will develop their own ideas by osmosis, or worse, from peers and social media.

Dr Hawkes revealed a communication gem in his book. He wrote that family banter is the secret ingredient that allows parents to hold meaningful conversations with teenage boys. He's on the money, as fun and laughter provide parents with permission to take their children to some serious spaces for enlightenment and learning.

#### **Avoiding shame**

Parenting author and educator, and former teacher and counsellor Maggie Dent reminds parents and teachers that many boys battle both their physiology and a sense of shame when they move into adolescence.

Contrary to popular opinion, teen boys crave connection with significant adults. Our clumsiness and unease in their company often becomes a barrier. Dent's experience of raising sons, as well as her professional work with teen boys has taught her that adults need to show compassion, commitment and communication smarts if they are to connect with boys.



Michael Grose, founder of Parenting Ideas, is one of Australia's leading parenting educators. He's an award-winning speaker and the author of 12 books for parents including Spoonfed Generation, and the bestselling Why First Borns Rule the World and Last Borns Want to Change It. Michael is a former teacher with 15 years experience, and has 30 years experience in parenting education. He also holds a Master of Educational Studies from Monash University specialising in parenting education.

#### Ask what they think to find out what they feel

In my many years of experience in teaching and parenting boys, I've learned that if you want to find out how a boy is feeling, ask him what he is thinking.

For instance, if he experiences rejection at school and he is obviously unhappy, ask him what he thinks about the situation rather than how he feels. He will actually tell you how he feels in the process. It is important that parents understand this and put this knowledge to good use if they want an entry point into their son's emotional life.

#### In closing

Helping tween and teen boys navigate the world is challenging parenting territory. It's tempting to put off the conversations that we need to have because they seem too hard to initiate.

As the experts above state – each in their own way, the key to communication lies in our ability to form deep connections with the boys in our lives.

A huge thank you to Tony Teo on his brilliant work pulling this together along with the wonderful staff at Associated Catholic Colleges.



# From the Director of High Performance Sport

# Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) On School

## Students with Disability

#### What is the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data?

Schools must now complete the *Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)* every year. It counts the number of students who receive additional adjustments or "help" at school because of a disability. The NCCD helps governments plan for the needs of students with disability.

#### Who is counted in the data collection?

To count a student in the NCCD, schools must think through some key questions:

- 1. Is the student getting help at school so that they can take part in education on the same basis as other students?
- Is the help given because of a disability? The word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability</u> <u>Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA) and it can include many students.
- 3. Has the school talked to you or your child about the help that they provide?
- 4. Has the school kept records about the help they provide, the student needs and the reasons that the student needs this help? The school will need to keep copies of tests, student work, assessments, records of meetings, medical reports or other paperwork and information about how the student's learning is moving along over time.

Once the school decides that the student should be counted in the NCCD, they then choose a disability group and one of four levels of help that has been given to the student.

#### What does the word 'disability' mean in the NCCD?

In the NCCD the word 'disability' comes from the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (DDA). There are four types of disability that the school can choose from: sensory, cognitive, social-emotional and physical.

Many students that need help at school can be counted in the NCCD. For example, students with learning problems, e.g. specific learning disability or reading difficulty (sometimes called dyslexia), health problems (e.g. epilepsy or diabetes), physical disability (e.g. cerebral palsy), vision/hearing loss and social-emotional problems (e.g. selective mutism, Autism Spectrum Disorder, anxiety).

Letters from doctors or specialists can be very helpful for schools as they plan how to support students with their learning. Schools do not need to have these letters before they can count a

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student in NCCD. Teachers can use all that they know about the student's learning and the records that they have collected over time to decide if a student can be counted in the NCCD.

#### What sort of help does the school give students?

Students need different types of help at school. Some students need a little help sometimes while other students need a lot of help nearly all the time. The type of help given depends on the needs of the student. The help can include changes to the school buildings or grounds (e.g. ramps or things like special desks or chairs), extra teacher help in classes, special learning programs, changes to the work they give the student or extra adult help.

#### How will the NCCD be different this year?

All schools have been counting students in the NCCD since 2015. The government will use the NCCD data as part of the funding to schools.

#### What will the school need to know about my child for the NCCD?

Schools work together with families to understand the needs of each child. It is helpful if families give their child's teacher a copy of any letters or reports they have. The letters or reports will help the school understand the child and the help that they might need. Letters from doctors, psychologists, speech pathologists, doctor, and occupational therapists etc. can be very helpful for schools. These reports along with information that the teacher has (i.e. school based tests, your child's work and learning plans) helps the school to understand and meet your child's needs.

#### What happens to the NCCD data? Who will have the NCCD information?

Each school principal must check the NCCD data in August of each year. The school will give the information to the Catholic Education Office. The school will work with the Catholic Education Office to make sure that the NCCD data is OK before they give the data to the government. The government will not be given the names of any students or any letters or records. Please ask your school for their privacy policy if you need to know more.

#### Does the school need me to agree with them about counting my child in the NCCD?

Amendments were made to the <u>Australian Education Act 2013</u> and <u>Australian Education Regulation</u> <u>2013</u>. Schools do not need you to agree to let them count a child in the NCCD. You cannot ask the school not to count your child.

#### Where can I find out more?

Please contact your child's school if you have further questions about the NCCD and/or refer to the national <u>NCCD Portal</u>.
